Why IMPs don't always match what's on RealBridge:

We can't adjust the IMPs shown on RealBridge when a board has to be removed from play at one table and we assign a result based on the X-IMPs of the other table result. The IMPs shown here are the "real" result.

Why the VP scores in some matches do not add up to 20: When a team is penalized for something, their VP score is adjusted but their opponent's is not.

No pair reached the par result of +2220 N/S on Board 55.

It isn't often, though, that you see a traveler where all pairs played in the same strain (in this case, diamonds) at levels ranging from 4 to 7!!

Both pairs who bid the grand asked for aces (not keycards) and blasted to slam hoping it was right.

Migry and Rosenthal had an interesting auction where Andrew was able to show six cards in diamonds and five cards in spades... still, Migry signed off in game.

Clayton and Lall had a strange auction where Lall opened 1NT; Clayton transferred to spades; Michael Rosenberg doubled the transfer showing hearts; Lall passed denying three spades; Clayton showed a second suit in diamonds; Lall bid 3NT to play; Clayton made a slam try rebidding his diamonds and Lall turned it down by passing! Obviously there was a misunderstanding. Lucky for team Lall, their counterparts at the other table stopped in game so the swing was only 10 IMPs.

Watching online, Even delayed, Is the best way to see How a hand's bid and played!

To kibitz, go to **the RealBridge kibitzing website**, enter your name and click on Log In. Select event. After you select Kibitz JLall Online Teams #5, you will be taken to a lobby where you will see a list of tables on the left and a chat box and people in the lobby on the right. The table listing shows the team & player names as well as the board being played. There will also be information about whether there is audio/video commentary (a picture of a TV means there is). Click on a table to kibitz it.

There is a chat window on the right of the screen. Anyone can type chat into the chat window. **Some things you can do to get more information:**

If there is an asterisk next to a bid, that means it was Alerted or Explained. Click on bid for info. To "rewind" the play using the slider underneath the "table" with hand diagram, just move the vertical handle on the slider to the left to go to earlier tricks.

-- Click on the "Scores" button to the left of South's name to get a scorecard for the match. You can use this to get lots of information:

----Click on a board number to see the hand record and results at all tables.

----You can click on a number in a yellow box to get to the hand record from some screens.

----In the hand record screen, click on a result to see the bidding and play at a specific table. --In the upper left corner:

----Click on the yellow box with 4 little boxes to get the match scores for all the matches (that will be IMPs and for the Round Robin will not include scores from previous rounds).

----Click on the yellow box with 3 bulleted lines to get Cross-IMPs for the pairs (that will be just for this match).

The Scores information is also available in the lobby using the button at the upper right, in case you want to check on scores before deciding which table to watch.

TIMING OF DEFERRAL

The Round Robin matches will be deferred until each round is completed.

The KO matches will be deferred for half an hour or until each board has been played at all tables, so there may sometimes be a period when nothing new is being shown because one or two tables are very slow to play the board.

A great opportunity to see juniors in the USBF junior training program take part in an exhibiton match.

James Holzhauer (of Jeopardy! fame), and Zach Grossack will each captain a team. Commentators are international stars of the game, Larry Cohen and George Jacobs. They will comment live on RealBridge. You will be able to ask them a question in text or in video.

What system are they playing? All players are playing the same standard 2/1 system... but will they bid the same way? Once the players have settled on the team convention card, you will be able to see it online with one click.

How do you watch? Go to kibitz.realbridge.online ... No account is needed, just put your name in and join the event.

Harrison Luba: "I am 18 years old and my grandparents and great-grandmother taught me bridge at the age of 8 in South Carolina. I moved to Massachusetts when I was 12 and have played competitively ever since. I am going to be a freshman at Emory University in the Fall, planning to study chemistry."

Some Suggestions For Dining at Home Between Sessions! Pandemic Pleasures...

Perfect Deviled Eggs...

Ingredients

- 8 hard-boiled eggs, peeled and halved
- 1/4 cup mayonnaise
- 2 teaspoons dill pickle juice
- 1/2 teaspoon yellow mustard or Dijon mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon black pepper
- 1/8 teaspoon garlic powder
- 2 baby dill pickles, very finely diced
- 1/8 teaspoon paprika, optional, to garnish
- 4 strips bacon, optional, chopped and browned, for topping

Directions

Step 1

Cut the peeled eggs in half, lengthwise.

Step 2 Remove the yolks with a spoon. Set aside egg whites on a platter for later.

Step 3 Place the yolks in a medium mixing bowl.

Step 4 Mash the yolks with a fork.

Step 5

Add the mayo, pickle juice, mustard, salt, black pepper, and garlic powder, and mix together until creamy.

Step 6 Mix in the diced pickles.

Step 7 Add more seasonings to taste.

Step 8 Spoon a heaping teaspoon of the egg mixture into each egg half.

Step 9

Garnish the top with a generous sprinkle of the paprika and a big pinch of browned bacon bits.

Step 10 Serve.



Cheezy Tortellini

Ingredients

- olive oil, for greasing
- 2 cups marinara sauce
- 1/3 cup mascarpone cheese
- 1/4 cup fresh Italian parsley leaves, chopped
- 2 teaspoons fresh thyme leaves, chopped
- 1 pound cheese tortellini
- 2 ounces smoked mozzarella, thinly sliced
- 1/4 cup parmesan, freshly grated

Directions

Step 1 Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F.

Step 2

Lightly grease an 8x8-inch baking dish with olive oil.

Step 3

Whisk the marinara sauce, mascarpone cheese, parsley, and thyme in a large bowl until blended.

Step 4

Cook the tortellini according to the package directions until just tender, about 2 minutes.

Step 5

Drain the pasta and add it to the sauce, tossing to coat.

Step 6

Transfer the tortellini mixture to the prepared baking dish.

Step 7

Top the mixture with mozzarella and parmesan.

Step 8

Cover the baking dish and bake until the cheese melts and the sauce is bubbly, for about 30 minutes.

Step 9 Serve hot.



Coffee Cake

Ingredients

For the cake:

- 2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup butter, room temperature
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 (8 ounce) container sour cream

For the streusel:

- 1 cup walnuts, optional, chopped
- 2/3 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 2 teaspoons vanilla

Directions Step 1 Preheat the oven to 325 degrees F. Step 2 In a bowl, whisk together the flour, baking powder, baking soda, and salt. Set aside. Step 3 In a large bowl, add the eggs, sugar, butter, and vanilla. Step 4 Beat the wet ingredient mixture until it begins to come together. Step 5 Add the dry ingredients. Mix until just moist. Step 6 Add the sour cream. Mix until smooth but be careful not to overmix. Step 7 In a bowl, mix together the walnuts, the brown sugar, sugar, cinnamon, and vanilla. Step 8 Spray a 10-inch tube pan with baking spray. Step 9 Spoon 1/2 the batter into the bottom of the pan, spreading it until even. Step 10 Sprinkle it with about 1/2 of the streusel. Step 11 Add another layer of batter and another layer of streusel to the tube pan. Step 12 Bake for 40-50 minutes. Step 13 Cool completely before serving.





King Nupe of the kingdom Catan dotes on his two daughters so much that he decides the kingdom would be better off with more girls than boys, and he makes the following decree: All child-bearing couples must continue to bear children until they have a daughter!

But to avoid overpopulation, he makes an additional decree: All child-bearing couples will *stop* having children once they have a daughter! His subjects immediately begin following his orders.

After many years, what's the expected ratio of girls to boys in Catan?

Solution

Each baby born is as equally likely to be a boy as a girl. Therefore, the ratio of girls to boys must be 1:1. It's as simple as that—honestly.

You might be tempted to solve this problem in a more complicated way. Suppose there are N child-bearing couples. Half of them will have only 1 child: a girl. Half of the other half (or N/4) of them will have two children: one boy and one girl. Half of the remaining quarter (or N/8) will have three children: two boys and one girl. And so on...

In this generation, the total number of children can be found from an infinite geometric series:

N + *N*/2 + *N*/4 + *N*/8 + *N*/16 + ...

The sum of this series is 2N. Since there will be exactly N girls (1 per couple), girls are 50 percent of this generation!

Now, you might point out that it's impossible for families to have, say, 20 or more children, in the event that they keep having boys. (And, if not impossible, certainly undesirable!) The calculation above might change if King Nupe allows couples to keep their family sizes to a more manageable level.

But even with those restrictions that may lead to more complicated math, the conclusion will always be the same: The ratio is 1:1 as long as each baby born has an equal chance of being a girl or boy.

Meet the Players



Fred Schenker has been a successful bridge player for years. He lives in Pittsburgh, PA, and is playing in this event as a member of the Reynolds team.

In 2010, Fred played with Dian Petrov in the Reno NABC in the North American Pairs. He and Petrov won the event but it was quite a feat according to a March 31, 2010 New York Times story:

First, the pair nearly missed the district qualifier. Schenker drove from Pittsburgh to Meadville, Pa., on Interstate 79, a distance of about 100 miles. Because of road work it took him more than two hours to cover the first 15 miles. The organizers, who knew several players were affected, delayed the start by 15 minutes, but Schenker arrived 15 minutes after that. Petrov was forced to play the first round with a substitute.

Following that, the pair narrowly qualified for the final day in Reno, needing three tops and an average over the last four boards. This was a key hand:

It was the next to last of the second qualifying session.

A big 4-4-4-1 often causes problems. Probably several players opened 2NT, which would result in a final contract of three no-trump after North used Stayman.

Probably, others opened 1C. Schenker (South) did better when he started with 1D. Then, over 1S, he reversed with 2H. (When the opener rebids in a second suit without a jump, and the responder must bid at the three-level if he wishes to support the opener's first-bid suit, the opener has made a reverse. After a one-level response it shows a maximum opening bid: in principle, at least a good 17 high-card points.)

Petrov's 3D rebid promised positive values. (With a weak hand he would have rebid an artificial 2NT.)

4D was RKCB, the reply showing two key cards (one ace and the trump king, or two aces) and denying the trump queen.

After winning the first trick with the CA, declarer cashed his DA and HA, then led the HQ, discarding a club from the dummy.

East took his king and returned a club, but South won, drew trumps and claimed.

Plus 1,370 was worth 23 match points out of 25, just enough to sneak Petrov and Schenker into the final day.

Session Ending Hand from Weekly Practice...



Earlier this week Stan and I played a practice session with Ralph and Nick. We all held some boring hands late in play and didn't want to quit on a low note so we continued playing ... one hand at a time... until this much more interesting hand appeared.

Six clubs appears to be an excellent contract E/W but only if it is played from East's 2-card holding. 6C by West is quickly defeated when South ruffs the heart lead and still sores a high trump.

At our table, clubs were never mentioned. Nick passed the North hand despite its attractive distribution and favorable vulnerability. Stan and I have had much success playing 4H as a wide-ranging opening bid (and we do not play NA-MYATS). At unfavorable vulnerability with only three losers, I chose to open 4H. I know there is always risk of missing a slam when preempting on good playing hand, but my heart suit was less than stellar so I treated this hand as a nine-winner. Ralph passed the South hand and Stan, after consideration, knowing I should hold an 8 or 9 winner hand for my opening bid, passed despite holding AK/A and a singleton. Nick was surprised to be defending 4H with his good 5-card trump holding, knowing neither diamonds nor clubs had been mentioned and he held only one card between the two suits!!

Ralph led the CK. I played the ace in dummy, planning to win the trick!! Nick trumped and returned the D3. I won the ace and attempted to ruff a diamond in dummy. Nick overruffed (after saying "Watch this!" ... chatting out loud is one of the perks on RealBridge). If Nick returns a trump, I cash two high hearts and exit with a heart forcing Nick to play a spade to dummy. Since Nick did not know the full position, he exited with a spade and I was able to discard my losing club. I returned to my hand, cashed the trump ace and king, and conceded a heart... taking ten!

Both 4H and 5C are reasonable final contracts. "Par" makes a ridiculous assumption that a pair would actually bid 6C from the 2-card side. Not only that, sacrificing in 6S as suggested would save only 2 IMPs if your teammates play and make game (11 IMPs vs 13 IMPs)! Basically you are the unluckiest player in the world if this happens to you!! And... it could happen if one opens a strong , artificial club on the East cards! Lucky for Ralph and Nick, we don't play strong club.

On normal defense, N/S should defeat 4S easily.

The CQ is the overwhelming lead of choice. If declarer covers the CQ with dummy's king, South should win it and shift to hearts. South should know it is likely they need at least one heart trick to set the contract.

As declarer, Joe Viola chose to duck both the queen and jack of clubs leaving North with a problem that he should have been able to solve. When Viola's CT appeared, North should realize there is no future in continuing the club suit. North should cash the HA which will most often defeat the hand whenever South holds either red king. If South encourages, North should continue hearts. If South discourages, North should shift to diamonds and hoping partner holds the DK. If declarer holds both red kings, the contract will not be defeated. At the table, North failed to unscramble the position and continued clubs. Viola took eleven tricks!

Charlie Chen, like Viola, ducked two rounds of clubs. He was unlucky when Andrew Rosenthal (North) found the key play of shifting to the HA. Good play Andrew! Contract failing by one!

When Lo/Gu held the N/S cards, declarer covered the first club and South (Lo) found the killing heart shift! Good play Ai-Tai!! Again, contract failing one trick!

Experts agree: Thoughtful defense is critical to winning this game!

Look at the wild scores: Seven pairs out of eight bid slam and went down THREE! Everyone led hearts setting the stage for defeat! In all of those cases, South opened the bidding and drove to slam over their partner's 1S response. Most Norths tried to slow things down... even with their C:AKJ... but South remained undaunted.

Looking at the results, one would think that even game was impossible, but Gu/Lo proved them wrong, both stopping short of slam and playing it extremely well.

Bauer led the HK. Lo ducked. Bauer continued with the HQ. Lo won and cashed the SA!! When the SK fell, he continued with three rounds of diamonds, discarding a heart on his losing diamond. McCarthy also discarded a heart. Bauer played a third round of hearts trumped in dummy. Lo finessed for the ST, drew trumps and claimed! Very well played!
