#### FORMAT

#### The face-to-face USA1 stages will be 2-day, 120-board KO matches.

**The face-to-face USA2 stages will be** a 2-day, 120-board KO R16 in which the 4 losing USA1 Quarterfinalists will play, followed by a 1-day, 60-board KO Quarterfinal, in which the 2 USA1 Quarterfinal losers will play the 2 USA2 Round of 16 winners; a 1-day 60-board KO Semifinal in which the USA2 Quarterfinal winners will play, and a 2-day 120-board Final between the USA1 Final loser and the USA2 Semifinal winner.

**Play Requirements:** Each player must play 10 matches in RR 1 and at least one segment against each other team in RR 2 to qualify for the KO stages (a player who does not meet the play requirements can be added back to the team as long as the requirements for roster changes are met. Each player must play 50% of the boards in every KO match to be eligible to continue on the team. See General Conditions of Contest Section XII (at USBF.org) about how to count boards and potential waiver of this requirement.

Closed Notes: Players may not consult their notes at any time during play unless they are dummy.

Withdrawal: A player or team may withdraw at any time.

Play in the KO stages will be on LoveBridge tablets, with either 2 or 4 players in a room.

SETTING THE KO BRACKET: THE KO BRACKET WILL BE BASED ON ACBL SEEDING POINTS, EXCLUDING POINTS AWARD-ED FOR ONLINE PLAY, PLUS ADDED SEEDING POINTS FOR PERFORMANCE IN EACH STAGE OF THE ROUND ROBIN.



### KO KIBITZING ON LOVEBRIDGE

You can follow the USBC on the **https://vugraph.lovebridge.com/** website. The stream is delayed; go to the schedule below for starting times for each segment.

**Popcorn time!** Do you want to listen to commentary? Search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentary. If inactive, no one is commenting. **Nail biting!** 

Do you want to be deeply involved? Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into four small screens – two of them showing the two tables of the match you choose, the other two having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can personalize the content in your windows. (Not active on mobiles.)

#### Think together!

When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees. You can decide what you would do and see whether your chosen player agrees. **More Information:** 

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner the arrow takes you the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

### Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is also a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue. **Replay**:

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board then the same buttons move you through the list. Push every button and enjoy!

## Mask Rules

Attendees are required to wear a mask that covers their nose and mouth in all public areas in the hotel. That means the hotel lobby, corridors, and elevators, as well as the Hospitality Suite and the Office/Players' Break Room, where masks must be worn at all times. Therefore, there is no eating or drinking in those rooms.

Our attorney has told us that the Cook County Mask Mandate forces us to require masks in the playing rooms. Therefore, we have adopted the following policy about that:

Masks are required in playing rooms. If you are observed not wearing a mask in a playing room, there will be a 2 IMP penalty for the first offense in a segment, a 4 IMP penalty for the second offense, an 8 IMP penalty for the third offense, and a 16 IMP penalty for the fourth and subsequent offenses; however, if you and your opponent agree to something other than both wearing masks, any IMP penalties for not wearing a mask will apply to both of you equally and there will be no other penalties. You may remove your mask briefly to eat or drink. **However, if you call for a director (for any reason), and you are not wearing a mask properly when the director enters the room, the penalty will apply to your team for your next match in the event.** There is no eating or drinking in the playing room when the Director present.

In addition, anyone who is penalized more than twice (over the course of the entire event) in situations where his/her opponent was wearing a mask while s/he wasn't, or where the director was called, may be subject to additional conduct penalties.

You should bring masks to the tournament with you; we will not be supplying masks.

## Covid Waiver

We are going to ask each player in these events to sign a COVID-19 Waiver of Claims. It is being sent to you by email and you may sign it electronically and return it to Jan (<u>marteljan@gmal.com</u>) or you can sign a printed waiver at the site. Waivers will be available to sign in room 1321 starting Oct. 5th at 9:00 am. **Everyone is required to sign the form before the start of play!**

## Hospitality Information ... the Suite and more ...

Because of Covid, we won't be able to provide the full, wonderful hospitality we have in the past, but we will do what we can.

Hosts Evvie Gilbert and Maya Alela for the Open and Women's and Julie Arbit and Christian Jolly for the Mixed and Seniors will be in our usual hospitality suite (Room 2321). They will provide grab and go breakfast and lunch each day, starting on Tuesday, Oct. 5<sup>th</sup>.

**Breakfast**: From 8-10 am. There will be individually packaged cereal, fruit, hard boiled eggs, bagels, and some hot options. Also individual butter, jam, peanut butter, and cream cheese, as well as condiment packages. They will be making coffee and will have individual packages of sugar, sweetener, and dairy & non-dairy creamers. For those of you who prefer Keurig coffee, that will also be available in the hospitality suite. We are limiting access to 6 players at any one time, so we ask that you come to the suite, pick up a large to go container and put the smaller packages in that to take with you as quickly as you can, and then go someplace else to eat. **Masks that cover your nose & mouth must be always worn in the Hospitality Suite.** There will be a hand sanitizer station near the door and we encourage you to sanitize your hands before choosing what to take.

**Lunch**: From 2-4 pm (the first half of play each day ends at 2:35; we encourage those of you who are sitting out the 2nd quarter to go early). There will be a main dish (sandwiches, chicken, maind dish salads, pizza) as well as individually packaged tuna salad, green salad, cheese, fruit, and berries. Also all the individual packages of add-ons we have for breakfast. Water and soft drinks will be available in refrigerators.

Let us know what you want: If there is a menu for a future day's lunch hanging on the wall outside the Hospitality Suite, please mark what you want, so we have a better idea of what to order.

#### Playing Rooms & Player's Break Room

We will have bottled water in the playing rooms and if there is a refrigerator in a playing room, we'll stock it with soft drinks.

We will also have bottled water in the Player's Break Room (1321), as well as soft drinks, Nespresso, some packaged snacks, and some fruit.

Masks that cover your nose & mouth must be always worn in the Player's Break Room, so you may not eat and drink in the room.





# Meet the Players


The first World Youth Congress started on Saturday in Istanbul. The team events run through Wednesday, then the pair competitions continue until Sunday.

Since only five countries entered the under-21 teams, they were merged with the 35 under-26 teams. After 13 rounds of 10-board matches, eight teams will qualify for knockout play, starting on Tuesday. The rest will compete in a secondary board-a-match event.

The United States has sent two teams. U.S.A. Blue is Jason Chiu, Kevin Dwyer, Kevin Fay, Jeremy Fournier, Justin Lall and Matthew Meckstroth; U.S.A. Red is Zachary Brescoll, Alex Hudson, Adam Kaplan, Owen Lien, John Marriott and Cameron Shunta. Howard Weinstein is the nonplaying captain and Jim Sternberg the coach for both teams.

After eight rounds U.S.A. Blue, with a 7 and 1 record, led with 165 victory points out of 200. Tied for second were a transnational team from the Czech Republic and Japan (who beat U.S.A. Blue by 16 victory points to 14 in Round 7) and Netherlands Red with 145 victory points. U.S.A. Red was 15th with 127 victory points.

In the second round U.S.A. Blue opposed France, a team including three players who won world titles last year in Beijing. The points were flowing freely, with no flat boards. After six deals France led by 26 international match points to 21. See 7th board in the diagram.



You might have expected everyone to pass, but not in junior bridge. At the other table, after three passes, Fay (North) opened one heart. This contravened the Rule of 15, which states that in the fourth position open the bidding if your point count plus your spade length is greater than 14. Chiu (South) responded two diamonds, North rebid two hearts (how he must have loved doing that), South raised to three hearts, and all passed.

Declarer lost four hearts and one diamond to go down one.

In the given auction Lall (East) opened one diamond, showing 11 to 15 high-card points and two-plus diamonds. (A one-club opening would have promised 16-plus points.) After Nicolas Lhuissier (South) passed, Fournier (West) responded three clubs, indicating length in both minor suits and less-than-game-invitational strength.

Aymeric Lebatteaux (North) made a thin takeout double. Then, after East passed, surely South should have passed also. He had eight of his cards and seven of his points in his opponents' suits. Unless West had made a very weak response, North and South could not have the values for game. Three clubs doubled would have gone down one or two.

When South bid three no-trump, West smartly doubled. North should have passed, but he redoubled to express doubt about this contract. That was an astute assessment, but when his partner had nowhere to run, the redouble just doubled the penalty.

West led the diamond ten, when the seven (or four) would have been a wiser choice. East won with his king and returned the jack, which was covered by the queen and ace. West shifted to the spade six, declarer taking East's ten with his ace.

Now South cleverly led a heart to cut the communications between the defenders. To get the contract down three, West had to win with his ace and play another heart (perhaps after cashing the diamond nine). Understandably, though, West played low. East won and returned a heart, West taking his ace and cashing the diamond nine. (Returning a spade immediately would not have helped, because South could have won in the dummy, run his clubs and led a heart from the dummy, endplaying East to lead away from the jack-four of spades into dummy's king-nine.) Now declarer had seven tricks: three spades, one diamond and three clubs. Minus 50 and plus 600 gave U.S.A. Blue 11 imps on the board.

U.S.A. Blue scored 18 imps on the last three boards to win by 50 imps to 26, which converted to 22 victory points to 8.

Huang played a pade to Dwyer's king and Dwyer switched back to hearts. Weichsel won the heart n dummy, ruffed a club, ruffed a spade, and claimed 11 tricks.

n the Closed Room, Wooldridge passed the East hand. South passed and West ppened 1D. North's 2D bid showed the majors. 2S was an invitational raise in dianonds. South competed with 3S. West made a game try with 4C. North bid 4S and played it there.

The play in 4S was routine. When trumps split 3-1 with the queen offsides, Kamil had to lose one trick in each suit for down one... a good save that almost came home! 7 IMPs to Bramley

At both tables, once the SQ scored, declarer could collect eight more tricks without a finesse: five diamonds, two hearts and one club.

The traveler from Board 49 on Tuesday night had two 190's on it. That is not an expected score at this level of competition, however, game on this hand is truly a bad proposition. The East/West pairs who bid either 3NT or 5D got lucky. In 3NT, declarer starts with four spade losers (and is lucky that spades divide 4-4 to have any chance). Once past the 4-4 spades, declarer still requires the favorable position of the singleton diamond king to succeed. In 5D, declarer faces the loss of two spades off the top and still needs a favorable lie of the diamonds to bring home the game.



Most Wests led their singleton diamond to the J, K, A; Declarer pulled two rounds of trump and cashed the DT before ruffing a diamond in dummy. A spade drew the singleton ace. East switched to a club. South claimed ten tricks!



In Fleisher/Gu, Grue opened the North hand 1S! (That would seem to make it more likely that N/S would get to game looking at the South hand!) East doubled; South redoubled; West bid 2C and when it got back to Moss in balancing seat, he went low and bid 2S.

Being non-vulnerable, it's 6 or 7 IMPs either way and this way would most certainly yield a plus score. He hoped Grue would take another call if he could... but, alas, he could not.





Board 18 in the 6<sup>th</sup> segment of the Open Quarterfinal looks pretty dull. Double Dummy analysis indicates that E/W can make 1C, 1D, 1S or 1NT and that South can make 1H. South has the best hand at the table and, not surprisingly, became declarer at seven out of eight tables. Three of the South declarers made +90 in 1NT or 2D.


In the Levine/Spector match Mark Lair wasn't going to let the opponents steal. He balanced with a takeout double. Before Mike Passell could be left to suffer in a hopeless 2H contract, John Hurd decided to steal some more, he bid 3C in front of Passell. Passell doubled and Bathurst made an SOS redouble. Hurd ran to 3D and Passell doubled again.

Passell led the D9 to declarer's DT. Hurd led a spade to the queen and East's ace. Lair exited with H9. Declarer played the HK and Passell allowed this to hold the trick. Declarer played the CK to Passell's ace. Passel played the D8 to Lair's ace and Lair continued diamonds. Hurd drew the last trump and played a heart toward dummy. Passell won the HJ, cashed the HA and exited with the H8. Hurd won the heart and played the C2. Passell won the C7 and was forced to lead a club from the J9 into declarer's QT. A nicely executed endplay to get out for -500 on a hand where par is -90. At the other table in this match, Garner/Meckstroth stopped in 2D and took eight tricks when the defense mistimed the play. 11 IMPs to Levine

Only two pairs, Donner/Rimstedt and Kranyak/Spector found 7D.

With twelve top tricks, this contract required the HQ to be doubleton or the SQJ to fall in three rounds. In this case both spades and hearts worked to produce the thirteenth trick.

Holding the East cards, John Kranyak opened 1D in second seat, catching Warren Spector with a huge hand. The unimpeded auction to slam was:

Kranyak won the club lead, drew two rounds of trump and cashed a second club. He drew the last trump and cashed the AK of hearts. When the HQ fell, Kranyak had thirteen tricks. If the HQ didn't fall, Kranyak would need to fall back on the double spade finesse. At the other table the opponents played in 6D. 11 IMPs to Spector

Donner/Rimstedt had a more complex auction. Rimstedt did not open the East hand. Donner started with a strong 1C in fourth seat and the auction continued:

Rimstedt won the club lead, cashed the DA and played the SA. Levin dropped the SJ. Rimstedt drew two more rounds of trump and played on spades. When the SQ dropped, Rimstedt claimed 13 tricks to win 11 IMPs when the opponents played in 6D at the other table.

Gadzooks, but Limey Jack can twirl that baton. Howie Dung picked Bramley whilst Limey Jack told you how downtrodden they were.

Nickell-Hill: Nickell heads for the inevitable fount of representing the Yanks on the world stage.



In the Fleisher/Gu match Sheng/Wei reached an aggressive, but makeable 6D slam.

Martel led the C7. Sheng won the CA in dummy and played the D3 to the DK. Sheng played the H5 to dummy's HQ and cashed the HA. Martel dropped the HK under dummy's ace!!

Sheng led the H2 from dummy and Fleisher played the HJ. Sheng trumped with DJ and could no longer make the hand, even thought trumps were divided 3-2 and hearts were 3-3.

When players bid 27 HCP slams with no singletons in either hand, they need luck and they can't afford to slip in the play.

The straightforward play on this hand is to draw trumps and play for 3-3 hearts with the king in the pocket. Sheng may have been trying to give himself an extra chance in case the heart lie wasn't perfect.

It may appear that Martel took a chance playing the HK, but there was very little risk. When Fleisher followed with the H9 on the second round, Martel was certain that Sheng did not start with H:JTx. With that holding Sheng would have led the HJ on the first round of the suit. If Fleisher held the H:J8, he could play either card (they are equals). This is a restricted choice play. The fact that Fleisher played the HJ makes it more likely that Martel holds the H8. Trumping low is the winning play.

Making 6D would win 12 IMPs for Gu and going down two tricks lost 13!
