## 2024 USBCs Kibitzing - There will be delayed kibitzing for all of the 2024 USBCs on LoveBridge

You can follow the USBC on the https://vugraph.lovebridge.com/ website. If you get to the voice commentary and there is no sound, you need to "unmute." When you first get to the page, there is a small icon of a speaker in the middle of your screen with an $x$ on it. Click there to unmute. If you miss that icon, move your cursor to the bottom left of the screen and you should see a something like this:

Click on the speaker to unmute.
Vugraph is delayed for 30 minutes or until all tables have completed play on a board, whichever is later.
Kibitzing Schedule (EDT)
For all KO days of the 2024 USBCs, kibitzing times will be :
Segment 1: 11:30 am EDT; Segment 2: 1:45 pm EDT
BREAK
Segment 3: 5:00 pm EDT; Segment 4: 7:15 pm EDT
For Round Robin days, each kibitzing segment will start 30 minutes after play starts. No voice for RR's. To listen to commentary, search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentators. If it doesn't do anything, no one is commenting.
Deep Involvement: Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into 4 small screens -2 of them showing the 2 tables of the match you choose, the other 2 having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the $2 \times 2$ view you can personalize the content in all your windows. (The $2 \times 2$ view is not available on mobiles.)

## Think together!

When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do.

## More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner, the arrow takes you to the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

## Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

## Replay:

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board, the same buttons move you through the list.

## 2024 USBCs Hospitality

We are returning to our pre-pandemic hospitality, with the hospitality suite (room 2321) open most of the day for socializing, Vugraph, and snacks. We will be providing breakfast and lunch each day of play. Marie-France Benoit will be our lead hostess, with help from Jacob Morgan and Julie Arbit, who makes the best guacamole. If you're at the tournament and can volunteer to help with hospitality (pick up items at Costco or nearby stores or restaurants, preparing food) please let Jan or Marie-France know.

Breakfast: From 8-10 am. There will be the usual breakfast food: cereal, bagels, toast, salmon, fruit, juice, coffee and tea. For those who prefer Keurig coffee, that will be available. So long as the suite doesn't become too crowded, you are welcome to eat there. No masking requirement.

Lunch: On the first four days of each event we will be serving a buffet lunch in a hotel banquet room, usually the Slate and Cyan rooms at the front of the hotel; we will have signs in the Player Break Room and Hospitality Suite with daily location. The hotel will be supplying what they do best: salads and chips. We will be bringing in 2 or 3 hot dishes from a local restaurant each day. There should be enough room for you to eat in the hotel banquet room, but you are welcome to take food from there to an outside table or to your hotel room. Lunch will be served from about half an hour before the morning session is supposed to end until about half an hour after the afternoon session starts.
After the first 4 days of each event, lunch will be available in the hospitality suite at the break. There will be a main dish (sandwiches, chicken, main dish salads, pizza) as well as tuna salad, green salad, cheese, fruit, berries, cookies or other desserts. Water and soft drinks will be available in refrigerators. As with breakfast, you are welcome to eat in the hospitality suite unless it is too crowded.

Let us know if you have specific needs. Our hosts will do their very best to accommodate you.

# World Bridge News ... 

Article by Al Levy ... continued from the past 2 Daily Bulletins... World Computer Challenge 2016 The Final...

## The final

It was Wbridge 5 versus Micro Bridge for the title.
With just two boards to go, Wbridge5 overcame a 17 Imps deficit. At one table, Micro Bridge went down one in $3 \%-\mathrm{N}$, for -100 .
At the other table, as in Figure 4 a , after the opening bid 10 , E-W cashed their three outside winners, $\propto \mathrm{A}, \stackrel{\mathrm{A}}{\boldsymbol{*}} \downarrow \mathrm{K}$. While this was not the best order of winning the three outside winners, it appeared that there was still a trump loser for down one, and the end of any chance of WBRIDGE 5 coming back. However, appearances are deceiving as WBRIDGE5 perfectly executed the rarely seen Devil's coup, or the disappearing trump trick, to make the contract: winning the club return; pitching the $\uparrow Q$ on the remaining high club; ruffing a club; ruffing a spade; ruffing a diamond; cashing the $\uparrow \mathrm{A}$, pitching a club; ruffing a spade; returning the $\uparrow 9$ and overruffing East's $\vee \mathrm{J}$ with the $\downarrow \mathrm{K}$; and finessing West's v. +620 and 12 Imps.

On the last board, with Micro Bridge up by 5 Imps, Wbridge 5 needed to make its 3 NT contract to take the title.

Opening lead 4 , see Figure 4(b). A diamond opening lead or return when N-S first gets in is needed to defeat 3NT. The spade lead was won by the king and a club was ducked to South. This sets up the club suit, assuming a 3-2 break, and retains an entry to cash the spade ace. South, in with the club ten, had one last chance to return a diamond, but returned a low heart, which would be right if declarer had the diamond queen and mis-guessed the heart position. Wbridge5 went up with the king and now had nine tricks and 10 Imps , overtaking Micro Bridge at the last to take the title.

## Meet the Players



Eddie Wold can do it all. He is one of the few to have won a gold medal for an open event (the World Transnational Teams in Paris), a seniors' event (World Championships in Bali), and a women's event (non-playing captain of the US Olympiad team in 1996). Eddie has also won 15 national championships, many with George Rosenkranz, who will be celebrating his 100th birthday later this year, but his favorite national championship is winning the Silodor with his life partner, Bob Morris.

Eddie is one of the top professional players, frequently playing with sponsors, as his easy-going temperament makes him a great partner. When he does play with pros, he's had enriching partnerships with Mark Lair, Mike Passell, Geoff Hampson, and Marc Jacobus. Although he has been very fortunate to have so many great partners in his life, Eddie acknowledges Paul Soloway for helping him understand the deeper parts of the game.

Eddie was also involved in two of the most unbelievable events in bridge history. In July, 1984, while he was playing in the Spingold with George, George's wife (and Eddie's bridge parent) Edith was kidnapped and held for \$1 million ransom by another bridge player. Even though his team won the Spingold and came in second in the national mixed teams, it was one of the worst weeks of his life. Fortunately, she was recovered unharmed and

the perpetrators were caught. Then, in 2013, Eddie identified that the "German Doctors" were coughing at unusual times in the Senior World Championships. Further investigation led to the cracking of their code, and their banishment from top-level play.

For his many achievements at the bridge table, Eddie was elected to the Hall of Fame.

Eddie grew up in Houston, Texas, and went to Rice University for college. He learned bridge by total chance when asked to be a fourth as he was walking into the mess hall there. He told them he didn't play, and they didn't care. He was so totally taken by the game, he took a 3-year sabbatical before finally getting his degree in mathematics. Later in life, Eddie returned to Rice as a professor ... of bridge! He was responsible for getting accreditation for a course on bridge, and taught there for two years. His wonderful experiences teaching novices at Rice spurred him to take on a mentoring role in the ACBL Junior program. Under his tutelage, many juniors have gone on to represent the US in international competitions and participate in the ACBL Junior Bridge Camp.

Outside of bridge, Eddie is also talented at table tennis -he played seriously for four years before he got bitten by the bridge bug. Other hobbies include tennis, skiing, piano, and movies.

Eddie is playing in this event as a member of the Simson team.

# Playing Procedures Reviewed For Those Arriving for the Mixed, Seniors, Womens 

You will be playing on Chromebooks using LoveBridge software. The Chromebooks all have wired mice, which you may choose to use or not. They also have touch screens if you prefer that, and of course integrated keyboards. You will not be able to go to any websites other than the LoveBridge playing site from the playing room Chromebooks.

There will be 2 players in each room, one from each team in the match - North \& East together and South \& West together. All of the NE rooms are on the first floor; all of the SW rooms are on the second floor.

Because some of you have said that you prefer the opponents' system information on paper in addition to being available on the Chromebooks, we are asking each player to bring a copy of their SSF, convention card, and if relevant the ACBL Multi defense to the table for their opponent. If you need help printing anything, come to room 1321 before you play and one of us will print for you.

After you have finished a segment and scored with your teammates, please check the score on LoveBridge and if you disagree with it, come to room 1321 and so we can sort it out.

Captains:
Your lineup sheet been shared with you. If you can't open it, or don't understand something about it, please let us know.
For the first segment of play each day, the Away team (the team that does not have seating rights for the segment) should tell the Home team their lineup (by email, text, or an entry on the lineup sheet) no later than 8:50 am ( 70 min utes before play starts), and enter the lineup on their lineup sheet no later than 9:00 am. If you enter your lineup on the lineup sheet before 8:50 am, that will satisfy both requirements. The Home team should give the Away team its lineup by $8: 55 \mathrm{am}$, and should also enter it on the lineup sheet no later than 9:00 am. Of course, if the Away team doesn't communicate its lineup on time, the Home team has more time.

We ask you to enter the lineup on your lineup sheet because that may be the easiest way to give your lineup to your opponent. If you leave your lineup page open on your computer or other device, it will automatically update with the opponent's lineup when they enter it. Also, especially for the first segment of the day, there are often players who come to the office asking where they're supposed to sit and if the lineup is on the lineup sheet, we can direct them.

For subsequent segments, you need only notify each other of your lineups (10 minutes before the start of the segment for the Away team, 5 minutes for the Home team), although you are welcome to enter the lineup on the lineup sheet in case one of your players doesn't know where they are supposed to sit and comes to ask us.
