

Kibitzing on VuGraph...

To kibitz, go to **kibitz.realbridge.online**. Select JLall Online Teams#7. You will be taken to a lobby where you will see a list of tables on the left and a chat box and list of people in the lobby on the right. The table listing shows the team & player names at each table. There will also be information about the number of kibitzers and whether there is audio/video commentary (a picture of a TV means there is).

At the table, you will see a hand diagram with the bidding and play as it happens.

There is a chat window on the right. You can type into that window.

If there is an asterisk next to a bid, that means it was Alerted or Explained. Click on the bid to see the explanation if there was one.

- -- "Rewind" play using the slider underneath the table with the hand diagram.
- -- Click on the "Scores" button to the left of the South player's name to get a scorecard for the match.
- ----Click on a board number to see the hand record and results at all of the tables.
- ----Click on a number in a yellow box to get to the hand record from some screens.
- ----In the hand record screen, click on a result to see the bidding and play at a specific table.
- -- In the upper left corner:
- ----Click on the yellow box with 4 little boxes to get the match scores for all the matches (that will be IMPs and for the Round Robin will not include scores from previous rounds).
- ----Click on the yellow box with 3 bulleted lines to get Cross-IMPs for the pairs (that will be just for this match). The Scores information is also available in the lobby using the button at the upper right, in case you want to check on scores before deciding which table to watch.

TIMING OF DEFERRAL

The Round Robin matches will be deferred until each round is completed.

The KO matches will be deferred for half an hour or until each board has been played at all tables, so there may sometimes be a period when nothing new is being shown because one or two tables are very slow to play the board.


NOTES:

In accordance with the USBF General Conditions of Contest, each player must play at least one 8 board segment against each other team.


There are no seating rights - teams must submit their lineups before seeing their opponent's lineup.

Lineups for the first match each day will be due by 11:00 am; lineups for subsequent matches will be due at the start of the preceding match.

The tournament organizer will send an email to the team captain with the lineup of their opponent for the next match as soon as all lineups



Non-Simultaneous Double Squeeze




Bart Bramley is arguably one of the best declarers in the bridge world... and has been forever!

On Board 9, both tables reached 6NT on strong auctions where East opened 2NT; West transferred and invited East to bid the right slam.

Where Rotaru was declarer, Freeman led the D3. Rotaru won and played the SK. Freeman won and switch to a club. Rotaru played a spade to his hand and cashed the king and jack of diamonds. He played the CA, discarding a spade from dummy, and banked on the heart finesse to come to 12 tricks. When this failed, he was down two. –200

Where Bramley was declarer, it was more exciting. Bart knows how to keep the Kibs on the edge of their seats... Disa led the D3 to the 7,9,K. Bart played the SK. Disa won and exited with a club. Bart led a spade to his hand. Oops... Lewis showed out! Bart cashed the DA, and instinct plus the inference that Disa might have led the six from D:T653, led him to conclude that diamonds were likely 3-3. Bart led the DJ and **overtook with the queen!!** He cashed the D8, both opponents and Bart discarding low clubs. The SQ and ST followed on which Lewis discarded two hearts and Bramley discarded two clubs.

Bart led a heart to the king, creating this position:




Bramley cashed the CA. Disa was forced to discard a heart while Bart tossed dummy's last spade.

Bart, having a perfect count, led a heart to the ace, dropping the queen and taking the ultimate trick with the jack.

A well-thought out line of play!

17 well deserved IMPs to Sprung!

That was not the only 17 IMP swing in the first segment of the Sprung/Lewis match.



The USBF has appointed an Ethics Investigation Committee that will review any complaints about ethics violations. If the EIC concludes that a player or pair was acting unethically, they will report to the USBF COO, who may refer it to the USBF Recorder. Either the COO or Recorder may bring a Charge against the player to the Board of Directors, who may place a player on probation, suspend, or expel a player for cause.

Some Suggestions For Dining at Home Between Sessions!

Ingredients:

For the red pepper sauce:

- 2 red bell peppers
- 3 Tbs. extra-virgin olive oil
- Kosher salt and freshly ground pepper
- 2 Tbs. chopped fresh basil

For the risotto:

- 1/4 lb. (125 g) thinly sliced prosciutto
- 2 Tbs. extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 yellow onion, finely diced
- Kosher salt and freshly ground pepper
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 1 1/2 cups (10 1/2 oz./330 g) Arborio rice
- 1/2 cup (4 fl. oz./125 ml) white wine
- 6 cups (48 fl. oz./1.5 l) chicken broth, warmed
- 2 Tbs. unsalted butter
- 1 cup (5 oz./155 g) frozen peas, thawed

To assemble:

- 2 cups (4 oz./125 g) fresh bread crumbs
- 1/2 cup (4 fl. oz./125 ml) extra-virgin olive oil
- 2 eggs

Directions:

To make the grilled red pepper sauce, preheat a Philips smoke-less grill. Place the bell peppers on the grill and cook, turning occasionally, until grill-marked and slightly softened, about 4 minutes per side. Let the peppers stand until cool enough to handle, then remove the stem and seeds. Transfer the peppers to a blender or food processor and process until coarsely chopped. With the processor running, slowly add the olive oil until incorporated. Season to taste with salt and pepper and stir in the basil. Let stand until ready to serve. (The sauce can be made 1 day in advance and refrigerated. Bring to room temperature before using.)

To make the arancini, in a large sauté pan over medium heat, cook the prosciutto until crisp, about 5 minutes per side. Transfer to a cutting board and let cool, then finely chop. Set aside.

In a large saucepan over medium heat, warm the 2 Tbs. olive oil. Add the onion and a pinch each of salt and pepper and cook, stirring occasionally, until the onion is tender and translucent, about 5 minutes. Add the garlic and cook, stirring, until fragrant, about 1 minute. Add the rice and cook, stirring frequently, until translucent, 2 to 3 minutes. Add the wine and stir until the liquid is absorbed, about 1 minute. Add the broth 1/2 cup (4 fl. oz./125 ml) at a time, stirring constantly until it is almost completely absorbed before adding more.

When the rice is tender but firm to the bite, after 20 to 25 minutes, remove the pan from the heat and stir in the butter, peas and prosciutto. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Spread the risotto out in an even layer on a baking sheet and let cool completely.

Preheat your airfryer to 400°F (200°C).

In a shallow bowl, stir together the bread crumbs and the 1/2 cup (4 fl. oz./125 ml) olive oil. In a shallow bowl, lightly beat the eggs. Form the risotto into balls, using 2 Tbs. for each one. Dip in the beaten eggs, then coat in the bread crumb mixture. Working in batches, place the arancini in the airfryer in a single layer and cook until golden brown and crispy, about 10 minutes. Transfer to a plate and season with salt. Serve warm with the grilled red pepper sauce for dipping. Makes 24 arancini.

AirFryer Arancini With Red Pepper Sauce

Chicken Meatballs with Ginger and Lemongrass

Prep Time: 15 minutes Cook Time: 10 minutes

Servings: 14

This recipe highlights Asian flavors, but Greek-inspired meatballs are also delicious.

Mix together 1/2 lb. ground lamb; 1 garlic clove, minced; 1 Tbs. chopped fresh oregano; and 1/2 cup crumbled feta cheese. To make the sauce, in a blender, combine 1/4 cup *each* fresh mint and parsley, 1 garlic clove, 1/4 cup walnuts, 1 anchovy fillet and 1/2 cup olive oil; process until smooth.

Ingredients:

- 1 lb. ground chicken
- 1 Tbs. soy sauce
- 1 Tbs. Asian fish sauce
- 1 Tbs. minced lemongrass, white portion only
- 1 Tbs. chopped fresh cilantro
- 1/2 Tbs. grated fresh ginger
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- Sea salt and freshly ground pepper, to taste
- 1/4 cup grapeseed oil
- 14 small lettuce leaves
- 4 green onions, thinly sliced
- 2 limes, cut into wedges

Directions:

Preheat an oven to 350°F. Lightly grease a baking sheet.

In a bowl, combine the chicken, soy sauce, fish sauce, lemongrass, cilantro, ginger and garlic. Season with salt and pepper and mix well. Roll the meat mixture into 1-inch balls and place on the prepared baking sheet.

Heat a large fry pan over medium heat. Pour in the oil and heat until shimmering. Add the meatballs and panfry, turning them to brown evenly on all sides, about 5 minutes total. Drain on paper towels. Return the meatballs to the baking sheet and bake until cooked through, 3 to 5 minutes. Season with salt and pepper.

Line a platter with the lettuce leaves and arrange the warm meatballs on top. Garnish with the green onions and lime wedges and serve immediately.

Makes 14 meatballs.

Warm Dates with Parmesan and Walnuts

Prep Time: 20 minutes Cook Time: 10 minutes


Servings: 6

Ingredients:

- 24 large dates, preferably Medjool
- 2 tsp. extra-virgin olive oil or walnut oil, plus more for drizzling
- 2-oz. (60-g) piece Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese
- 24 walnut halves



Preheat an oven to 350°F (180°C).



Arrange the dates, slit side up, in a single layer on a rimmed baking sheet or in a shallow baking dish. Using a vegetable peeler, cut the cheese into bite-size shavings. Tuck 1 or 2 cheese shavings and a walnut half into each date.

Bake until the dates are warmed through, about 10 minutes. Transfer to a serving platter, drizzle with more olive oil and serve immediately.

Serves 6 to 8.



Riddle: "At the school recently, only the ____ students could solve the ____ equation." Can you complete this sentence using words that are anagrams of each other?


Answer: Brainy and Binary. Or, you can use Reserved and Reversed.

The USBF is an **all-volunteer** organization.


Our meetings are by conference call and at NABCS. Board members and the organization's officers are not compensated for meetings, travel, or hotel expenses.

Problem: You have 12 cue balls that look and feel identical. However, one of the cue balls is either slightly lighter or slightly heavier than the rest. You cannot tell which ball is the odd one out by handling them, and you do not know if that ball is lighter or heavier.

You have a set of old-fashioned balance scales. The scale with more weight in it will tip down, and the scale with less weight in it will tip up.

How do you figure out which ball is the odd one out, *and* whether it is lighter or heavier, in just three weighings? Every time you weigh a set of cue balls, you gain information. The balls can be separated into four categories:

- 1. Balls that you know nothing about, which I call Unknowns.
- 2. Balls that you know are *not* the odd ball out, which I call Known Neutrals.
- 3. Balls that could be lighter than the rest, or Light Suspects.
- 4. Balls that could be heavier than the rest, or Heavy Suspects.



Let's consider the first possibility, that the scale stays balanced on the first weighing of four vs. four. You now know that all eight balls on the scale are Known Neutrals. The four remaining off the scale are still Unknowns, and one of those four balls is either slightly heavier or slightly lighter than the rest. We need to figure out which one, and if it's light or heavy. There are a few different ways you can set up the second weighing to arrive at the solution, but the cleanest is to weigh three of the Unknowns against three of the Known Neutrals.

Again, either the scale will stay balanced, or it will tip to the right, or it will tip to the left. If the scale stays balanced, then we know that the ball we are looking for is the only one Unknown that remains off the scale. To figure out if it is light or heavy, simply weigh it against a Known Neutral and we have our answer.

But if the scale tips on this second weighing, then we have three possible balls. If it tips so that the Unknowns go down, then one of those three balls is the odd one out, and it's heavy. If it tips the other way, than one of the three suspect balls is light.

Let's assume that the scale tips down on the side with the Unknowns, which means they become Heavy Suspects. We have three Heavy Suspects, and the rest Known Neutrals, so we can weigh two of the Heavy Suspect balls against each other, and if the scale tips, the ball we are looking for is the heavier ball, and if it doesn't, the third Heavy Suspect that we did not include in the third weighing is the ball, and it is heavy. (The same is true if the second weighing gives you three Light Suspects, simply inverted).

The solution, assuming the first weighing stays balanced, will look something like this:

Now we have to solve for the other possibility—that the scale tips on the first weighing of four vs. four. In this case, you have four Heavy Suspects, four Light Suspects, and four Known Neutrals (the four that remained off the scale for the first weighing you know to be neutral). Again, there are multiple ways you can set up the second weighing to arrive at the solution. Here is one: Weigh two Light Suspects and a Heavy Suspect against the other two Light Suspects and a Known Neutral. The scale will either tip or stay balanced. If it stays balanced, then you know that the odd ball you're looking for is one of the three Heavy Suspects that stayed off the scale. Like before, you can then weigh one of them against another. If it tips, it's the heavier ball. If it doesn't, it's the ball remaining off the scale during the third weighing.

What if the scale tips on the second weighing (the Light-Light-Heavy vs. Light-Light-Neutral weighing)? If it tips to the right, so the Light-Light-Neutral side goes down, then you know it must be one of the Light Suspects on the other side of the scale—the left side in this example, the side that went up. You can weigh them against each other to figure out which one is the light ball.

But, if it tips the other way, so the Light-Light-Heavy side on the left goes down, then you still have three suspects: the two Light Suspects on the right side that went up, and the Heavy Suspect on the left side that went down. For the third and final weighing, weigh the two Light Suspects against each other. If the scale tips, the lighter ball is the odd ball you've been looking for. If it stays balanced, then you know the odd ball is the Heavy Suspect that stayed off the scale for the third weighing.

If you invert heavy and light suspects in the second weighing, the solution is the same.

As said, there are more solutions to this problem. If the scale stays balanced on the first weighing, then on the second weighing, you can weigh Unknown-Neutral vs. Unknown-Neutral-Neutral, and still arrive at the solution. Similarly, if the scale tips on the first weighing, then you can measure a combination of four vs. four again to arrive at the solution: Light-Neutral-Neutral-Neutral vs. Heavy-Light-Light, or the inversion.

Meet the Players


Ming Sheng studied at Tongji University.

Once clubs break, declarer takes a spade finesse and has 13 tricks when the spade suit flops.

At the other table, Linda Lewis and Disa stopped short of slam in 4NT. Playing at the four-level, Disa cashed out her winners, taking 11 tricks for +460.



On Board 48, Kolesnik/Lo had a natural auction to reach 4S from South.

Baseggio led his H9 and Freeman won the king. He cashed the HA and gave Franco a ruff. Lo won the club return, crossed to dummy with a diamond and took the spade finesse. When the spade honors came down, he had ten tricks.

At the other table, Clayton/Sprung used "science."


1C is their catchall bid for semi-balanced hands without a five card major.

1H = spades

1S = 11-13

2D = artificial, GF

Milgrim/Rigal play upside down carding. Milgrim led the HA, Rigal following with the six. Milgrim switched to his singleton D3 which went to Rigal's jack and Clayton's queen.



Since Clayton had no real idea of the opponents' distribution, he could guard against Milgrim holding S:Jx and a singleton diamond by playing a spade to the ace followed by the SQ. As it was, he led the spade to the ace but instead of leading the SQ, it appears he changed his mind and led the H4 to his queen and Milgrim's king. Milgrim was able to give Rigal a heart ruff and still collect his SK for down one!!

Interestingly, Milgrim's opening lead of the heart ace was contrary to his normal methods which require the lead of the king from AK (Rusinow). This false card concealed the hand position from declarer and forced Clayton to declare in the blind.
