3NT by West is awkward; on a club lead you need to win the first or second club in order to block the suit - This is not so easy to do since if clubs are 5-3 and the spade ace is with South, you need to duck two clubs and win the third round.

But how can you get to the safer contracts of either 6D or 4S? Strong clubbers might manage it but anyone who opened the West hand 2NT had no real chance. Or did they?

The only pair who came came close had the methods - up to a point.

Dealer's sequence suggested 5-4 in the minors with a double heart stopper and a likely 2-2-5-4 pattern in the 19-20 range. Had responder risked 5C as a splinter, "Bob's your uncle!"

## FULL DEAL

This deal presented a lot of problems round the room. At the table shown above South passed, and the action came back to North who bid 5 H (which would surely have been right facing eg $\mathrm{xxxx} / \mathrm{Axxx} / \mathrm{Kxx} / \mathrm{xx}$ when both 5 H and 4 S might be making.

4H can be defeated on a club lead. Even if declarer goes after trumps at once, the defenders have the communications to play two more rounds of clubs to promote a trump for down one. That was the result in the other room, but 4 S is down 500 and it is my contention that South should double here, with two tricks on defense and no points in partner's suits. Since 5Hx went down, 300 the pass swung 19 IMPs out!

Did you find the double based on your strong diamond/spade holding?

4. The five friends, in no particular order, were Alan, the friend who estimated his area would get 80 inches, the friend who lived in Vermont, the friend who already got 2 inches of snow, and the friend who got snow on Thursday.

The new form of scoring presents the players with a different scenario from old fashioned IMPs. EVERY imp means something; one can't say 'a vulnerable undertrick doesn't matter at VP scoring'. It does.

You play 3NT as West after opening 2NT in fourth seat. The defenders lead and continue hearts, and the suit is clearly 5-3. North signals suit preference with the jack on the third round. You win and and run five rounds of diamonds. North pitches his low spades, then the spade queen. Your RHO pitches two low spades.

When you play the club ace and a second club North follows to both but no queen appears. Finesse or drop?

At the table most players finessed, unprepared to have their LHO own them for the rest of the match (it was board one of the match). I think the argument for playing to cash your eight winners is a strong one. Unless LHO is a world champion every card played in the hand thus far tells you the CQ is wrong and a victory point is a victory point.

Ed: Why did North signal his spade entry? On the auction, he knows that declarer holds most of the remaining high cards. If his partner gains the lead, he can likely figure out the spade shift. It's not $100 \%$ but sometimes it is the better part of valor.

My favorite deal of the day. At our table after a weak jump overcall from East, West saved in 4 Hx down 300 .

In the other room (auction above) Migry overcalled 1H and John McAllister found himself on lead to 5C after making a mixed raise.

The defenders might well lead ace and another heart. If they do, declarer will have to guess who has four clubs. He might work out to come to hand with a diamond and lead a club to the eight. An alternative line would be to lead a club towards the ten, playing West for a 2-5-2-4 pattern. However, the hearts rate to be 6-4 so West is likely to have the long clubs I think.

That is all theory: John put a spoke in declarer's plans when he led a low diamond at trick one! Now Josh Parker as declarer simply played clubs from the top as would we all. That was down one for a loss of 8 imps . Nicely defended!
