KIBITZING ON LOVEBRIDGE

You can follow the USBC on the <u>https://vugraph.lovebridge.com/</u> website. The stream is delayed; go to the schedule below for starting times for each segment.

Popcorn time!

Do you want to listen to commentary? Search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentary. If it doesn't do anything, no one is commenting.

Nail biting!

Do you want to be deeply involved? Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into four small screens – two of them showing the two tables of the match you choose, the other two having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can also personalize the content in all your windows. (The 2x2 view is not available on mobiles.)

Think together!

When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do and see whether your chosen player agrees.

More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner the arrow takes you the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is also a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

Replay:

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board then the same buttons move you through list. Push every button and enjoy!

The Austin NABC will be held as scheduled.

After much consideration, the decision has been made to move forward for the <u>2021 Fall North</u> <u>American Bridge Championships</u> scheduled for Nov. 25-Dec. 5 in Austin.



While we are excited to bring players back to the bridge table, we will still approach the tournament with an abundance of caution. 

The lie of the cards on Board 7 is prefect for N/S declaring in either clubs or hearts.


In the Open Room, Gupta/Lall played in 3C, taking the way low road with 26 HCP between them. Gupta made four but he could have taken all the tricks! 1NT was a relay to clubs. 2C was forced. 2D was explained as "equal level correction" indicating it did not reflect extra values. Lall bid 3C and ended the auction.


Woolsey led the DK. Gupta won his ace. Gupta played the CA and drew a wish trick! He played the SJ to the Q, A, 5. He ruffed the DJ with the CQ, cashed the CK. He played a spade to Woolsey's king and Kit gave Bart a ruff. Bart returned the DT and declarer claimed ten tricks.

In the Closed Room, Pratap used Bramley's long-time favorite convention and opened Flannery. Zia overcalled 3D. Dan Morse, with 2 hearts and 3 spades, chose hearts as the 7-card fit. Pratap raised to game.

Like 4C, with the Kx of hearts in the pocket and clubs no worse than 3-1, the hand is cold for seven. Garner led the DT, Morse won in dummy and played a heart to the queen and cashed the HA. When the king fell, He led the C5 to dummy (disdaining the wish trick had he led the C3!!) He pulled trump with the jack and ten of hearts and cashed the queen and king of clubs. He claimed all thirteen tricks. 11 IMPs to Bramley... the first double digit swing of the day!







As lucky as Bramley was on Board 7, he gave most of it back on Board 8.

In the Open Room, Woolsey opened a 10-12 NT. Lall showed the majors. Bramley passed and Gupta bid 2D, likely showing equal majors. Kit doubled showing diamonds; Lall bid 2S; Bramley, with a 4-card holding in his partner's suit, competed with 3D. Gupta doubled and led the D5. Bramley won the ten and played a heart to the king. All roads lead to down two, the defense collecting one diamond, two spades, one heart and two clubs.

In the Closed Room, Morse and Pratap bid to 4S after Zia overcalled one diamond and Garner made a mixed raise in support.


Garner led the D3, won with dummy's ace. Morse led the SQ to the king and ace. He played the H3 to the 4,5,7. Zia led the S3 to the 4,8,J. The H2 went to the ace, and when the suit didn't split, Morse went quietly down one, losing two hearts, one spade, and one club.



Again, on Board 21, in the Open Room, Kit and Bart took the high road and bid game while Gupta and Lall took the low road and played in a partial.

The only alert in the auction was 2H showing spades. Against the game, Garner led the D8. Kit won in hand with the queen. He went about knocking out the CAK to take ten tricks. +430




final call where Woolsey chose to bid 3NT and Gupta chose to pass 3C.

3C was cold with an overtrick. Pratap led the D2 and in the end, the defense collected two clubs and a spade. Lall took his ten tricks to lose 7 IMPs in the process.





In the Open Room, Steve Garner, North, was declarer in 4H. Bramley led the SQ to Garner's ace. Garner cashed the HA!! He played a second heart to Bramley's king. Bramley played the DK and his small diamond to Woolsey. Woolsey played the SK, promoting the H9 in his partner's hand for the setting trick! Nice defense.

In the Open Room, Dan Morse, North, was declarer in 4H. Sontag led the SQ to Morse's ace. Morse cashed the HA. He played the H4 which Sontag won with the king. Sontag could have played the diamonds

as Bramley did to reach partner for the uppercut, but he tried the C8 instead. Morse flew with dummy's ace, ruffed a club in hand, and quickly played the HJ to remove the threat of the H9 in Sontag's hand.

Declarer had ten tricks. Contract making. 12 IMPs to Bramley




Senior Players:

We wanted to make you aware of the fact that the electronic environment provides the directors with full information about the time used by each pair for each bid or play. You do not have to summon the director when you think your opponent has taken an unreasonable amount of time for one action or for the entire segment of play. After a segment, you can ask the director to review the time taken by your opponents. At the completion of a hand, you can summon the director if you think the time taken provided Unauthorized Information to your opponent(s) and that might have influenced the opponent(s)' actions.

We want to discourage you from calling the director for general time issues during a segment, because that will only take more time, and will not provide the director with any additional information. Please call the director only if you think that a time issue has provided UI, and then only after the hand is over.





On Board 25, Gupta played in NT at both tables. Garner and Zia bid the game North/South in the Open Room. Gupta/Lall stole in the Closed room.



In the Open Room, Garner's 2D was multi. 2NT asks. 3D showed spades and a minimum. 3H asked for more but there was no more to tell and 3NT was to play.

Woolsey led the HQ (Rusinow). Zia won the ace. Zia played the SQ to Woolsey's king and Woolsey exited the C2, won with dummy's six. The H5 went to Woolsey's king. Woolsey cashed the SA, got out with a diamond and Zia claimed 10 tricks.

In the Closed table, things were more interesting...

Morse didn't think the North hand was a classic weak 2S. He passed and Lall passed. Pratap opened 1C and Gupta overcalled 1NT. Everyone passed.


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Morse led the SJ; Pratap played the queen and Gupta won his ace. Gupta led the D2 to the 9, 3, 6! Morse continued spades, leading the six to the 7, 4, 5. (Is this a "little, middle" wish trick... Ralph? Nick?)


Lall played the D4 to the ten and jack, Morse winning with his queen. Morse played the C6 to the king and Pratap cashed the DA to reach this position:



If Pratap cashes his HA, he will have Gupta endplayed in his hand in three suits for down three!

Pratap missed it at the table. He played the H7. Gupta won the queen and exited the HK to Pratap's ace, escaping for down two when all Pratap could so was cash his high hearts and exit a club. Pratap exited the C5. Gupta guessed correctly and played the queen, scoring both the CQ and SK!

6 IMPs to Gupta



On Board 37, in the Open Room, Garner/Zia bid 4S, certainly a good enough game to want to be there vulnerable in IMPs. Zia started the hand with a loser in spades, a loser in hearts, and a loser in diamonds IF he guesses correctly... potentially two losers in diamonds if he guesses wrong.

The guess became much less foreboding when Woolsey led the DT! Zia made the normal play of the jack and when it forced the ace, he had an easy ten tricks.


In the Closed Room, Berkowitz also led the DT, however, Morse/Pratap had stopped in 3S, rendering the matter moot!








Board 42 presented some interesting timing problems for both declarer and the defenders.

Woolsey led a heart to dummy's king. Zia played the D7 to his queen. Woolsey followed with the D8. Zia led the D4 on which Woolsey played the jack. Zia covered with the king and Bramley won the ace. A heart exit will give declarer a problem, but that wasn't clear to Bramley. The D8 was UDCA, but what was the DJ? Bramley exited with the DT, allowing Zia to score his S5.

Zia led to the HQ and came off dummy with the C3 to his queen and Woolsey's ace. Woolsey led the H2. Dummy's small club was discarded, and Bramley trumped. Bramley played a diamond on which Zia and Woolsey discarded clubs. Zia ruffed in dummy. The five card position was:



Zia cashed the SAK and was able to lead a club back to dummy and drawing the remaining trump to make his contract and score +620.

At the other table, Pratap won the HQ and led a diamond to his queen. Pratap lead a heart to dummy's king. This was followed by the SAK, getting the bad news. Pratap cashed the HA, discarding a club from dummy. Sontag ruffed the heart, cashed the DA and led a club to Berkowitz's ace creating this five card position

Berkowitz led the HJ and Sontag scored an uppercut for his SJ, setting the contract one trick. 12 IMPs to Gupta
