Face to Face Tournament Schedule

VACCINATION REQUIRED:

All players in the 2021 Open USBC MUST be vaccinated against CoVid19.

Players must submit proof of vaccination to the USBF Secretary (Jan Martel) before play commences in the event.

This includes the online stages - players are not eligible to enter the event if they do not submit proof of vaccination.

There are no exceptions to this rule.

FORMAT

The face-to-face USA1 stages will be 2-day, 120-board KO matches.

The face-to-face USA2 stages will be a 2-day, 120-board KO R16 in which the 4 losing USA1 Quarterfinalists will play, followed by a 1-day, 60-board KO Quarterfinal, in which the 2 USA1 Quarterfinal losers will play the 2 USA2 Round of 16 winners; a 1-day 60-board KO Semifinal in which the USA2 Quarterfinal winners will play, and a 2-day 120-board Final between the USA1 Final loser and the USA2 Semifinal winner.


Play Requirements: Each player must play 10 matches in RR 1 and at least one segment against each other team in RR 2 to qualify for the KO stages (a player who does not meet the play requirements can be added back to the team as long as the requirements for roster changes are met. Each player must play 50% of the boards in every KO match to be eligible to continue on the team. See General Conditions of Contest Section XII (at USBF.org) about how to count boards and potential waiver of this requirement.


Closed Notes: Players may not consult their notes at any time during play unless they are dummy.

Withdrawal: A player or team may withdraw at any time.

Play in the KO stages will be on LoveBridge tablets, with either 2 or 4 players in a room.

SETTING THE KO BRACKET: THE KO BRACKET WILL BE BASED ON ACBL SEEDING POINTS, EXCLUDING POINTS AWARDED FOR ONLINE PLAY, PLUS ADDED SEEDING POINTS FOR PERFORMANCE IN EACH STAGE OF THE ROUND ROBIN.

KO KIBITZING ON LOVEBRIDGE

You can follow the USBC on the https://vugraph.lovebridge.com/ website. The stream is delayed; go to the schedule below for starting times for each segment.

Popcorn time! Do you want to listen to commentary? Search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentary. If inactive, no one is commenting.

Nail biting!

Do you want to be deeply involved? Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into four small screens – two of them showing the two tables of the match you choose, the other two having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can personalize the content in your windows. (Not active on mobiles.)

Think together!

When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees. You can decide what you would do and see whether your chosen player agrees.

More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner the arrow takes you the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is also a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue.

Replay:

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board then the same buttons move you through the list. Push every button and enjoy!

Mask Rules

Attendees are required to wear a mask that covers their nose and mouth in all public areas in the hotel. That means the hotel lobby, corridors, and elevators, as well as the Hospitality Suite and the Office/Players' Break Room, where masks must be worn at all times. Therefore, there is no eating or drinking in those rooms.

Our attorney has told us that the Cook County Mask Mandate forces us to require masks in the playing rooms. Therefore, we have adopted the following policy about that:

Masks are required in playing rooms. If you are observed not wearing a mask in a playing room, there will be a 2 IMP penalty for the first offense in a segment, a 4 IMP penalty for the second offense, an 8 IMP penalty for the third offense, and a 16 IMP penalty for the fourth and subsequent offenses; however, if you and your opponent agree to something other than both wearing masks, any IMP penalties for not wearing a mask will apply to both of you equally and there will be no other penalties. You may remove your mask briefly to eat or drink. However, if you call for a director (for any reason), and you are not wearing a mask properly when the director enters the room, the penalty will apply to your team for your next match in the event. There is no eating or drinking in the playing room when the Director present.

In addition, anyone who is penalized more than twice (over the course of the entire event) in situations where his/her opponent was wearing a mask while s/he wasn't, or where the director was called, may be subject to additional conduct penalties.

You should bring masks to the tournament with you; we will not be supplying masks.

Covid Waiver

We are going to ask each player in these events to sign a COVID-19 Waiver of Claims. It is being sent to you by email and you may sign it electronically and return it to Jan (marteljan@gmal.com) or you can sign a printed waiver at the site. Waivers will be available to sign in room 1321 starting Oct. 5th at 9:00 am. Everyone is required to sign the form before the start of play!

You are shown a set of four cards placed on a table, each of which has a number on one side and a colored patch on the other side. The visible faces of the cards show 3, 8, red and brown.

Which card(s) must you turn over in order to test the truth of the proposition that if a card shows an even number on one face, then its opposite face is red?



Solution

If the 8 card is not red, it violates the rule.

Solution: The correct response is to turn over the 8 card and the brown card.

The rule was "If the card shows an even number on one face, then its opposite face is red." Only a card with both an even number on one face and something other than red on the other face can invalidate this rule:

If the 3 card is red (or brown), that doesn't violate the rule. The rule makes no claims about odd numbers.

Hospitality Information ... the Suite and more ...

Because of Covid, we won't be able to provide the full, wonderful hospitality we have in the past, but we will do what we can.

Hosts Evvie Gilbert and Maya Alela for the Open and Women's and Julie Arbit and Christian Jolly for the Mixed and Seniors will be in our usual hospitality suite (Room 2321). They will provide grab and go breakfast and lunch each day, starting on Tuesday, Oct. 5th.

Breakfast: From 8-10 am. There will be individually packaged cereal, fruit, hard boiled eggs, bagels, and some hot options. Also individual butter, jam, peanut butter, and cream cheese, as well as condiment packages. They will be making coffee and will have individual packages of sugar, sweetener, and dairy & non-dairy creamers. For those of you who prefer Keurig coffee, that will also be available in the hospitality suite. We are limiting access to 6 players at any one time, so we ask that you come to the suite, pick up a large to go container and put the smaller packages in that to take with you as quickly as you can, and then go someplace else to eat. **Masks that cover your nose & mouth must be always worn in the Hospitality Suite.** There will be a hand sanitizer station near the door and we encourage you to sanitize your hands before choosing what to take.

Lunch: From 2-4 pm (the first half of play each day ends at 2:35; we encourage those of you who are sitting out the 2nd quarter to go early). There will be a main dish (sandwiches, chicken, maind dish salads, pizza) as well as individually packaged tuna salad, green salad, cheese, fruit, and berries. Also all the individual packages of add-ons we have for breakfast. Water and soft drinks will be available in refrigerators.

Let us know what you want: If there is a menu for a future day's lunch hanging on the wall outside the Hospitality Suite, please mark what you want, so we have a better idea of what to order.

Playing Rooms & Player's Break Room

We will have bottled water in the playing rooms and if there is a refrigerator in a playing room, we'll stock it with soft drinks.

We will also have bottled water in the Player's Break Room (1321), as well as soft drinks, Nespresso, some packaged snacks, and some fruit.

Masks that cover your nose & mouth must be always worn in the Player's Break Room, so you may not eat and drink in the room.



Meet the Players...

Beth Palmer was an Administrative Judge with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission for 24 years, hearing complaints of employment discrimination. Prior to becoming a judge, she was a lawyer in private practice. Admired in the bridge world for her judicial temperament, Beth generously gave of her time throughout the years to serve in numerous administrative positions with the USBF, ACBL, and the Washington Bridge League.

Beth began playing bridge in law school in 1977 and her first serious partner was Bill Cole. Two years later, she played with Bill at the Norfolk, Virginia, nationals and her team made it to the round of 16 in the Vanderbilt. Lynn Deas reported at the time that "Beth was the talk of the tournament, won more than 100 masterpoints, and made Life Master."

Away from the bridge table, Beth enjoyed reading and sports, but her primary interest was her family... daughter, Julie Pettis and husband, Bill Pettis. Beth served as Julie's Girl Scout troop leader for six years and was coach of her basketball team for five. Beth and Bill (Buffalo) lived in Silver Spring, Maryland.

Beth was serving a member of the United States Bridge Federation Board of Directors when she lost her battle with cancer in 2019.

She is greatly missed. This event is named in her memory to honor the many hours she devoted to making this game the best it could be.



Stephanie Doran Scott, Petra Hamman's daughter, reported yesterday that Bob is improving every day.

Bob had a severe case of breakthrough Covid and has been hospitalized for over seven weeks. He has been on a ventilator and had several heroic life-saving procedures since entering the hospital.

Yesterday Stephanie posted that:

Bob is doing much better! Chest tube, trach, and catheter removed! Most likely on Monday, he will be moving to inpatient physical therapy! He is still very weak and he needs to get stronger. Please keep all your positive thoughts and prayers coming.





In both USA1 Semifinal matches, there was a double game swing on Board 5 of the fifth segment.





In the Fleisher/Spector match, the Spector team bid and made game at both tables, winning 15 IMPs. At one table, John Kranyak opened 1H on the East hand. Grue overcalled 2C and Wolpert splintered 4C. Kranyak bought the contract in 4H. Since South could never get off lead to attack spades, declarer took ten tricks for +420.

At the other table, South, John Hurd, opened 1C and Korbel overcalled 1D with the East hand. Bathurst bid 1S with the North cards. Lee showed his heart suit and Hurd made a support double for spades. Korbel splintered 4C and Lee Bid 4H. Hurd doubled and Bathurst pulled to 4S. Lee doubled. Lee led the CT, Bathurst won the CA, cashed the HA, and trumped a heart. Bathurst led the S8 to dummy's SK and Korbel's ace. Korbel cashed the DK and exited with a trump. Playing a third round of hearts would have been better than the trump exit. Lee won the SQ and played the C9. Bathurst could not go wrong because Korbel had splintered clubs. He inserted the CJ and claimed ten tricks to score +790.


15 IMPs to Spector

In Hill/Nickell, the Nickell team bid and made 4H East/ West and 4S North/South to win 14 IMPs. Both Souths opened 1C, East overcalled 1D, North passed and East bid 1H. South rebid 2C. Joyce Hill raised to2H with the West hand. This gave Bobby Levin a chance to bid 2S, on his bad hand with a six card suit. Kevin Dwyer jumped to 4H and Weinstein bought the contract in 4S.


The C9 was led. Levin won the CA and played the D8. Hill won the DK and returned the H3. Levin won the HA and trumped a heart. He trumped another heart and trumped a second diamond before exiting dummy with the SK. Hill won the SA and returned the HJ. Levin ruffed, played a trump and eventually finessed the CQ for his tenth trick. Note that if Hill returned a diamond, Dwyer would have been able to overruff declarer and give Hill a club ruff.

At the other table Hampson jumped to 4H over South's 2C rebid and the spade suit was never mentioned. Grainger led the CA and switched to the H2. This produced the mini-wish-trick: H2-H3-H4-H5. Greco played a trump to Grainger's HA and Grainger returned his last trump. Greco cashed dummy's high diamonds, gave up the DQ and claimed ten tricks.

In the USA2 matches, none of the N/S pairs found the spade suit.

In Gu/Levine both E/W pairs bid and made 4H for a push board.

In Bramley/Donner, Bramley opened 1NT (10-12) with the East hand. DelMonte made a penalty double with the South hand and Woolsey jumped to 3D, which bought the contract.

Finn Kolesnik led his singleton heart. DelMonte won the HA and cashed the CA. Kolesnik could no longer score two ruffs. Woolsey took ten tricks for +130.

At the other table, Rimstedt opened 1H with the East hand, Kamil overcalled 2C and Donner splintered 4C. Rimstedt retreated to 4 H to end the auction.

Kamil led the D8. Rimstedt won and played the H9, which held the trick. Rimstedt led a second heart and Kamil won the HA while Becker discarded the discouraging C8. Kamil cashed the CK. Realizing that he needed to get spades going, Kamil played the S2. Rimstedt didn't know that diamonds weren't breaking, although the fact that Kamil led a diamond before playing a high club should have been a hint. Rimstedt rose with the SA. When diamonds didn't break, Rimstedt had two more losers to go down one for -50.


There is to be a free BBO Tournament in memory of Miguel Reygadas on 16 October. So do save the date and look for registration details on BBO





Our meetings are by conference call and at NABCS. Board members and the organization's officers are not compensated for meetings, travel, or hotel expenses.



A Good Play by Amber Lin from the Mixed Online USBC



In the third round of the Mixed Round-Robin, Amber Lin, one of the Junior players entered in both the Women's starting today and the Mixed that started last month, demonstrated her expert skill as a defender.

Howard Parker and Tracey Bauer landed in 4H.


Lin led the D9. Declarer won the DA, played a heart to the ace and a heart to the jack, followed by the H9, which held the trick.

The CK was played from dummy. Finn Kolesnik (also a junior player) won the CA and exited with his last trump. Declarer played the DT. Kolesnik ducked. Declarer played a club and Lin won the CQ to produce the position shown below:

Lin could have cashed her SA and exited with a spade to dummy's king This would have resulted in setting the contract one trick.

Declarer would win the spade, cash the DK and exit with a diamond to Kolesnik's queen. Kolesnik would be forced to concede a club trick to declarer. Lin thought ahead and found a way to provide Kolesnik with an exit card. She did not cash the SA, but instead exited with the SQ.

Dummy won the SK and the DK was cashed. When declarer exited with a diamond to Kolesnik, he returned a spade and Lin took the last two tricks, setting 4H two tricks for a gain of 3 IMPs. Lin's team won this match by a score of 21-17.





On Board 51 in the final segment of the Fleisher/Spector match, Grue/Moss bid to 5H, a vulnerable game that was almost certainly going to make. Kranyak/Wolpert wisely sacrificed in 6CX.

Moss's 1C opening showed 2+ clubs. Wolpert's 3C bid was natural and Grue's 4C bid showed the majors. Kranyak furthered the preempt with his 5C bid and Moss stuck out his neck to bid 5H on a

four card suit and a minimum balanced opening hand. Wolpert, with great distribution, bid 6C, which Moss doubled.

Grue led the HQ, Moss won the HA and played a club. Kranyak won in dummy and led a diamond. Moss won the DA, and the defense took their three aces. The contract was set two tricks for a N/S score of -300. This appears to be a plus position for the Spector team. After all, six level sacrifices are not easy to discern, especially when one is sacrificing in the opponents' first bid suit.

At the other table in first seat, Fleisher opened a multi 2D bid showing any weak two bid in hearts or a bad weak two in spades. Hurd passed and Martel bid 2S (pass or correct). FYI: The 2S bid did not guarantee anything in hearts. Everyone passed and Martel declared 2S.

Bathurst led the HQ and shifted to a small spade. Martel played the SQ from dummy and Hurd won the SA.



Hurd reverted to hearts. Bathurst won the HT and continued the suit. Hurd shifted to the C3 and Bathurst ruffed. Bathurst played the HK. Martel ruffed in dummy and played the D9. Hurd won the DA and gave Bathurst another club ruff. Bathurst played his last heart. Martel ruffed with the S7 and Hurd overruffed with the S8. Hurd led the D2, Martel played the DJ, Bathurst played the DQ, and dummy ruffed. Martel played a club from dummy. Hurd trumped with the S2 and later Bathurst scored the SA. The defense took ten tricks, and the contract was set five tricks for a N/S score of minus 250.

Limey Jack...
