I give a lesson on preemptive bidding and then call off a hand. The class divides the cards. The South hand is supposed to have seven hearts, but North winds up with the 7 hearts and 20 cards and South winds up with no hearts and 6 cards. South calls me over and says: "Mr. Kantar, I have never seen a hand like this before." But she is happy because she likes to count points for short suits. North, on the other hand, is having trouble holding on to all 20 cards and they are falling over the place. But North is even happier than South because North likes to count extra points for long suits. I finally had to tell them what happened.

Wife holds her bosom before her husband leads. He wants to lead a diamond, but when he sees her holding her bosom, so he leads a heart. A diamond lead would have set the hand. He asks her why she was holding her bosom. She says: "I wasn't holding my bosom, I was trying to show a bust!" (Some of the other stories are better than this!)

Howard Shenken never made a hand in a Truscott column. They were not on such good terms. Ditto with Stayman and Goren. In the Goren columns, a 2C response to 1NT was never referred to as Stayman. It was always 'the two club convention'. In a beginner's class I had a lady who when playing a hand was afraid to lead any suit that didn't have the ace. Finally, she had to lead up to a KJ combination and was petrified. I tried to explan to her that if she though the ace was to her left to play the king and if she thought the ace was to her right to play the jack. Finally, finally she leads up to the KJ and is afraid to play either one. I said: "Play whichever one you want, but just tell me what you are hoping for." "O.K I'll play the king. " Great, and what are you hoping for?' "I'm hoping they make a mistake.

This one fellows loves to psyche, but his partner has his fill and tells him that from now one he is going to fine him 20 dollars every time he psyches. The 'psycher' agrees and everything is going along just fine until the psycher winds up playing against a guy he hates. The psycher is the dealer. He says to his partner: " By the way, here's the 20 dollars I owe you, one spade!"

## The Grand Finale ... Nickell vs Diamond ... "Element"ary!

This hand represents the second 21 IMP swing of the Championships. Yesterday Bramley/Stansby went down 2000 in a freely bid grand to create the same swing (see reference in Limey Jack's colum in Saturday's bulletin.)

Here, seven spades is an aggressive, but reasonable spot. Both North/Souths bid it despite preemptive interference by the opponents.

Both Wests led high hearts: Katz led the king and Diamond led the jack. Both Souths won the ace in dummy, discarding diamonds from hand.

If spades split 2-2, declarer can draw trumps, cash the ace of clubs, and then play ace of diamonds and a diamond to the king. If both opponents follow, declarer simply trumps a diamond and returns to dummy in trump. If both opponents fail to follow, he falls back on the club finesse.

If spades are 3-1, declarer must guess the position of the spade queen at trick two. If he guesses correctly, he may still need the club finesse.

Stevie Weinstein, faced with a double jump by Diamond, assumed that West held at least seven hearts. This caused him to play for the spade queen to be in Platnick's hand on his right. Accordingly, he cashed the ace of spades. When the queen fell singleton on his left, he had no choice but to hope for either the queen/jack doubleton of diamonds or the club finesse. Since neither of these positions existed, the grand slam failed by a trick.

In the other room, Katz preempted only two hearts, likely giving Hampson cause to think hearts were 6-6 in his opponents' hands.

At trick two, Hampson played a spade off dummy to his king, felling the singleton queen. He was now able to save the spade ace as a dummy entry. He still had a decision to make. If RHO had a singleton diamond, he needed to draw trumps and take the club finesse. He chose to play for 3-2 diamonds. He cashed the spade jack and tested diamonds. When that worked, he scored up his doubled grand slam.

Two diamonds made easily in the Closed Room, declarer losing three diamonds, one heart and one club. Katz didn't overcall and hearts never came into play.

In the Open Room, however, Greco overcalled one heart. Rodwell bid a fitshowing jump in clubs, showing diamonds and clubs and a limit raise or better.
Hampson, liking his hearts and his singleton diamond, pushed to the game.
It was all on the opening lead... and who wouldn't lead a diamond?
Rodwell led the diamond deuce to the ten, king, ace. Greco took two quick pitches of spades on diamonds... and eventually lost one spade, one club, and a trick in the wash. It matters not whether Meckstroth puts up his diamond king. With spades $3-3$, Greco can take one pitch, ruff a diamond, and play a spade from dummy. The best the opponents can do is to shift to trumps. Greco can win the trump in dummy and lead another spade. If RHO returns another trump, Greco must insert the nine from his hand in order to ruff a spade in dummy if trumps are not $2-2$. He can then exit dummy with a club safely and claim.

The first three bids were the same in both rooms.
When it got to Katz, he decided to put his opponents' feet to the fire. He leaped to six diamonds before they had any idea of what fits they had.

Nickell laid down the dummy with the two best cards in the world: the ace of hearts and the jack of clubs. It was all he had and all he needed! Katz took 12 tricks for 1370 .

In the other room, Greco bid only five diamonds on the North cards. Now Meckstroth had a chance to compete with five hearts on his distributional hand with both majors.

When it came back around to Greco, he bid the diamond slam, but it was too little too late. Rodwell knew he had a heart fit and he took out insurance, bidding six hearts.

Meckstroth lost the expected three tricks and went quietly down two for -200 .

Rodwell overcalled his four card heart suit over Greco's nebulous diamond opening. Hampson bid one spade and Meckstroth, with five trump, skipped the bidding to the level of game. Greco had nothing extra. He passed and they defended four hearts. Hampson led a club against four hearts and Rodwell lost the obvious four tricks: one in each suit for -50 .

At the other table, Moss did not think of overcalling one heart. He passed; Nickell responded one spade, and Bathurst made a takeout double. Katz bid two spades and Moss now jumped to four hearts. Nickell had a distributional hand that rated to play well with two good fits so he bid four spades. Moss doubled in the pass out seat and Nickell played in four spades doubled.

It was not a masterpiece of defense. Bathurst led his heart ace. When that held, he switched to the diamond king. Nickell won the ace and played a spade to the ace to lead the heart jack. Moss covered and Nickell ruffed. Nickell played another spade felling trump. Moss led his diamond jack and Nickell claimed 11 tricks for +690 .

Had Bathurst switched to a club instead of the diamond king at trick two, declarer, like his teammate in the other room, would have lost a trick in each suit for down one. As it was, score 12 IMPs for Nickell.

Greco made five clubs on the lead of the diamond ace. After the hand, he and Hampson were lamenting the fact that they could make slam in spades. Meckstroth offered, "I'll take a push on the board."

Unlikely he feels that way now!
In the other room, his teammates bid to the slam in clubs. It goes down on a diamond lead, however, Diamond chose to lead a small heart from his KTx.

Weinstein won the heart queen and quickly claimed.
