Quarter 4: 8:30 pm
To kibitz, go to the RealBridge kibitzing website, enter your name and click on Log In. That will take you to a screen where you can select the event to kibitz.
After you select Kibitz JLall Online Teams \#5, you will be taken to a lobby with a list of tables on the left and a chat box and list of people on the right. The table listing shows the team \& player names at each table, as well as the board being played. There will be information about the number of kibitzers and whether there is audio/video commentary (a picture of a TV means there is). Click on a table to kibitz it.
At the table, you will see a hand diagram, and the bidding and play as it happened.
There is a chat window on the right of the screen. You can type chat into the chat window.
Some things you can do to get more information:
If there is an asterisk next to a bid, that means it was Alerted/Explained. Click on the bid to see the explanation.
-- "Rewind" using the slider underneath the "table." Move the handle to the left to go to earlier tricks.
-- Click on the "Scores" button to the left of the South player's name to get a scorecard for the match.
----Click on a board number to see the hand record and results at all of the tables.
----You can also click on a number in a yellow box to get to the hand record from some screens.
----In the hand record screen, click on a result to see the bidding and play at a specific table.
--In the upper left corner:
----Click on the yellow box with 4 little boxes to get the match scores for all the matches (that will be IMPs and for the Round Robin will not include scores from previous rounds).
----Click on the yellow box with 3 bulleted lines to get Cross-IMPs for the pairs (that will be just for this match).
The Scores information is also available in the lobby using the button at the upper right should you want to check on scores before deciding which table to watch.

## Timing of Deferral

The Round Robin matches will be deferred until each round is completed.
The first half KO matches will be deferred for half an hour or until each board has been played at all tables, so there may sometimes be a period when nothing new is being shown because one or two tables are very slow to play the board. For the second half of the KO matches, the delay will be until the quarter is scheduled to be completed, so players will not be able to get useful state of match information. That means that the 3rd quarter kibitzing will start at 6:25 EST.

Steve Zolotow called attention to this hand from the fourth round of play on Friday.

His opponents must have wondered what was going on when he alerted his Pass and typed, "14-17!"

In Zolotow's words, "With a solid 16 HCP, I typed our NT range into the self alert box as 14-17. Then I inadvertently (ed. Note: probably thinking since he'd clicked at all that he'd bid), clicked Pass!!! By the time I realized my misclick, the bidding had proceeded P P P 1H. I doubled for takeout, since a 1 NT overcall as a passed hand wouldn't be natural."

Steve's opponents, apparently undeterred by the explanation of his pass or his subsequent T/O double, carried on to bid a 4H game!

Steve was afraid to double for fear that this might be interpreted as looking for a sacrifice at favorable vulnerability.

4 H went down four undoubled.
Steve says, "It should have been down 5, but my partner was so shocked by the proceedings that she discarded a cashing club when I drew trumps. Our teammates eked out a small plus in 2D at the other table."

Steve led the CA followed by the CK which was ruffed by declarer. Declarer cashed the HA and played the H5 which Steve won with his ten. Steve cashed his king and jack of hearts. He exited his hand with a club to Tebha's queen. Tebha cashed her high club and played a diamond to Steve's king. While Anam was wondering well before this point why Steve hadn't opened, remember that she was unaware that he had alerted his Pass as 14-16! All's well that end's well for the Tebha team...

I would like to have been a fly on the wall for the post mortem! 10 IMPs to Tebha

## WHY ENGLISH IS SO HARD

It is not surprising that with only 34 combined HCP, ten North/South pairs missed the grand slam.
On the other hand, it is always surprising when more than half the field bids a grand no matter how many points they hold!

It was easy for Clerkin and Hinton to bid to 7H in the Bishel/ Bacon match. Hinton opened the South hand 1C showing $16+$ on his 15 . Clerkin, looking at 19 of his own, took six rounds of bidding in which he established hearts as the strain of choice and asked for keycards.

On a non-diamond lead, hearts is a better grand than NT because declarer has the option to ruff out the club suit if the jack doesn't fall in three rounds. On a diamond lead, one of dummy's entries is removed and both NT and hearts depend on a favorable lie in clubs. There are squeeze possibilities in NT but they exist in hearts as well.

# Hot and Spicy Chicken Breasts 

## Ingredients

## MARINADE

- $1 \mathrm{lb}(454 \mathrm{~g})$ boneless, skinless chicken breasts
- 2 tsp (10 g) soy sauce
- 1 tsp ( 5 g ) dark soy sauce
- 1 tsp (3 g) cornstarch


## SAUCE

- $1 / 3 C(75 \mathrm{~g})$ ketchup
- $1 / 4 \mathrm{C}(59 \mathrm{ml})$ chicken broth
- 1 Tbsp ( 15 g ) chili garlic sauce
- 1 tsp (4 g) sugar
- 1 Tbsp ( 15 ml ) vegetable oil
- 1 fresh jalapeño, seeded and cut into thin strips
- 8 sm dried red chilies
- 1 med red bell pepper, julienned
- $1 / 2$ med onion, thinly sliced

## MARINADE

Rinse chicken, pat dry and cut crosswise into $1 / 2$-in ( $13-\mathrm{mm}$ ) wide strips. Place in a bowl with remaining marinade ingredients, stirring to coat. Let stand 10 minutes. Make sauce by combining all sauce ingredients in a small bowl and mixing well. Place a stir-fry pan over high heat until hot. Add oil, swirling to coat sides. Add fresh and dried chilies and cook, stirring constantly, until dried chilies begin to brown, about 15 seconds. Add chicken, bell pepper and onion and cook, stirring constantly, until chicken is no longer pink in center, 2-3 minutes. Remove dried chilies if desired. Add sauce, stirring to coat. Bring to a boil, remove from heat and serve hot with rice or Chinese noodles.

- Prep time: 10 minutes.
- Cook time: 4 minutes.
- Makes 4 servings.

## Ingredients

- 1 C (152 g) dried cherries
- 1 C (152 g) dried cranberries
- $1 / 2 \mathrm{C}(96 \mathrm{~g})$ sugar
- $3 / 4 \mathrm{C}(177 \mathrm{ml})$ water
- 1 Tbsp (15 ml) lemon juice
- $1 / 2 \mathrm{C}(118 \mathrm{ml})$ orange juice


## Directions

Combine all ingredients in a medium saucepan and bring to a boil over high heat. Reduce heat; simmer 15 minutes. Transfer to a food processor; blend until mostly smooth (mixture will be thick). Cool to room temperature, place in an airtight container and refrigerate; lasts up to 10 days.

## Cream of Chantereelle Soup with Argula

## Ingredients

- 2 tsp ( 10 ml ) olive oil
- 1 Tbsp ( 13 g ) onion, finely chopped
- $1 / 2 \operatorname{tsp}(1.5 \mathrm{~g})$ garlic, minced
- $8 \mathrm{oz}(227 \mathrm{~g})$ fresh chanterelle mushrooms, sliced
- $1 \mathrm{tsp}(2.6 \mathrm{~g})$ flour for dusting
- 2 Tbsp ( 30 ml ) white wine
- $3 ½ \mathrm{C}(828 \mathrm{ml})$ chicken broth
- $1 \mathrm{C}(236 \mathrm{ml})$ heavy cream
- $4 \mathrm{oz}(113 \mathrm{~g})$ baby arugula
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 tsp (1 g) fresh chives, chopped


## Directions

In a medium saucepan, heat olive oil and sauté onion and garlic until transparent, about 4 minutes. Add chanterelles; sauté an additional 3 minutes. Sprinkle in flour; add white wine and chicken stock, stirring to combine; simmer 30 minutes. Stir in heavy cream; simmer another 5 minutes. Add arugula and gently fold in, cooking until just wilted. Season with salt and pepper and serve in pre-warmed bowls garnished with chives.

On Board 15 of the last set yesterday, Kevin Rosenberg took advantage of the opponents' bidding to make a vulnerable game thinking it through by turning an odds off play into an odds on play.

Platnick opened the South hand 1C showing 16+ HCP. Cynthia Huang doubled for the majors and John Diamond passed showing 0-5 HCP. Kevin jumped to 4S. Platnick led the DA and switched to the CK. Kevin
ducked and Platnick cashed his DK. The CJ followed to
Kevin's ace. Kevin cashed two rounds of spades ending Platnick led the DA and switched to the CK. Kevin

Since South had not bid any natural suits, Rosenberg did not know South's distribution. He did, however, know that South showed 16+ HCP. Once North played the SJ, South could not get to 16 HCP without the HK. Rosenberg led a spade to dummy and led the HQ. When North followed small, Kevin backed up this thinking by rising with the HA and was rewarded when the king magically appeared.

At other tables, South opened 1D and rebid 3C revealing their distribution. Two declarers decided that South needed the HK to justify bidding freely at the three level. Both Ifty Baqai and Joel Wooldridge played as Kevin did and succeeded.

It is only fitting that on Sabbath, those who applied the Rabbi's Rule were rewarded!

It isn't often that one sees a Board where five tables passed the hand out and two tables bid the vulnerable 3NT game North/South!

In fact, NT was played at some level from North or South seven times. It was played at some level from East or West thirteen times!!

Below are the two tables where 3NT was bid and made:


At the first table, it is unclear why Eric Xiao accepted his partner's 2NT invitation since his 11 HCP would seem minimum.

On the other hand, Eric is a junior and juniors are known to be aggressive and optimistic. Eric was certainly right on this hand. David Yang led the ST, Eric winning Weinstein's king with the ace. Eric played a diamond to the ace and finessed against the DJ, Yang winning his king. Yang played the C8, ducked to Eric's queen and Eric played a club to the king and ace. Weinstein cashed his two high clubs and exited the S8 to Eric's queen. Eric had two high spades, two high diamonds, and one high heart to claim nine tricks... contract making!

11 IMPs to Xiao when Jeff Xiao and Victor Xiao played 1NT E/W going down two at the other table in this match. Their opponents never took a call:

The other table where 3NT was played N/S was in the Tebha/ Greenspan match. Anam Tebha was declarer. At the table, 3C was explained as "forced," however, 2NT was not explained as being a "force" so it appears there was a glitch in the bidding. Like the hand on page 5 where Zolotow had the lucky(?) misclick, Tebha/Zolotow again landed on their feet.

Brod led the ST, Tebha winning her ace. Tebha played a diamond to the nine, losing to McDevitt's jack. McDevitt returned a spade which Tebha won in hand. She played the DQ; Brod covered with the king and dummy won his ace. Tebha played a club to her queen and cashed the jack and another spade. She cashed the DT and another diamond and played a heart to the ace. With nine tricks in the bank, she scored up the game, conceding the last three tricks to East/West.

Melody Bi and Alan Watson were the only pair to reach 6 H on Board 68 in the $7^{\text {th }}$ round. Most North players chose to open 2 H or Pass in first seat. With seven or eight losers and a mediocre suit, the North hand does not meet everyone's conventional requirements for a vulnerable three-level preempt.

Melody chose to be aggressive. With no real defense, going down 800 against the opponents' vulnerable game would not be a disaster.

Watson assumed that his hand could easily provide six winners. Watson calculated that slam would have a play so long as there were not two quick losers. Accordingly, he bid 4NT (RKC) and when Bi showed one keycard, he jumped to the slam.

Yiji Starr led her singleton spade. Bi won the SA and played the DK. Starr won the ace and played a heart, won by dummy's king. Declarer led a club to her king and trumped a diamond in dummy. Bi had the CA on which to discard a diamond. She trumped a club, drew the remaining trumps and claimed 12 tricks for +1430 .
13 IMPs to Rasmussen
Looking closely at this hand, it first appears that a trump lead might present a problem in 6 H . But since the clubs divide $4-3$, declarer can win the trump in hand, cash the CK and cross to dummy with the HK to cash the CA and trump a club. A spade can follow for a second club ruff and declarer still has twelve tricks without trumping a diamond in dummy.

Of course, this assumes that declarer chooses to play for the club break rather than attacking spades.
