Kibitzing the Seniors

THERE WILL BE DEFERRED KIBITZING FOR ALL OF THE 2021 SENIOR USBC.

ROUND ROBIN KIBITZING ON REALBRIDGE KIBITZ SITE

To kibitz, go to **the RealBridge kibitzing website**, enter your name and click on Log In. Select **Kibitz 2021 Senior USBC**. You will be taken to a lobby where you will see a list of tables on the left and a chat box and list of people in the lobby on the right. The table listing shows the team & player names at each table, as well as the board number and trick being played. There will be information about the number of kibitzers at a table and whether there is audio/video commentary (a picture of a TV means there is). Click on a table to kibitz there.

At the table, you will see a hand diagram, and the bidding and play as it happened.

There is a chat window on the right of the screen. Anyone can type chat into the chat window.

Above the chat window are two dropdowns, for video commentary. If you want to hear someone who is commenting, select their name from one of the dropdowns. If two people are commenting, select both of them, **one from each dropdown**. The option "BROADCAST MY VIDEO" is for commentators - if you select this, your commentary will be available to anyone who wants to listen to you.

KO KIBITZING ON LOVEBRIDGE

You can follow the USBC on the <https://vugraph.lovebridge.com/> website. The stream is delayed; go to the schedule below for starting times for each segment.

Popcorn time! Do you want to listen to commentary? Search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentary. If it doesn't do anything, no one is commenting.

Nail biting! Do you want to be deeply involved? Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into four small screens – two of them showing the two tables of match you choose, the other two having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can also personalize the content in all your windows. (The 2x2 view is not available on mobiles.)

Think together! When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do and see whether your chosen player agrees.

More Information: Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner the arrow takes you the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

Navigation icons: while surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is also a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

Replay: After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board then the same buttons move you through list. Push every button and enjoy!





VuGraph Munchies

Light and Crispy Waffles

Ingredient Checklist

- ¾ cup all-purpose flour
- ¼ cup cornstarch
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon baking powder
- ¼ teaspoon baking soda
- ¾ cup buttermilk
- 6 tablespoons vegetable oil
- ¼ cup whole milk
- 1 large egg (separated)
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- ½ teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- Pure maple syrup (for serving)



Instructions Checklist

- **Step 1**
Preheat the oven to 200°. In a medium bowl, combine the flour, cornstarch, salt, baking powder and baking soda. In a glass measuring cup, blend the buttermilk, vegetable oil and milk. Beat in the egg yolk.
- **Step 2**
In a medium bowl, beat the egg white to soft peaks. Add the sugar and beat until firm and glossy. Beat in the vanilla.
- **Step 3**
Pour the liquid ingredients into the dry ingredients and whisk until just blended. Using a rubber spatula, gently fold in the beaten egg white until just incorporated.
- **Step 4**
Preheat an 8-inch square waffle iron and oil it lightly. Pour about 1 1/2 cups of the waffle batter into the preheated waffle iron and gently smooth the surface with a spatula. Bake for 4 minutes, or until browned and crisp. Transfer the waffles to the oven rack to keep warm and repeat with the remaining batter. Serve at once with maple syrup.

Potato Parmesan Puree

Ingredient Checklist

- 4 pounds Yukon Gold potatoes (about 10 medium potatoes), peeled and cut into 1/2-inch-thick slices
- 3 tablespoons kosher salt, plus more to taste
- 2 cups whole milk
- 1/2 cup unsalted butter (4 ounces), cut into pieces
- 2 ounces Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese, grated (about 1/4 cup)
- 1/8 teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg, plus more to taste
- Step 1**
Combine potatoes and salt in a large pot; add cold water to cover by 2 inches. Bring to a boil over high. Reduce heat to medium; simmer, undisturbed, until potatoes are very tender but not yet falling apart, about 20 minutes. Drain; let potatoes stand at room temperature until they look dry, about 5 minutes.
- Step 2**
Meanwhile, heat milk and butter pieces in a small saucepan over medium, stirring occasionally, until milk is steaming and butter is melted, about 3 minutes. Remove from heat.
- Step 3**
Pass potatoes through a ricer into large pot. Whisk in milk mixture, cheese, and nutmeg. Season with additional salt and nutmeg to taste.

Ingredient Checklist

- 1/2 pound crusty Italian bread, cut into 1-inch cubes (about 6 cups)
- 1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil
- 2 1/2 teaspoons kosher salt, divided
- 3/4 teaspoon ground white pepper, divided
- 1 pound challah bread, cut into 1-inch cubes (about 16 cups)
- 2 large sweet onions, coarsely chopped
- 1 large green bell pepper, coarsely chopped
- 4 celery stalks, coarsely chopped
- 1/2 cup unsalted butter (4 ounce), cut into pieces
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley
- 2 teaspoons chopped fresh sage
- 1/4 teaspoon poultry seasoning (such as McCormick)
- 1 cup unsalted vegetable stock, turkey stock, or chicken stock, plus more, if needed
- 3/4 cup fresh orange juice
- 4 large eggs, lightly beaten

Instructions Checklist

- **Step 1**
Preheat oven to 325°F. Place Italian bread cubes in a large bowl; drizzle olive oil over bread while stirring constantly. Season with 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon white pepper. Spread in a single layer on a parchment paper-lined rimmed baking sheet. Bake in preheated oven until toasted, about 30 minutes, stirring once halfway through cooking. Set 3 cups Italian bread croutons aside. (Bread will shrink during baking.) Reserve any remaining croutons for another use.
- **Step 2**
Spread challah bread cubes in a single layer on 2 parchment paper-lined rimmed baking sheets. Place 1 baking sheet on top oven rack and the other on bottom rack; bake at 325°F until challah is dry, about 15 minutes, rotating baking sheets top to bottom halfway through cooking. Set challah croutons aside.
- **Step 3**
Working in 2 batches, pulse onions, bell pepper, and celery in a food processor until finely chopped, about 3 times.
- **Step 4**
Melt butter in a large skillet over medium-high until sizzling. Add onion mixture, parsley, and sage, and cook, stirring often, until vegetables are just tender but not browned, about 15 minutes. Stir in poultry seasoning, remaining 2 teaspoons salt, and remaining 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Cook, stirring constantly, until fragrant, about 1 minute. Remove from heat.
- **Step 5**
Whisk together stock, orange juice, and eggs until thoroughly blended. Toss together Italian bread croutons, challah croutons, and onion mixture in a large bowl until combined. Gradually pour stock mixture into crouton mixture, stirring constantly, adding more stock if stuffing looks dry. Let stand 10 minutes.
- **Step 6**
Spread stuffing in an even layer on a parchment paper-lined rimmed baking sheet; cover tightly with aluminum foil. Bake at 325°F until hot, about 30 minutes. Uncover and bake until lightly browned, about 15 minutes.

Hospitality Information for Face-toFace in Schaumburg, IL

Because of Covid, we won't be able to provide the full, wonderful hospitality we have in the past, but we will do what we can.

Hosts Evvie Gilbert and Maya Alela for the Open and Women's and Julie Arbit and Christian Jolly for the Mixed and Seniors will be in our usual hospitality suite (Room 2321). They will provide grab and go breakfast and lunch each day, starting on Tuesday, Oct. 5th.

Breakfast: From 8-10 am. There will be individually packaged cereal, fruit, hard boiled eggs, bagels, and some hot options. Also individual butter, jam, peanut butter, and cream cheese, as well as condiment packages. They will be making coffee and will have individual packages of sugar, sweetener, and dairy & non-dairy creamers. For those of you who prefer Keurig coffee, that will also be available in the hospitality suite. We are limiting access to 6 players at any one time, so we ask that you come to the suite, pick up a large to go container and put the smaller packages in that to take with you as quickly as you can, and then go someplace else to eat. **Masks that cover your nose & mouth must be always worn in the Hospitality Suite.** There will be a hand sanitizer station near the door and we encourage you to sanitize your hands before choosing what to take.

Lunch: From 2-4 pm (the first half of play each day ends at 2:35; we encourage those of you who are sitting out the 2nd quarter to go early). There will be a main dish (sandwiches, chicken, main dish salads, pizza) as well as individually packaged tuna salad, green salad, cheese, fruit, and berries. Also all the individual packages of add-ons we have for breakfast. Water and soft drinks will be available in refrigerators.

Let us know what you want: If there is a menu for a future day's lunch hanging on the wall outside the Hospitality Suite, please mark what you want, so we have a better idea of what to order.

Playing Rooms & Player's Break Room

We will have bottled water in the playing rooms and if there is a refrigerator in a playing room, we'll stock it with soft drinks.

We will also have bottled water in the Player's Break Room (1321), as well as soft drinks, Nespresso, some packaged snacks, and some fruit.

Masks that cover your nose & mouth must be always worn in the Player's Break Room, so you may not eat and drink in the room.



The North players, other than Bitterman, chose to show a limit raise, either by bidding a forcing 1NT and jumping in the suit or by using a conventional limit raise sequence. Bitterman started by bidding a game forcing 2C, ostensibly natural, but could have been a two-card suit. Cappelli's 2S bid showed a six-card suit. Bitterman's 4D call was a splinter in support of spades. Knowing that his partner had a singleton diamond and a natural club suit, Cappelli could see that his CK, DA and good spades should produce a good play for 6S. Cappelli bid RKC Blackwood and when North showed two aces, he bid 6S.

The opening lead was the H9. Cappelli won the HA and Shermer followed with the H2. The SA and SK drew the trumps. Cappelli cashed the CK, and, probably because the H9 looked like it could be a doubleton, he finessed to dummy's CT. When the CT held, Cappelli cashed the CA and trumped a club, taking all thirteen tricks for +1010.

At the other table, N/S pair played 4H and made five.

Consider whether East should have false carded with HQ at trick one. This might have made it look like West started with KJ92 or K982 of hearts, giving Cappelli misleading information about the distribution. It's a tough play to make, but certainly a possibility at this level of competition!

Everything You Ever Wanted to Know About Using the LoveBridge Tablets But Were Afraid to Ask! From Jan Martel



Signing in

The tablets at each seat will have a list of players on the team that is supposed to be playing at that seat. When you get to your chosen seat, select your name which will sign you in to that tablet. Please do so accurately so we don't give credit to someone else for your brilliant plays.

System Summary Forms and Convention Cards

Each pair's System Summary form and convention card has been loaded into the Lovebridge software and you can access your opponent's SSF and convention card on your tablet by tapping on the blue convention card button in the upper left corner of the control buttons on the top right of your screen. The SSF and convention card are both there as are the two ACBL defenses to multi 2D for each pair that plays it (you will have to scroll down to access all of the pages that are included). You can look at the opponents' SSF & convention card any time during the bidding and play by tapping the convention card button. You do not have to bring your SSF, convention card or ACBL multi defense to the table with you.

Practice on tablets

As I've said before, we will have tablets set up in the lobby on Monday, Oct. 4th for you to use to become familiar with the interface. We will also have tablets in the playing rooms on Tuesday morning from 9:00 am on, and we will have at least one person who can help you if you need help. Once play starts, you can call the director if you need help with the tablets as well as for normal director calls (the director button is in red in the upper right corner set of controls)

Undo's

When you make a bid, you will have 3 seconds before it is shown to any other player to be sure it's what you intended and cancel it if it isn't (the bid has a "cancel" button under it). If you want to take back a bid after 3 seconds, you can call the director and ask for an undo, which will be allowed only in very unusual situations.

As on RealBridge, you can choose to play cards either by dragging them onto the center of the screen or by using 2 taps on them, so you should be able to avoid misclicks. During play, the only way you can undo a play is to call the director; again it will be allowed only in unusual situations when you can convince the director that the card you placed on the table was the result of an accident and should not be considered a played card.

Input devices


Each of you will get a stylus which you can use instead of your finger to touch the tablet's screen. The stylus should allow more accurate entries than your finger. If you prefer to use a mouse & remote keyboard for entry, that is possible, but we need to know **in advance** so we have enough bluetooth keyboard + mouse combinations available. There are also bluetooth keyboards with trackpads if you prefer that to a separate mouse. Please let Jan know if you want either of these options. If a lot of people want to use them, I may have to charge you something for them. If you have a bluetooth keyboard + mouse or trackpad that you like, you can bring it to the tournament, and we will almost certainly be able to connect it to your tablet.

Chat

You will be able to use the chat button to chat to one or both of your opponents or the entire table. If you want to discuss something with your partner after a hand is over, you will do so in the same way you would at a normal screen table - by chatting to the table; the only difference is that your chat must be typed, it cannot be verbal.






The USBF wants to make the transition to the tablets in Schaumburg as easy as possible. To that end, we are providing you with the screenshots you see here.


The mechanics are simple. It is a matter of familiarizing yourself with the "look" of the screen.

There wasn't room on the screenshot to point to it, but if you look closely to the left of the timer, you'll see a little >. If you click on that it opens a chat window, where you can chat to either of your opponents or to both of your opponents or to the table. You can't send private chat to your partner during bidding and play, but if you're quick you might be able to between hands.

Here's what your bid looks like for 3 seconds after you make it, during which time you can cancel it for any reason:







At the top left corner you will always see the vulnerability and the dealer from your perspective (you are at the bottom).



You can change how to play your cards in the Settings Menu.

Explanation

User guide - self alert

The logic of alerts and explanations in the LoveBridge system can work multiple ways. You will use it **with self alert and screened tables**.

You only alert your own calls. Both opponents can ask for more information, and they will always know the same details about bids.

Alerting

When you want to make an alertable call, you have multiple options:

You can **tap in the input field** and type your explanation here.

You can **tap on the alert button** so that your opponent knows it's alertable.



You can **tap the envelope button** and, after placing your call, the bridge keyboard will pop up. Here you can type your explanation.

Note: Your call will be alerted as well.

Bridge keyboard

Common bridge expressions are organized in seven categories to help you type bridge related messages with only a few taps.


You can type any other message using a traditional keyboard.



Multiple words in every category

Bidding Panel

The closed envelope shows that you have an **unread message**.



You can always give additional information by tapping on your bid. Make sure that your explanation contains complete information about a specific call.

You can ask for additional information by sending a question mark.
 You can ask specific questions using the chat.
 (More about the chat on the next page.)


When you send an explanation, both of your opponents will receive it. Both opponents can ask for more information.

Received Explanations

 When you read the explanation, you can **close the window** with the X button.

You can ask for further information  by simply tapping the send button.

Make sure you only press the send button when you would like to ask a question.




Chat

You can use the chat to send private messages to your opponents, or you can chat with the entire table.



You can find the chat in the top left corner of the screen. You can open it by tapping the chat bar.



You can only send private messages to your partner when you are not currently playing any boards.

Android Keyboard

When writing an explanation, you can press the “done” button to switch back to the bridge keyboard.



To write a question mark: You can use the shift button, a long press on the question mark or switch to the symbol keyboard.



Frequently Asked Questions

How can I unalert my bid?

You can press on your bid, turn off the alert switch and tap on the send button.



Can my partner see when I ask for further information?

No, your partner will only know that your opponent has changed the explanation.

Can I take cards back?

There is no undo button, you can use double tap or drag and drop to make sure you play the card you want to play. You can call the director to take your card back, and they will inform you about applicable rules.

Can I take bids back?

There is a cancel time (can be set to 0-5 seconds) for the bid, when you can review your call, and take it back if it was a misclick. No other player can see it during these seconds. Directors can take back bids as well.

Why can't I see the bidding during playing?

According to the rules, you are not allowed to see the bidding once the playing has begun. You can only see the bidding before you play your first card.

Why can't I see my partner's cards when I'm the dummy?

Just as playing with cards, you can not see the declarer's cards when you are the dummy.

Gupta/Lall had an accident on the hand. Kahn opened 1D. Lall made a takeout double with his 20 count, preparing to rebid no-trump. Gupta responded 1S and Lall bid 2NT. Rothstein passed and it was back to Gupta with his meager 4 count. Gupta just wanted out!

He could have bid 3C, hoping Lall would take a preference to 3S and he could pass, but he likely thought 3C sounded forward going. Gupta was pretty certain the Lall would hold at least three of each major for his takout double so he "corrected" 2NT to 3S, hoping Lall would pass.

Most everyone plays that passing the 2NT bid is really the only negative unless there is a relay system available. Having no such relay, Lall raised 3S to game and Gupta was forced to play in his 4-2 fit.

Needless to say this was not successful. The contract failed by three vulnerable tricks when every suit split badly.

Binder/Watson, at the other table in this match, played in 1NT, collecting seven tricks and 9 IMPs for their efforts.

Explanation from Jan of how match one was adjudicated when Billy Cohen's Apple device was unable to sync with RealBridge:

First, to clarify the issue, I got an email from RealBridge late last night warning me that anyone running on a Mac with a very old operating system (Yosemite or earlier) would not be able to log on from Chrome or Safari and would have to either update their OS or use Firefox. This glitch was just discovered and it's for some very complicated tech reasons.

When I got to Billy's table and Ron said Billy was using a MacBook Air and probably hadn't updated his OS in a while, I thought that might be the issue. Billy checked and was running Yosemite, clearly the problem. Billy didn't have Firefox installed and didn't know how to download and install it. I tried to get him online with his phone, which had been updated to the latest OS, but it turns out that the "glitch" is even worse for a phone - people can no longer play on an iPhone, only on an iPad, a fact later confirmed by the RealBridge staff. All I knew at the time was that Billy wasn't able to log on from his phone. And by that time the round was almost over so that table was never going to play any boards.

Will Watson, DIC, reviewed the Conditions of Contest for this event and the General Conditions of Contest and arrived at a compromise. In accordance with section V.H. of the Senior USBC Conditions of Contest, "If a board has been played at one table and not the other, the DIC will assign a score based on the Cross-IMPs for the result at the table where the board was played," Will has calculated the score of the match based on the other table's result. That is 1.36 IMPs in favor of Reynolds, and is being rounded to 1. Will felt that was not enough for the Reynolds team, who didn't get to play any of the boards, so he awarded them, in addition, +3 IMPs per board for 3 boards and nothing for the rest. So their score for the match is +10 (the +1 from the other table plus 3*3).

Because we were unaware of the glitch in time for Billy to update his machine and play the first match in advance, Will decided that it was unfair to penalize the Lewis team, so their score for the match is -1.

The good news is that Billy has now had his operating system updated sufficiently to be able to use RealBridge going forward. He and I logged on and were able to see and hear one another.

Passell opened 1H and reversed to 2S over Levine's game forcing 2C bid. Passell supported clubs over 2NT and Levine bid 4C (RKC). Passell showed three keycards, and when Levine bid 5C, Passell raise to slam with his 4th trump and undisclosed void.

Binder led the D3. Even though Levine knew that North was likely to hold the DA, he discarded a spade from dummy and allowed Watson to win the trick. If clubs broke 2-2, Levine would have an easy twelve tricks: two diamonds, two hearts, one spade and seven club tricks. Even if clubs broke 3-1, so long as the the queen was singleton, Levine would likely be able to collect twelve tricks...

Watson won the DA and returned a small diamond. Levine's won his ten. Levine led a club to the ace and returned a club. When North showed out, he was sadly down one.

At the other table, Rothstein opened 1H and raised to 3C directly over Kahn's 2C bid. Trumps were set and Kahn/Rothstein cuebid their way to 6C.

Wold led the S2 and Kahn had to finesse to come anywhere near 12 tricks. He ducked to his SQ and was off to a good start. Kahn played a club to the ace and a club to his king, followed by the HK and a heart to the ace. He trumped a heart, Wold overruffing. Wold returned a spade to dummy's jack. Kahn trumped a heart, establishing the suit and claimed twelve tricks. +1370 E/W

Binder led the D7 to North's jack and declarer's queen. Foster played the HK, which was ducked around. Foster cashed the DA and trumped a diamond, establishing the DT.

Foster led the C4 from dummy and won the trick with his CK. He led the H5 to dummy's HQ and Watson's ace. Watson cashed the CA and exited with the H9. Foster won the HJ and drew the last trump. He cashed the DT for his eighth trick. Binder was unsure of the position. He discarded the CQ and Foster had eleven tricks without taking the spade finesse. If Binder discards a spade on the DT, Binder will take the spade finesse and still collect ten tricks.

At the other table Foster's teammates were aggressive and took the push to 3S over the opponent's 3H bid.

3S was defeated three tricks for -150 N/S.
