In the U21 USA2 Final, both tables reached 4S from South on Board 17 from the second segment. Both tables made six for a push.

In the U26 USA2 Final, neither table played in 4S but both were successful where they landed.

The Stephani team, having five members was necessarily rotating. Stephani/Soukup, not a “regular” partnership, bid to 6S from South, not an ideal IMPs spot since it is completely positional (basically 25%) ... however, as happens frequently in our game, ever card is perfect. The HA is with West ... absolutely necessary to the success of the contract... and the DK is with East... also absolutely necessary to collect 12 tricks. If the HA were with East, a heart lead would defeat the contract before declarer could even gain the lead. If the DK is off, East/West will collect both the DK and the HA even with the HA right. With everything sitting perfectly, Soukup brought his slam.

At the other table, Fan and Si bid 3NT North, a solid contract. Beauchet found the lead of the H3 and that insured that the HK would provide declarer’s ninth trick. Of course, it also had the strange effect of holding declarer to nine tricks instead of ten because he didn’t take the diamond finesse.

3. The one who got the yellow binder also got a red ruler, but it wasn't Beth. The one who got the drawing tablet also got a green ruler.



In one room in the U26 match, David Soukup played 3S and went down. In the other room, Yewen Fan declared 4S and made five. Xiong led the DK against Soukup. Soukup won with the ace and played the H5 out of hand to the 4, 2, T. Wei returned the SQ. Soukup won in dummy and played the C3 to the 6, K, A. Xiong could see the crossruff coming and played the S4 to declarer's 6. The H8 was ruffed and a small club was trumped in hand. Soukup pulled the last trump and led the D6, losing to the queen. The C9 was trumped and Soukup found himself one trick light.

In the other room, Fan found a great line of play in game. Chang led the S2 and Fan won his ace. He played ace of diamonds and a diamond to Chang's king. Chang played the H4 to Beauchet's ace and the HQ was continued. Fan won the HK, pitching a club from dummy. He played a spade to the king and ruffed a diamond in hand. He played a spade to the jack, felling the last trump, and brought home eleven tricks.

In both matches yesterday, there was a 13 IMP swing on Board 2 in the third segment.

In U26, both tables played in 3NT... Both opening leaders led a 4th best club, however, Si played the hand from North where he was safe and Berk played the hand from South where the lead came through the Kx of clubs. Against Berk, the defense quickly cashed five rounds of clubs and the HA for down two. At the other table, Si won the club king, played a diamond to dummy's ace, cashed dummy's queen, and led a spade to his hand. When the smoke cleared, he collected six diamonds, five spades and the CK for 12 tricks and +690.

In the U26 match, one table played in 3NT from South, suffering the same fate as Berk suffered above. At the other table, N/S played in 5D from North. Against 5D, East led the CA and switched to a spade. Declarer made six, again collecting 13 IMPs.
