Against 5C, Hampson led his singleton heart ace and followed it with a spade to his partner's ace. Greco gave him a heart ruff. Hampson led a diamond and the contract failed by two tricks.

At the other table, there was the chance for brilliance. Meckstroth led the heart ten against 3NT. Rodwell won his ace and found the diamond shift. Bathurst ducked and Meck won his king.

He was at the crossroads. If he finds the spade ace, the contract is defeated a trick before declarer gains the lead.

Alas, he continued diamonds and Bathurst came to two hearts, three diamonds, and five clubs... making four! 11 IMPs to Diamond

At both tables, East led his singleton spade. Meckstroth played safe for his game and made four.

Greco had a lot of work to do to make the slam... and he needed some luck. Indeed, the cards were perfectly placed and he brought it home.

He won the opening spade in hand with the king. He immediately finessed the club king, and when that won, he pitched a diamond on the club ace.

He wasn't out of the woods yet. He still needed the trump finesse and needed to be able to trump a spade in the dummy. When all of that worked he claimed his slam and 13 IMPs.

Thanks to Suzi Subeck for doing the newsletters and Peg Kaplan for taking great photos.


We hope you all had a wonderful time and will return next year to compete for USA2.

Kevin Bathurst demonstrated excellent declarer technique to bring home this tough 4H contract. He took advantage of the bidding to work out all of the right plays.

Meckstroth led the club queen (Rusinow). Kevin won and trumped a club. Now, he made a key play. He led a diamond to his king, probably assuming that if Meckstroth held KQ of clubs, ace of diamonds and a spade honor or two, he would have opened the bidding on a hand containing nine or ten black cards. Bathurst continued with three rounds of spades trumping the third round in his hand. Next he trumped a club in dummy and trumped dummy's last spade. Kevin exited with a diamond. Meckstroth won and returned a trump to dummy's ace. The third round of diamonds was led to Rodwell's ace. Eric returned a low heart.

Since, Meckstroth had already shown 8 HCP in the other suits, Bathurst reasoned that Jeff probably would have opened the bidding on a 5-2-2-4 eleven count. Kevin played the queen of hearts and scored-up 4H, winning 10 IMPs.

In the other room there was no E/W bidding and declarer did not time the hand as perfectly.

Hampson decided to open an off-shape/off-strength 2NT (19-21HCP). He did have good spot cards and his singleton was a king. Greco bid Stayman. When Hampson showed spades, Greco set trump and made a slam try with his 4H bid. Hampson signed off, but Greco pressed on with Keycard Blackwood. When Hampson showed two without the queen of spades, Greco realized slam in spades would be, at best on a finesse for the queen of trump and an even trump division. There was a chance that this finesse and/or break would not be needed in no-trump. Possibly his diamond suit would provide the needed tricks. Greco backed his thinking with his jump to 6NT.

Katz led the H8, which Hampson won in hand with the king. He led the DK which was ducked around, followed by a club to the board and a second diamond. If Katz wins this trick, the count is rectified and Hampson will simply

play off his diamond, club and heart winners squeezing Katz in diamonds and spades. Katz recognized the position and ducked again!

Hampson ran his club winners on which Katz pitched a diamond and a heart. Dummy discarded a diamond followed by a spade and a second diamond. Now Hampson led a heart to dummy and Katz was forced to discard his remaining small diamond. Hampson had a perfect count, but did not know the position of the spades honors. He exited dummy with a diamond.

Katz won the diamond and played the jack of spades. While it is true that an expert would usually play the jack from Jxx and the queen from Qxx, those plays carry some risk that partner has QT or JT doubleton. Hampson reasoned that Katz would always play an honor from QJx. He won the ace of spades in his hand and finessed Katz for the queen of spades. Making 6NT and gaining 11 IMPs.

In the other room, Weinstein opened 1C and jumped to 2NT after Levin responded 1D (usually a five card suit). The spade fit was found and a slam try was made. When, South bid Keycard Blackwood and discovered he was missing the queen of trumps, he settled for bidding 5S.

Greco made a good bidding decision, Katz defended well and Hampson's fine declarer play was rewarded.
