As the cards lie, 7D is cold. Nosatzki/Nathalie did very well to bid their vulnerable slam with both opponents in the auction.Migry was faced with a difficult decision at the six level. Did her 5H bid force them to bid 6D ... or were they bidding it anyway? Clearly, Migry made the right choice. She took the save, went down four for -800 and lost 4 IMPs... still, she lost ONLY 4 IMPs. The making slam would have cost much more.

Nathalie's splinter worked much better than Chorush's cuebid. Nosatzki now knew partner had a really great hand ... same as the cue... AND also knew partner could cover at least two heart losers. In order to have enough for the splinter, East had to have spade cards, therefore, it was right to bid the low high card slam.

## Vugraph

The 2012 USWBC will be covered on BBO Vugraph starting with the Semi-finals. We hope to cover all 4 tables in play in the Semi-finals and both tables in the Finals. To watch the Vugraph online, go to the BBO website where you can either log on directly from your browser, go to "Vugraph" and choose which table to watch, or download the BBO software to run BBO on your computer. If you choose the latter approach, after downloading, install the software on your computer, log on, follow the directions to become a BBO member and you'll be magically transported to the Lobby of the largest bridge club in the world. Click on the button labeled VUGRAPH and you'll be able to choose which of the matches you want to watch.

There will often be a "yellow" user on BBO called USBF. If you have general questions, please ask USBF, not one of the hard-working Vugraph Operators, some of whom may not have time to respond to private messages. Thank you.

Each day's schedule is the same (these are Chicago times; to see the times for your timezone, go to the BBO Vugraph schedule site)
$10: 30-12: 45$
$1: 00-3: 15$
$5: 15-7: 30$
$7: 45-10: 00$

All of the teams will play the same boards, but for security reasons, if one match is sufficiently behind that we have to start it later than the other one, we will not start the Vugraph broadcast until both matches have started play.

After a session, you can review the Vugraph action on our Web Vugraphs, which show each hand played with a link to bidding and play records. Take a look at the events currently available to see what we'll have for the 2012 USWBC. Web Vugraphs are posted within about half an hour of completion of the Vugraph show.

There are 7 teams in the Round Robin. Teams will be numbered in Seeding Point order.
Order of Play on June 2nd is opposite to that on JUNE 1st.

EVERY PLAYER ON EACH TEAM MUST PLAY AGAINST EACH OTHER TEAM

Last two matches on June 2nd are segregated, no comparisons, no substitutions in closed room. Because this means there can be no seating rights for those matches, there are no seating rights in the first two matches on June 1st.

## Practice Makes Perfect!

You are West on the following deal from a recent online U-21 USA2 team practice.

Partner leads the 7 of clubs.
Declarer plays the 3 of clubs from dummy. You win the ace and declarer follows with the 10 .

How do you proceed?
Assuming declarer holds five or six good spades, you almost certainly need partner to hold the ace of hearts to defeat four spades. Partner certainly would have led a high diamond if he held the AK.

If partner holds both red aces and a doubleton club, you may have three red winners to cash and you must cash them before they go away on dummy's clubs. This of course assumes that declarer has two or more hearts. On the other hand if partner does not hold the ace of diamonds, you need partner to hold a singleton club.

There is no foolproof play on this hand. But, it appears that playing the heart king at trick two is your best shot. If this holds (and you must hope it will), partner will either encourage you to continue hearts or tell you to discontinue hearts ... in which case, a club ruff is likely. If he discourages you and you give him his ruff, he will know to cash a red ace to defeat the contract.

The only time playing the king of hearts backfires is when partner holds a singleton club and declarer holds a singleton heart. In that case you need to return the 9 of clubs and get a heart back for a second club ruff.

Arjun Dhir, a member of the USA2 Under-21 team, sitting North, declared this hand.
When Arjun's opponent switched to a low heart, he could no longer be defeated.
Barry Crane's Rule \# 5 was right: "Sevens are Singletons."

A week ago Wednesday, the Meltzer squad opted for online practice.
Mohan led the jack of spades against 3NT. Larsen won the ace. He played ace of clubs, king of clubs; Smith pitching the encouraging H7 (odd/even); and a club ... Mohan winning while Smith pitched the spade deuce.

Mohan did what he believed partner wanted. He switched to the heart ten. Larsen ducked; Smith won his king and reverted to spades.

It was too late to do damage. Declarer had two spades, two hearts, one diamond, and four clubs for certain. As the cards lie, once Smith pitched a heart, the contract made four when the five of hearts became Larsen's tenth trick.

From the bidding and lead, Smith could assume that declarer held four hearts. If he discarded the discouraging H2, East/West might have succeeded in defeating the contract on a diamond shift. They would have collected three diamonds, one club, and one heart.

Making 4NT was worth 8.4 IMPs in the IMP Pairs.
Congratulations to Kyle Larsen... not so much on this hand, but on his upcoming induction into the Hall of Fame!

And while we're on the subject, it must be said that not only is Kyle being inducted into the Hall of Fame, but Jan Martel, Chief Operations Officer of the USBF and chairman of these Trials, is being awarded the Hall of Fame Blackwood Award.
