Hospitality Suite

Because of Covid, we won't be able to provide the full, wonderful hospitality we have in the past, but we will do what we can.

Hosts Evvie Gilbert and Maya Alela for the Open and Women's and Julie Arbit and Christian Jolly for the Mixed and Seniors will be in our usual hospitality suite (Room 2321). They will provide grab and go breakfast and lunch each day'

Breakfast: From 8-10 am. There will be individually packaged cereal, fruit, hard boiled eggs, bagels, and surprise treats. Also individual butter, jam, peanut butter, and cream cheese, as well as condiment packages. They will be making coffee and will have individual packages of sugar, sweetener, and dairy & non-dairy creamers. For those of you who prefer Keurig coffee, that will also be available in the hospitality suite. We are limiting access to 6 players at any one time, so we ask that you come to the suite, pick up a large to go container and put the smaller packages in that to take with you as quickly as you can, and then go someplace else to eat. **Masks that cover your nose & mouth must be worn in the Hospitality Suite at all times.** There will be a hand sanitizer station near the door and we encourage you to sanitize your hands before choosing what to take.

Lunch: From 2-4 pm (the first half of play each day ends at 2:35; we encourage those of you who are sitting out the 2nd quarter to go early). There will be a main dish (sandwiches, chicken, maind dish salads, pizza) as well as individually packaged tuna salad, green salad, cheese, fruit, and berries. Also all the individual packages of add-ons we have for breakfast. Water and soft drinks will be available in refrigerators.

Let us know what you want: If there is a menu for a future day's lunch hanging on the wall outside the Hospitality Suite, please mark what you want, so we have a better idea of what to order.

Playing Rooms & Player's Break Room

We will have bottled water in the playing rooms and if there is a refrigerator in a playing room we'll stock it with soft drinks.

We wil also have bottled water in the Player's Break Room (1321), as well as soft drinks, nespresso, some packaged snacks, and some fruit.

Masks that cover your nose & mouth must be worn in the Player's Break Room at all times, so you may not eat and drink in the room.



General Face-to-Face Tournament Information to Players

The USBF Board of Directors met earlier this week and confirmed:

1. Face-to-face play in Schaumburg will be with 2 players per room.


2. Players will not be required to get Covid tests, but will be provided with information about where they can be tested (in Woodfield Mall) if they want to be. Staff will be tested approximately once a week.

3. We will comply with the Illinois mask requirements, which currently require masks in public areas indoors. Our default will be for both players in the playing rooms to wear masks, but if the 2 players in a room agree on a different rule we will allow whatever they agree on, assuming that is in compliance with the Illinois requirements.

4. We will ask each player to sign a Covid-related waiver of liability form before they start play. Jan will be sending the text of the waiver to all of you in the next day or so, and will have printed forms in her office (room 1321) at the Hyatt for participants to sign.

5. Hospitality will be limited - "grab & go" breakfast and lunch will be distributed in our usual hospitality suite (room 2321), but everyone will have to go someplace else to eat. We will allow only 6 players in the suite at any one time. The suite will not be open for socializing at other times. We will have water, soft drinks, coffee and snacks in the Players' Break Room (1321), and there also, we will limit the number of people in the room at any one time. Eating in the Break Room is not allowed. Masks will be required in the hospitality suite and in the Players' Break Room.

6. There will be air purifiers in each playing room and in 1321 and 2321.



KIBITZING ON LOVEBRIDGE

You can follow the USBC on the <u>https://vugraph.lovebridge.com/</u> website. The stream is delayed; go to the schedule below for starting times for each segment.

Popcorn time!

Do you want to listen to commentary? Search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentary. If it doesn't do anything, no one is commenting.

Nail biting!

Do you want to be deeply involved? Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into four small screens – two of them showing the two tables of the match you choose, the other two having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can also personalize the content in all your windows. (The 2x2 view is not available on mobiles.)

Think together!

When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do and see whether your chosen player agrees.

More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner the arrow takes you the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is also a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

Replay:

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board then the same buttons move you through list. Push every button and enjoy!

KIBITZING SCHEDULE FOR THE KO (EDT)

"How to Get the Most from Kibitzing on the site"

The Austin NABC will be held as scheduled.

After much consideration, the decision has been made to move forward for the <u>2021 Fall North</u> <u>American Bridge Championships</u> scheduled for Nov. 25-Dec. 5 in Austin.



While we are excited to bring players back to the bridge table, we will still approach the tournament with an abundance of caution. We will hold the event as carefully as possible to protect the health and safety of players, volunteers and staff. Because of this, meetings and other large social gatherings outside of gameplay will be very limited (details are available on the <u>Austin NABC website</u>). We hope to hold these events during NABCs in 2022.

All NABC attendees, staff and volunteers must be fully vaccinated to attend the Austin NABC and have face masks properly worn when present in the tournament areas. We have procured VOW Digital Health to manage the verification process for vaccinations. Further details on all health and safety requirements are available on the Austin NABC page of our website

Please do not attend the Fall NABC if you are not prepared to follow the safety protocols. They are in place to protect all attendees, and no exceptions will be made.

Mask Rules

Attendees are required to wear a mask that covers their nose and mouth in all public areas in the hotel. That means the hotel lobby, corridors, and elevators, as well as the Hospitality Suite and the Office/Players' Break Room, where masks must be worn at all times. Therefore, there is no eating or drinking in those rooms.

Our attorney has told us that the Cook County Mask Mandate forces us to require masks in the playing rooms. Therefore, we have adopted the following policy about that:


Masks are required in playing rooms. If you are observed not wearing a mask in a playing room, there will be a 2 IMP penalty for the first offense in a segment, a 4 IMP penalty for the second offense, an 8 IMP penalty for the third offense, and a 16 IMP penalty for the fourth and subsequent offenses; however, if you and your opponent agree to something other than both wearing masks, any IMP penalties for not wearing a mask will apply to both of you equally and there will be no other penalties. You may remove your mask briefly to eat or drink. However, if you call for a director (for any reason), and you are not wearing a mask properly when the director enters the room, the penalty will apply to your team for your next match in the event. There is no eating or drinking in the playing room when the Director present.

In addition, anyone who is penalized more than twice (over the course of the entire event) in situations where his/her opponent was wearing a mask while s/he wasn't, or where the director was called, may be subject to additional conduct penalties.

You should bring masks to the tournament with you; we will not be supplying masks.

Covid Waiver

We are going to ask each player in these events to sign a COVID-19 Waiver of Claims. It is being sent to you by email and you may sign it electronically and return it to Jan (<u>marteljan@gmal.com</u>) or you can sign a printed waiver at the site. Waivers will be available to sign in room 1321 starting Oct. 5th at 9:00 am. **Everyone is required to sign the form before the start of play!**





Meet the Players

Alan M. Sontag (born 1946) is a world champion American bridge player and author of bridge books.

He has won the Vanderbilt Cup three times (1972, 1988 and 1999), the Reisinger Trophy in 1973 and the Spingold Trophy in 1980, 1982 and 2000.

Other victories in the NABC + category include winning the Men's Teams in 1971 and 1979; the Life Master Men's Pairs in 1971; the Life Master Pairs in 1977; the Men's Swiss Teams in 1985 and 1987; the Master Mixed Teams in 1989; the Grand National Open Teams in 1994 and the Open B-A-M Teams in 2001.

Although he is a six-time world champion in contract bridge, winning the prestige Bermuda Bowl twice, Sontag is best known as the author of *The Bridge Bum*, a book "on everybody's list of the top ten bridge books ever written."

Besides his aforementioned highly acclaimed book, Sontag has written "Power Precision" and is co-author of "Improve Your Bridge Fast.

Among his other victories are the Rosenblum Cup, Transnational Open Teams, Senior Bowl, numerous North American Bridge Championships, and twice winning the London Sunday Times and Cavendish Invitational Pairs.

In 1973, he and Steve Altman became the first American players to win the Sunday Times Pairs, at the time the premier invitational tournament in the world. Two years later, Sontag returned to London and won the tournament again, this time with Peter Weichsel, with whom he formed one of the strongest partnerships in the world from the 1970's until 2005.

The two were partners in 1983 in Stockholm, Sweden, when the United States defeated Italy in one of the most exciting finals in the history of the event.

Sontag returned to the final of the Bermuda Bowl in 2001 in Paris, France to help Rose Meltzer become the first woman ever to win that championship.

He also won the Buffett Cup in 2012.

Sontag was inducted into the American Contract Bridge League (ACBL) Hall of Fame in 2007.

Widely regarded as one of the fastest players in the world, he is known by his nickname Sonty.

Sontag and his wife, Robin, live in Gaithersburg, Maryland with their son Robert.

He was elected to the Hall of Fame in 2007.


Alan is playing in the Senior USBC in partnership with David Berkowitz and is a member of the Gupta team.

On Board 6, most of the East/West pairs bid and made the 4H game.

In Cappelli/Levine there was a 10 IMP swing when Cappelli/Bitterman stopped short of game.


Bitterman passed the East hand in first seat. (Some Easts opened 1D.) Levine passed in second and Cappelli opened 1C. Passell passed. Bitterman responded 1H, and Levine, holding a smattering

of values and four cards in spades doubled. Cappelli showed a four card heart raise. Passell threw in a 2S bid and Bitterman bid 3C to show a double fit. Cappelli, even knowing his partner did not hold more than a singleton spade based on his opponent's bidding, was not dazzled. The delayed T/O double combined with the free call of 2S made it sound like his opponents had values. Cappelli bid 3H and played it there, taking 10 tricks.


At the other table, Wold also passed the East hand in first seat. Brenner passed and Meckstroth opened the West hand 1 nebulous diamond. Wold responded 1H. Brenner passed.

Meckstroth raised to 2H and Wold made a game try with clubs. Meckstroth, not hearing any competitive bidding from the opponents, easily bid the vulnerable game.

Brenner led the SQ. Wold lost two off side club tricks to the ace and queen and a club ruff to South to bring in 10 tricks.

Things became more interesting starting on Board 10 where in every match, 3NT made in one room and went down in the other! Every match swung 12 or 13 IMPs


To succeed, declarer has to get the heart position correct. In Gupta/Kahn, Zia, South, was on lead against Eric Robinson. Zia, like three others, led the H6. Robinson played dummy's 4; Garner played the nine; and declarer won the jack. The H6 is a very telling card for declarer. Once Garner's nine fell, the only holding to include the queen and the six from which one could lead would be Q86. There are no logical four card holdings from which one would lead the six.

From what combination did Zia lead? If not from Q86, the six could easily be second from top in a weak four card holding, leaving North to have started with Qx. If this is true, the hand is cold.

Robinson played a spade to the ace. At this point, he needs to cash the HK! When the queen drops, he will have four hearts, four clubs and the spade ace for nine! Instead, Robinson tried a small spade which Garner won with the king. Garner played a diamond to the ace; a diamond to the jack. His DK and D9 cashed and declarer was down one! 12 IMPs to Gupta





Questions asked by Players in the Open and the Mixed... FAQ's from Jan Martel

Chat

• *My physical keyboard isn't working!* Make sure to click/put focus into the chat box before attempting to type in the box. (The blinking cursor makes it seem as though focus is there, but it may not be.) This seems to only occur with an external keyboard, not the virtual keyboard.

• What does that number on the left side mean? You have unread chat message(s). Click on left gray arrow to open chat and right gray arrow to close the chat. (If you actually type and send a message, the chat will close automatically. Reopen with left gray arrow.)

• *Why can't I chat to my partner?* For security reasons, chat to partner is not available while cards for a new hand are on display. Since there is no "between round down time," there is no real partner chat.

Bidding

• **The system won't let me pass!** If you have the level (1 through 7) highlighted, you will be unable to pass/double/redouble. Click on the highlighted numeral to remove the highlight, then make the desired call.

• **My explanation keeps disappearing!** If you alert your bid as you make it but go back later to explain, there is a bug in the system where subsequent table actions will erase any text that you have typed into the explanation box. If you include your explanation with your call or when it is your turn to act, then this will not occur. (We have reported this issue to LoveBridge.)

• Where is the undo button? While there is no undo button, every call made is followed by a brief cancellation time period. A cancel button will appear immediately below the call selected in the top center portion of the screen. If you cancel within the time period, your bidding panel will reappear for you to select the intended call. If you do not cancel within the time period, summon a director (hit red TD whistle) to request an undo.

Play

1. Why can't I click on a card? The default setting for LoveBridge is neither a tap/click nor a double tap/click. The default setting is a drag-and-drop motion where the player pulls a card to the gray box in the center of the screen and releases to play the card. If the "pulled" card is not the intended one, the player can drag it back to the hand and select another card. We recommend this setting while players are getting accustomed to the system. Players may change this setting to double tap/click if desired, but we strongly discourage single tap/click settings.

2. Whose turn is it? In the bidding or play of the hand, the player's direction letter (N S E W) will be white inside of the circle when it is the player's turn. This is a very subtle change from the normal pale blue letter.

3. *How do I claim?* During the play, you may click the larger red box <u>below</u> the TD whistle to claim. If the claim button is grayed out (not available), you either already contributed a card to the current trick or you are dummy.

How do I see the bidding once play has started? A player is not entitled to the entire auction once they have played to trick 1. If you have not yet played to trick one, the auction will be in the lower left corner. Click on it to enlarge to the center area. Click the double gray arrows in the bottom right of the center area to send it back to the corner. Similarly, this is how a player may see the cards from the previous trick (prior to playing to current trick).





It is not surprising that three declarers went down in 4S after a trump lead. It takes careful play to succeed.

In Bramley vs Simson, Bramley led the S2. Casen won the queen in dummy, played the CT and Woolsey won his king. Woolsey exited with the ST and Casen won the ace. The C5 was ruffed in dummy and Casen was doomed. He cashed the HA and ruffed a heart, cashed the SK, and played a diamond to the ten. Woolsey played a heart to Bramley's queen and Bramley played a club to Kit's ace. The CJ was cashed and the contract finished down two. 2 IMPs to Bramley

Jeff Roman, in Lewis vs Beatty found the best line and brought home the game. Linda Lewis led the S5. Roman won the king. He played a small club to the ten, losing to the king. Paul Lewis played back a spade, Roman winning his jack. A club was ruffed in dummy and the HA was cashed. A heart was ruffed and the SA pulled the last trump. Roman played the C7 to Paul Lewis's

ace! (the key play!!)

Seven of the eight declarers played 4S in their 4-4 fit; Two made four and five made five. The spade position combined with the heart position leaves declarer with two sure minor suit losers and a possible loser in the wash.

At the outlier table, Passell and Lair journeyed into 3NT. Lair opened a 14-17 NT. Passell bid Stayman. Lair showed 4 hearts but did not deny 4 spades. Passell jumped to the no-trump game, expecting Lair to correct if he held four spades. Lair passed!!

Les Bart led a diamond. Lair could win the diamond in hand, cash one high spade getting good news when the queen dropped, play a club to the queen and rely on the heart finesse for nine tricks. (four spades, two hearts, two diamonds, and one club) Instead, Lair won the diamond in dummy and played a club to the TEN!! This lost to the jack and a diamond came back. Lair won the diamond with the queen in hand and played the CK to knock out the ace. Gloria Bart needed to win the ace and play a diamond to her partner to defeat 3NT. She ducked!! Lair still did not see the value of the spade play. Instead, he continued clubs. Gloria won her ace and led her last diamond to Les. Contract failing by one!

13 IMPs to Cappelli

Limey Jack...

Hallo from the right side of the pond. You Colonials just keep going. Limey Jack is honour bound to continue letting you know the best way to shake a bob or two loose from the punters. Howie Dung simply cannot get out of his own way.

In the Seniors USA1, there are but four squads remaining. One of them will survive.

Gupta-Lewis: Gupta has Zia so Lewis will need to play a perfect set to stand a chance. Lewis has the slight edge in partnerships, but Zia has Zia. He and Limey Jack will hoist a pint but not for a bit as yet. Lewis will have to find another way home.

Simson-Levine: Levine has the four horsemen but they are ripe for the upset in spite of getting a withdrawal as Limey Jack accurately predicted. Simson is humming along with the precision of the about face of Her Majesty's Guards. Simson in a close match.

In USA2, there are 4 teams at this moment. Some will get knocked out and the other three semifinalists will join them. There is no clear favourite.

Cappelli-Bramley: Bramley lost a tear jerker whilst Cappelli was shamed. Form will prevail here as Bramley seeks to get back to the title round. These are aged blokes playing four handed and time will take its toll, but for now Bramley will be cheesed off to go home. Cappelli uses their air tickets soon.

Beatty-Kahn: Two nondescript sextets, but Beatty has slightly more petrol in its tanks.

Give us a bell when you have further need of Limey Jack's winning strategies.


You're playing the Seniors, The final event... How many days and dollars you've spent!

Four teams remain in USA1. Not much more time until it be done.

Already Mixed 2, Lewis should share. I'm picking Gupta by only a hair! Levine's showing signs of coming back strong. They will trounce Simson and move right along.

> Now for the teams in USA2. Certainly Bramley is way overdue!

Beatty v Kahn is tougher to choose. Either could win and either could lose!



In Kahn v Beatty, Beatty will rule. It'll be close... a formidable duel!

> On Board 41, four pairs bid 4H but only one brought home 10 tricks. The three that failed played the hand from North and East consistently found the killing lead of the CJ. (In order for the defense to collect two clubs, one diamond and one spade, it is important to get clubs going quickly.)

> Steve Beatty played the hand from South. John Stiefel was never going to lead a club from the AQ74. John led the D9. Beatty won and played a heart to the ace

followed by a spade to the 9 and king. Steifel continued diamonds. Doub won the king and shifted to the CJ. Stiefel won the ace and continued clubs but it was too late. Beatty won the king in dummy and played a spade to the queen. He ran the H9, played a heart to the king, and claimed 10 tricks!
