



2024 USBCs Kibitzing - There will be delayed kibitzing for all of the 2024 USBCs on LoveBridge

You can follow the USBC on the https://vugraph.lovebridge.com/ website. If you get to the voice commentary and there is no sound, you need to "unmute." When you first get to the page, there is a small icon of a speaker in the middle of your screen with an x on it. Click there to unmute. If you miss that icon, move your cursor to the bottom left of the screen and you should see a something like this:



Click on the speaker to unmute.

Vugraph is delayed for 30 minutes or until all tables have completed play on a board, whichever is later. **Kibitzing Schedule (EDT)**

For all KO days of the 2024 USBCs, kibitzing times will be:

Segment 1: 11:30 am EDT; Segment 2: 1:45 pm EDT

BREAK

Segment 3: 5:00 pm EDT; Segment 4: 7:15 pm EDT

For Round Robin days, each kibitzing segment will start 30 minutes after play starts. No voice for RR's. To listen to commentary, search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentators. If it doesn't do anything, no one is commenting.

Deep Involvement: Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into 4 small screens – 2 of them showing the 2 tables of the match you choose, the other 2 having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can personalize the content in all your windows. (The 2x2 view is not available on mobiles.)

Think together!

When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do.

More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner, the arrow takes you to the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

Replay:

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board, the same buttons move you through the list.

2024 USBCs Hospitality

We are returning to our pre-pandemic hospitality, with the hospitality suite (room 2321) open most of the day for socializing, Vugraph, and snacks. We will be providing breakfast and lunch each **day of play**. Marie-France Benoit will be our lead hostess, with help from Jacob Morgan and Julie Arbit, who makes the best guacamole. If you're at the tournament and can volunteer to help with hospitality (pick up items at Costco or nearby stores or restaurants, preparing food) please let Jan or Marie-France know.

Breakfast: From 8-10 am. There will be the usual breakfast food: cereal, bagels, toast, salmon, fruit, juice, coffee and tea. For those who prefer Keurig coffee, that will be available. So long as the suite doesn't become too crowded, you are welcome to eat there. No masking requirement.

Lunch: On the first four days of each event we will be serving a buffet lunch in a hotel banquet room, usually the Slate and Cyan rooms at the front of the hotel; we will have signs in the Player Break Room and Hospitality Suite with daily location. The hotel will be supplying what they do best: salads and chips. We will be bringing in 2 or 3 hot dishes from a local restaurant each day. There should be enough room for you to eat in the hotel banquet room, but you are welcome to take food from there to an outside table or to your hotel room. Lunch will be served from about half an hour before the morning session is supposed to end until about half an hour after the afternoon session starts.

After the first 4 days of each event, lunch will be available in the hospitality suite at the break. There will be a main dish (sandwiches, chicken, main dish salads, pizza) as well as tuna salad, green salad, cheese, fruit, berries, cookies or other desserts. Water and soft drinks will be available in refrigerators. As with breakfast, you are welcome to eat in the hospitality suite unless it is too crowded.

Let us know if you have specific needs. Our hosts will do their very best to accommodate you.

Playing Rooms & Player's Break Room

We will have bottled water in the playing rooms and if there is a refrigerator in a playing room we'll stock it with soft drinks.

We will have bottled water in the Player's Break Room (1321), as well as soft drinks, Nespresso, some packaged snacks, and some fruit. Please keep your voices down in the Break Room where we are working.

Masks will be required in playing rooms **only if your screenmate asks you to wear one**. You do not have to put on a mask when you summon a director or ask for coffee, water or an escort outside to smoke.

At a meeting of the WBF Executive Council on March 9, 2024, the following decision was taken concerning the participation of Russian and Belarusian bridge players in WBF events:

- No Russian or Belarusian players may participate in WBF National Representative events. Such
 events include WBF Zonal events that qualify for a WBF National Representative event.
- Russian and Belarusian players may participate as individuals in Transnational events provided the following conditions, in line with the IOC eligibility conditions published on December 8, 2023, are met:
- Players who actively support the war will not be eligible to be entered or to compete. Support
 personnel who actively support the war in Ukraine will not be eligible to be entered or to
 compete.
- Players who are contracted to the Russian or Belarusian military or national security agencies will not be eligible to be entered or to compete.
- Players may not display any text, colours, flags, or other attributes identifying them as Russian or Belarusian.
- All other existing eligibility criteria for participation in WBF events apply. The Executive Council notes that, at writing, Belarus is not a member in good standing of the WBF and therefore Belarusian players are not currently eligible to participate in WBF events in any capacity.

This decision applies with immediate effect and stays in effect until further notice. WBF Executive Council

Katz/Nickell did well to bid the spade game after a strong NT opener with both sides vulnerable.

Greco's 1NT showed 15-17. Levin's 2D showed hearts. Katz, doubled showing his long diamonds. When Greco took the transfer, Nick effectively raised diamonds. Levin called 3H and Katz, judging well, jumped to the spade game.

Greco cashed his CA and HA and continued with the HT. Katz ruffed, pulled trump and claimed ten tricks.

Levin had a tough decision in the auction. Would 5H be a good save at All Vul? Was 4S even making?


Levin thought a long time for someone who wanted to go out and smoke! He was truly tempted to bid, however, in the end he went quietly.

Meet the Players

Bart Bramley (excerpted from an interview with the *Ontario Kibitzer* in 2021): I have been lucky to play with many great players. My first truly great partner was **Lou Bluhm**. We played from 1984-1990, when Lou died of pancreatic cancer. He was 50. He was totally unflappable, steady as a rock. He showed me what a serious system looked like. Until then my partnerships didn't have notes, or they were just a few pages – most of what I played was simple enough to keep in my head. Lou had 75 pages of notes. And I hated most of it, but since he had done the work, I figured I ought to learn it.

My next great partner was **Hugh Ross.** We became great friends when Hugh was captain of my team the only time I played in the Bermuda Bowl, in 1991 (Yokohama), but we were not a great partnership! Hugh had won the Bermuda Bowl several times in the preceding decade, playing with Peter Pender. We played for a few years starting in 1992. Though we both tried to make it work, we didn't mesh.

In 1995 John Sutherlin fixed me up with **Sidney Lazard**, and we played regularly until 2008. Sidney was the greatest man I've ever known. He taught me many things bridge. One was the importance of voids. Until then I thought voids were like singletons, but a little better. Sidney insisted they were a LOT better, and he was right. Sidney had a reputation as a wild man, but he was a devoted "bridge scientist" at heart. However, his wildness was uncanny. He didn't take as many shots as most people thought, but his percentage of success was phenomenal. My greatest thrill in bridge was winning the Blue Ribbon Pairs with Sidney in 2002, when he had just turned 72. We played great throughout the event and drove from behind at the very end to win.

Another great partner was **Lew Stansby**. We had been friends for decades when we won the Senior World Championship together in 2007 (Shanghai), but we didn't become partners until a few years later. The greatest lesson I learned from Lew was about composure. In Shanghai, during the round-robin, my screenmate accused Lew of coffee housing him when Lew was declarer. I became incensed and made a stink. A director was needed to calm things down. Afterwards Lew told me never to do that again, because it upset him. As luck would have it, we drew the same team in the quarterfinal of the knockout stage. Early in the match a different player on the team accused us of hosing him on defense (he had gone down in a trivial contract). I remained stoic as the opponent had his say with the director, who gave him nothing. We blew out that team and I learned a good lesson.

My current partner is **Kit Woolsey**, with whom I have played regularly since 2017. We have been friends for almost 50 years. I have adopted many aspects of "Kit Standard," such as very loose weak two-bids, and suit preference at trick one against suit contracts, both of which seem to work out far better than I had previously thought. Kit and I have been teammates off and on since the '70s, and we both love to go over the hands in detail; if you like doing that, it's best to do it with your partner.

Bob Hamman is another player I've known for almost 50 years. We first played together in the Open Swiss Teams on the final weekend of the 1990 Nationals (Fort Worth). And we won the event. (Both Bob and I have multiple National wins with first-time partners.) We didn't play together again until 2003, when I moved to Dallas to work for Bob at his company, SCA Promotions. Despite his persona as a nononsense, down-the-middle player, I learned that he is actually a mad scientist. He has never met a convention that he couldn't improve. Eventually I had to put my foot down to prevent the system from changing every time we played. And I know that's OK, because Bob can still win with anyone, any time, playing any system. He has a legendary reputation for his powers of concentration and compartmentalization," and it is well-deserved.




Good Start to Day 2 of the Quarterfinals...







Aaron Jones in Fleisher/Bailey played 6C really well to bring it home.


