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## Into the Quarterfinals ... Everyone Playing the Same Hands



Board 5 was a routine $7 / 5$.
At all but one table, East was declarer in 4S...

Only Nickell played at the five level after Dwyer's competitive five heart call. (Dwyer and Ekeblad are playing canapes and Ekeblad opened one heart on his four card suit, permitting them to find their heart fit.)

At five tables, the contract was doubled.
In all cases, it made five!
In modern style, many experts open hands with less than North holds here. Sometimes it gets in the opponents' faces and they miss a game or slam.

In this case, opening the bidding resulted in partner's making a less than

In Seligman/Fleisher, old-timers held the North cards and passed in first seat. As a result, no IMPs swung in that match.

In Nickell/Sherman, both Norths opened in first seat, but it was 1 IMP to Sherman when Dwyer forced his opponents to the five level.

In Fireman/Bramley, the auctions were identical and the result was identical.
Gordon/Diamond produced the most interesting result... especially given the other six tables. Hampson/Greco made six undoubled when Gordon chose the tricky underlead of his heart ace, which subsequently went by the wayside.

And, Sontag/Berkowitz made four undoubled when Moss led his singleton spade, ducked to Bathurst's king. Bathurst switched to the club ace, ruffed by declarer. Sontag cashed ace of diamonds, king of diamonds, and ruffed a diamond with dummy's spade seven, allowing Bathurst to overruff with his nine! That was 3 IMPs to Gordon.

East hand, Kranyak showed three-card spade support and later competed with 4D after Weinstein jumped to 4C. Wolpert converted to 4S and was defeated two tricks.

East has the only no-trump hand at the table. But, since hearts split 4-4, N/S can safety play the diamond suit to make 3NT! Pratap actually tried to play 3NT from North even though Hampson had overcalled 1NT in the East. Greco competed with 4C. Pratap could have collected 500. But when he passed, Gordon put him in four spades.

Four tables reached seven spades. Only one made it.
If trumps were one-one, the contract was a claim.
At three of the four tables, East bid Michaels over the opening one spade bid. Pepsi did not have that luxury since his opponents opened an unnatural, strong club.
Usually strong club systems are thought of great value for getting to the right contract. Here it went well beyond that.

Once Pepsi overcalled one diamond and Seamon bid two clubs, the hand was a read.

The opening lead was a club to the queen, king, ace.
Greco drew trump in two rounds ending in dummy. He played the ace of hearts pitching a club and ruffed a heart in case the king/queen of hearts was falling.
When that failed, Greco's only hope was for West to hold a doubleton diamond honor. He decided, based on the combination of Pepsi's overcall and the favorable odds, to play Seamon for either Tx or Jx.
He played the ace of diamonds, held his breath and played the diamond queen. Pepsi covered; Greco ruffed in dummy. When the ten fell from West, Greco trumped a club and took the ruffing finesse against the jack of diamonds, bringing home the grand.
Since the other table played in 6 S making, Greco gained 11 IMPs on this board for Diamond.

Weinstein/Levin did well to bid the grand on board 52. None of the other seven tables reached that level... several playing at the three level in no-trump... the others playing in one or another minor suit slam.

The opening lead was a heart. Weinstein won in hand and played a spade to the ace. He played the king/queen of hearts pitching clubs.

He led the four of clubs to the ace and trumped a spade. He led the heart ten. Passell ruffed with the six of diamonds; Weinstein overruffed with the seven.

At this point, he had his 13 tricks. He claimed on a high crossruff and gained 16 IMPs when the other table in his match played in 3NT.

Note that had the partnership bid only six diamonds, it would have been a gain of $12 \ldots$ but every IMP matters!
