## Day Two of the Head-Ups ... Favorites Leading in Every Match ...



Latest word on the street is that "all expert players are playing 14-16 NT's and 13 is OK." For Diamond/Platnick, it was certainly not OK.

Hung led the heart six against 4NT. Diamond won his ace, led a diamond to the ace and claimed twelve unless the spade jack came down in three rounds and it did... so he took 13 for +720 .

At the other table, Watson and Feldman had a good auction to get to six diamonds. After Bathurst doubled 3C, Watson passed it back to Feldman to further describe his hand. Feldman jumped in diamonds; Watson showed his honor doubleton of spades; it went cue-cue and ended in the slam.

Moss led his club queen. Watson won in hand, pulled the trump, tested spades and claimed 13 tricks and 12 badly needed IMPs.


The Hung squad got lucky on Board 46.

In the Closed Room, Feldman opened an aggressive weak two in hearts on his five card suit to the QT. Watson cooperated perfectly and jumped to the game. Bathurst/Moss never even got into the bidding. Four hearts took a diamond ruff to defeat, but Moss was up to that early, leading ace of diamonds and a diamond.

While Hampson/Greco were in the "Open" Room, Hampson was still not persuaded to "open"!! Hung bought the contract at four spades and Greco doubled in the pass out seat. Hampson led his singleton club. Hung won in dummy with the king, unblocking his queen. He led a trump to the ten and lost to the jack. Hampson returned a heart. Hung won in hand and played another trump. Greco won his king and Hung claimed ten tricks... six clubs, two spades, and two red aces, losing only three tricks... all trump!

Migry opened a weak 2D on KQT64. McAllister furthered the preempt by raising to three. Berkowitz made the practical bid of six hearts. There was nothing to the play. Migry led the diamond king and Berkowitz claimed 13 tricks.

In the other room, there must have been conventional mayhem. Stark bid four diamonds keycard over his partner's 3C preempt. Pepsi doubled and Baseggio redoubled to show one keycard. Stark now bid four hearts as a queen ask. Baseggio responded four spades which made no sense... apparently the denying the queen which he held.

Had Stark known Baseggio held the queen, he surely would have bid the slam.
Four no-trump made 13 tricks but lost 10 IMPs.

What happened at Koneru's table bore no resemblance to reality. Three hearts was likely bid in desperation. Ekeblad doubled and no one ran. It was hopeless from the start. When the smoke cleared, the contract was defeated two tricks for -500 .

In the other room, things made more sense. Woolsey opened a truly LIGHT weak two in spades using multi. Stewart had a great hand for either major and drove to six spades.

Jacobus led a small club to Passell's ace. Woolsey had twelve tricks if he could bring home the trump suit. He took the normal play for th 2-2, but alas, the suit split 3-1 and the slam failed by a trick.

## The Vondracek Effect from Barry Rigal ... Visited and Revisited!

First noted in Bridge World over 40 years ago, the following deal may have owed a little to luck but it demonstrated very effectively how playing in the weaker of two trump suits can be critical.

Stansby's bids were shape relays. Bramley's 3 S call showed 2-5-3-3 distribution with 11-13 high card points. 4C initiated a slam invite in an unspecified suit and 5C showed clubs. Bramley's acceptance was based on general joie de vivre. But his instincts were perfect! His control meant 6C needed only clubs 3-2.

In the other room after $1 \mathrm{~S}-2 \mathrm{D}$, North/South played in 6D, which essentially needed both minor suits to behave - and today was not declarer's lucky day!

Barry might or might not remember this, but Sunday, March 10th, 2002, he wrote another article about the Vondracek Effect for the ACBL NABC Daily Bulletin in Houston. The hand is from the Open Pairs I.

The article follows:
"It was perhaps 30 years ago that the Bridge World published an article about when it was right to play the weaker trump fit than the stronger one. It was referred to as "The Vondracek effect."

5 C is a cheap save, but not if the major-suit games are not making.
As you can see, four spades has no play. Four hearts was not exactly laydown either, but Justine Cushing had no problem on the diamond ten lead.

The defense cashed two diamonds then shifted to the club king. Justine won and cashed the heart ace and heart king. Then she ran the spades to pitch the club loser while West impotently followed suit.

Note that four spades has no play on an early club shift. Even on a club lead, Justine can get two discards in time before West can ruff in."

Sometimes, it just isn't your day, Woolsey-Stewart had a fine auction to reach 6D. 1C showed $16+$ and the 1 S response showed $9+$ balanced. Woolsey's subsequent bids asked and Stewart was able to show his strength and shape. Once Woolsey diagnosed the 4-4 diamond fit, he keycarded and bid the slam. A spade was led and Stewart simply played for a 3-2 trump break. He led a heart to the ace and trumped a heart. He returned to his hand with a diamond and trumped a second heart. He cashed the king of trumps and got the bad news. Stewart's line of play seems best, but without a heart lead, the contract can be made. Declarer must guess the queen of trumps and run four rounds of spades. It appears that the five card end
position will be:


On the play of the last spade, West and North pitch hearts. If East pitches a club, declarer simply ducks a club and wins the last three tricks with the ace of hearts and two clubs. So East must pitch a heart. Now for the coup de grace, declarer leads a heart to the jack losing to East's queen. East is now end-played in clubs. Declarer will take the last three tricks with the AQ of clubs and the ace of hearts.
