## Vugraph

The 2012 USWBC will be covered on BBO Vugraph starting with the Semi-finals. We hope to cover all 4 tables in play in the Semi-finals and both tables in the Finals. To watch the Vugraph online, go to the BBO website where you can either log on directly from your browser, go to "Vugraph" and choose which table to watch, or download the BBO software to run BBO on your computer. If you choose the latter approach, after downloading, install the software on your computer, log on, follow the directions to become a BBO member and you'll be magically transported to the Lobby of the largest bridge club in the world. Click on the button labeled VUGRAPH and you'll be able to choose which of the matches you want to watch.

There will often be a "yellow" user on BBO called USBF. If you have general questions, please ask USBF, not one of the hard-working Vugraph Operators, some of whom may not have time to respond to private messages. Thank you.

In the Sprung/Joel match, both tables reached 7S from North after North opened 2NT.
In the Open Room, Debbie Rosenberg, North, received the lead of the diamond jack (Rusinow). She drew trump and got a partial count on the hand before cashing the club ace and losing the finesse.
If declarer uses her best efforts, she can reach a three card end position where she knows that one player holds three clubs and the other holds one heart and two clubs. It does not appear that she can determine which hand is which... therefore making the 2 -way finesse a complete guess.
In the Closed Room, Pat Norman... actually sitting South... held the North cards because the Board was placed on the table upside down. Pat guessed the club queen correctly.
Pat's partner, Georgiana Gates, pointed out that this was fortuitous for the team since she did not want to play the grand and might well have gotten it wrong! Destiny? Kismet? In this editor's opinion: YES!

At all four tables in the USWBC, the auction was identical and a high heart was led against the spade game. Three out of four declarers made their contract. Migry demonstrated great declarer skill when she executed a well thought-out endplay to do it.
Both Disa and Migry won the heart, drew two rounds of trump and exited a heart. East at both tables won the heart and played ace and a diamond.
Migry won the diamond, ruffed a diamond, led a club to the ace and trumped the last diamond. She now led a club and East was endplayed. Contract making...
Disa apparently believed that East would have six hearts for her 3H call. Disa won the diamond return, ruffed a diamond and immediately played ace and a club, leaving East with a diamond exit for down one!
In the Sprung/Joel match, at both tables, the first four tricks were the same.
When Levin was East, she won the heart and immediately switched to the CQ hoping to set up two tricks and avoid the endplay.
Sprung cashed the ace of diamonds and followed with the queen of clubs.
Four spades making a both tables.
As played by Migry, the contract was always cold.
It seems it may be best to duck the opening heart lead, win the heart continuation, lead a spade to your hand and lead a diamond toward dummy. You need the DA onsides to have any chance. This line of play will succeed as the cards lie... and also win against some other positions where trumps are not 2-2 and a partial elimination is necessary.

The auctions shown are from the Sprung/Joel match.
It is incredible to think that Sprung never bid on her 6-6 in the minors. It is more incredible when you realize that in the other match, Breed did not bid on it either! (Mildred explained that she was afraid would not work out that she held the minors after her opponent's 1D opening.)
Sprung and Glasson were chagrined when they realized that they were cold for six of a minor and had failed to double six spades, collecting only 300 of the 800 possible. Imagine their surprise when they found that they'd won 11 IMPs on the board.

In the Moss/Westheimer match, Judy Radin, East, overcalled 2C after North opened 1D. Eventually she bought the contract for 5C doubled and making.
In the other room, Breed's opponents took advantage of her silence and bought the contract in four spades. This is cold.

Glasson proved herself fearless when she opened four hearts Vul against not opposite a passed hand partner on the West cards. On the other hand, bidding close vulnerable games is the best way to win at IMPs.

The king of diamonds was led at both tables.
Both declarers ruffed the opening king of diamonds lead and played the ace and king of hearts felling the queen doubleton in North's hand. Both declarers took the spade finesse and when that lost, they claimed 10 tricks.

This hand is a good example of how weak no-trumps can be effective.
In the Open Room, Migry opened 1D and Spung was able to get a leaddirecting 1 H bid on the table. It was a great time to overcall the four card suit. A heart is the only lead to give the defense a chance. On any other lead, declarer has a quick pitch on the king of clubs. The Rabbi's Rule is the only cure... but sadly for Stansby, the finesse was the percentage play. Down one for -100 , losing two hearts, one diamond, and one spade.

In the Closed Room, Bernstein opened a 12-14 NT. Given the absence of information, Moss chose the nearest thing to a trick and led the ten of diamonds ( 0 or 2 higher). Her partner needs as little as the queen to make this lead potentially right. Wheeler ducked it to her queen, and facing a quick pitch of a diamond or heart loser, gave up on the trump finesse in favor of laying down the ace and taking the discard, guaranteeing ten tricks. She was well rewarded when the singleton king fell offside. She made her game with an overtrick.

Everyone loves a double game swing!
In the Closed Room, Wheeler led the HA against the spade game. Little did she know she should have underled it...not for the club ruff, but to avoid establishing the HQ for the discard of a diamond. Wheeler continued hearts to her partner's jack, declarer ruffing. Radin played a spade to the king and ruffed another heart. She was ecstatic when the king popped. She had improved her chances by $50 \%$. Instead of needing both the CK and DA right, she could shed a diamond on the HQ and only need the CK with North. Indeed that was the position and 4H succeeded.

In the Open Room, Glasson led the singleton king of spades against 4H. Sprung overtook and cashed the spade queen. She did her best at this point. She led the deceptive ten of diamonds. Having no alternative play, Stansby took the finesse. The ace of hearts, a heart to the jack, and the king of hearts followed. A diamond to the ace brought down the king and Stansby could run winners till Glasson ruffed in with her good queen of hearts.

Eddie won his ace and continued hearts to Mark's ten, unfortunately for the Lynch squad, establishing declarer's nine in the process.
With the spade finesse pretty well marked on the auction, Smith won the fourth round of hearts, knocked out the diamond ace (noting the lucky fall of the ten), and collected nine tricks... amazing!
Meanwhile back in the Open Room, Sutherlin, less imaginative than Smith, passed the 3C call. This had no chance. Pollack led a spade which was won in dummy with the jack. Passell cashed the ace of clubs and played the jack to Pollack's queen. Pollack gave Feldman a spade ruff, separating their trumps. Feldman cashed two hearts and the defense waited patiently for their ace of diamonds and their ten of clubs... down two.
