### 2021 JLall Online Teams #2 Upcoming Event from the USBF

The second USBF JLall Online Teams event (JLall2) will be held from February 12-15, 2021 and February 26-March1, 2021 on RealBridge. It will be similar to JLall1, with a few minor changes suggested by the players in JLall1. Jlall2 is open to all Active USBF members who have paid their USBF dues on or before February 1, 2021.

#### Event Schedule and Format - NOTE DATE CHANGE

- Play each day will start at 1:00 pm EST and end no later than 9:30 pm EST. Time per board will remain 7-1/2 minutes, but we will have longer breaks, based on responses to the JLall1 Exit Poll.
- There will be no more than 32 teams, each with 4-6 players.
- The entry fee for the event is \$300 per team.
- DIC for the event is McKenzie Myers. Tournament Organizer is Jan Martel. Software guru is Al Hollander.
- The event format will be:

#### Round Robin Stage 1, Feb. 12-14:

Everyone plays 3 days of a "split field" Round Robin with 10 board matches; there are two Round Robin groups, to be named later (suggestions welcome). Teams will be assigned to the two groups based on a "draft" by the top two teams (chosen by a vote of all teams). The top 5 teams in each group will qualify for the KO Round of 16. The bottom 6 teams in each group will be eliminated. The five teams in the middle of each group ("bubble teams") will play in Stage 2 of the Round Robin.

#### Round Robin Stage 2, Feb. 15th (Presidents' Day):

Each bubble team plays a 10-board match against each bubble team from the other group, scored at VPs with carryover from the first 3 days. The top 6 teams qualify for the Round of 16. The bottom 4 teams are eliminated. **Knockouts, Feb. 26-Mar. 1:** 

- One match per day. 56 boards per match. If both finalists want a longer match (60 or 64 boards), we will have that.
- There will be a Captains' meeting on Feb. 23rd to set the KO bracket. The precise method of setting the bracket will be set forth in the Special Conditions of Contest. Summary: the top 4 teams from Round Robin Stage 1 will select their opponents for the Round of 16 from the bottom 8 qualifiers. The remaining qualifiers will be shuffled in groups to fill the bracket.
- The matches will be played on RealBridge. During the bidding & play, each player will see & hear their screenmate (N&E, S&W). Before and after each match, teammates will be seated at one table. We are trying to find a way to allow the players who were sitting out to join you with audio (players who sat out can see & hear their teammates and be heard but not seen).
- There will be no real-time kibitzing allowed for any match. Kibitzers will be able to watch after a delay. For the Round Robin, the delay will be until each match is complete so kibitzing does not provide "state of the match" information. For the first half of each KO match, each board will be shown when all tables have completed it. For the second half of each KO match, kibitzing will start one hour after play starts. We will try to have voice commentary, and may limit chat at the tables late in the event to approved commentators.
- RealBridge will archive bidding, play & score information for the event. We will also post scores on this website.
- We will take a vote of all teams entered in the event to determine whether to continue to have "open notes."

#### **How to Enter**

- Entries are now open. Entries will close on the earlier of January 15th or when 32 teams (and 2 alternates) have entered. You must be logged in to this website to enter. After you have logged in, click on "Enter 2021 JLall2" under the User Menu and complete the entry form.
- Your entry is not complete until you have 4 players. You cannot "save" a place in the event by entering a team with fewer than 4 players.
- Teams can freely change their rosters until January 29th, when the division of teams into Round Robin groups will start. After January 29th, a team may change its roster only because of unexpected occurrences and only if the change does not substantially strengthen or weaken the team. Roster changes are made by email to the Tournament Organizer. If an added player or pair is not able to meet the deadlines for system filing, they may not play any unusual method unless it is played by another pair in the event.

# Christmas Ideas...

#### **Spiral Ham with Cranberry Glaze**

#### Ingredients

- 1 bone-in fully cooked spiral-sliced ham (8 pounds)
- 1 can (14 ounces) whole-berry cranberry sauce
- 1 package (12 ounces) fresh or frozen cranberries
- 1 jar (12 ounces) red currant jelly
- 1 cup light corn syrup
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger

#### Directions

- Place ham on a rack in a shallow roasting pan. Cover and bake at 325° for 2-1/2 hours.
- Meanwhile, for glaze, combine the remaining ingredients in a saucepan. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered, until cranberries pop, stirring occasionally. Remove from the heat; set aside.
- Uncover ham; bake until a thermometer reads 140°, about 30 minutes longer, basting twice with 1-1/2 cups glaze. Serve remaining glaze with ham.

#### **Triple Cheese Broccoli Puff**

#### Ingredients

- 1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 3 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 6 large eggs
- 1 cup 2% milk
- 3/4 cup biscuit/baking mix
- 3 cups frozen chopped broccoli, thawed
- 2 cups shredded Monterey Jack cheese
- 1 cup 4% cottage cheese
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

#### Directions

- In a small skillet, saute mushrooms in butter until tender; set aside. In a large bowl, beat the cream cheese, eggs, milk and biscuit mix just until combined. Stir in the broccoli, cheeses, salt and mushrooms.
- Pour into a greased 2-1/2-qt. baking dish. Bake, uncovered, at 350° until a thermometer reads 160°, 50-60 minutes. Let stand for 10 minutes before serving.

#### **Crisp Caraway Twists**

#### Ingredients

- 1 large egg
- 1 tablespoon water
- 1 teaspoon country-style Dijon mustard
- 3/4 cup shredded Swiss cheese
- 1/4 cup finely chopped onion
- 2 teaspoons minced fresh parsley
- 1-1/2 teaspoons caraway seeds
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1 sheet frozen puff pastry, thawed



#### Directions

- In a small bowl, beat egg, water and mustard; set aside. In another bowl, combine the cheese, onion, parsley, caraway seeds and garlic salt.
- Unfold pastry sheet; brush with egg mixture. Sprinkle cheese mixture lengthwise over half of the pastry. Fold pastry over filling; press edges to seal. Brush top with remaining egg mixture. Cut widthwise into 1/2-in. strips; twist each strip several times.
- Place 1 in. apart on greased <u>baking sheets</u>, pressing ends down. Bake at 375° for 15-20 minutes or until golden brown. Serve warm.

#### Parmesan Bacon Bubble Bread... serve with pesto, marinara or alfredo dipping sauce!

#### **Ingredients**


- 1 loaf frozen bread dough, thawed (16 ounces)
- 1/4 cup butter, melted
- 3/4 cup shredded Parmesan cheese
- 6 bacon strips, cooked and finely crumbled, divided
- 1/3 cup finely chopped green onions, divided
- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
- 2 tablespoons salt-free herb seasoning blend
- 1-1/2 teaspoons sugar
- Optional: Alfredo sauce or marinara sauce

#### Directions

- Turn dough onto a lightly floured surface; divide and shape into 16 rolls. Place butter in a shallow bowl. In a
  large bowl, combine the shredded Parmesan, half the bacon, half the green onions, grated Parmesan, seasoning
  blend and sugar. Dip dough pieces in melted butter, then toss with cheese mixture to coat. Stack pieces in a
  greased 9-in. cast-iron skillet.
- Cover with a kitchen towel; let rise in a warm place until almost doubled, about 45 minutes. Preheat oven to 350°. Bake until golden brown, 20-25 minutes. Top with remaining bacon and green onions. Serve warm and, if desired, with Alfredo or marinara sauce.

Board 15 provided an assortment of results. The spade game either made four or five or was defeated one or two tricks while the no-trump game, played only twice, once made and once failed by two.

Clearly, no-trump depended on the opening lead. Where Mike Passell declared 3NT from West, Denny Clerkin led the C9 and the defense collected a quick six tricks. Where Glenn Milgrim declared 3NT from East, John Onstott led the DJ and the offense took five spades, one heart and three diamonds before conceding.

In 4S, seven players led the CQ after their partner showed either natural clubs or the desire for a club lead. This lead turns out to be the best lead possible for the offense... who would a thought? Whether North overtakes the club or lets the queen hold, the defense is helpless.

South can switch to the DJ but it is too late to score a ruff for partner since the CQ was the only entry to South's hand to give his partner the ruff.

If the defense starts with three rounds of clubs, declarer will take 11 tricks by squeezing South in the red suits.

When, however, the defense started with the DJ, 4S failed. Where Gloria Bart was South against Jeff Wolfson, she led the DJ. Wolfson won and played a diamond back. Les Bart ruffed, cashed the CK, led a heart through Wolfson's hand to Gloria's king, and Gloria cashed her CQ for down one.

The screen you see above is one of the great things on RealBridge. You get several comparisons all at once. You see the contract, the players (by their real names) and the opening lead at each table ... credit to RealBridge for a new and different way to keep things interesting.

# Meet the Players

#### **Biography Online from 2005**



As a player, with over 25,000 masterpoints, **Jerry Helms**, has appeared 31 consecutive times on the ACBL Top 500 list, with over 300 Regional wins.

When the ACBL established its Teacher Accreditation Program (TAP) in 1987, Jerry was asked to participate as a trainer. During his tenure, he certified over 2,000 bridge teachers. Since 1994, he has served annually as an expert panelist for the ABTA. He is a member of the National Speakers Program, and he provides lectures during the Spring, Summer, and Fall National Bridge Tournaments.

In addition to professional play, much of Jerry's time is spent performing seminars across North America. Jerry is a featured columnist for both Better Bridge Magazine, and the ACBL Bulletin. His byline for both magazines is "Ask Jerry" He is the author of Helms to HELLO, which is now in its third printing, along with The Best of Ask Jerry, released in 2017. His publication, Over My Shoulder, is another good read.

Helms, a Platinum Life Master of Charlotte NC, is a full-time player and teacher. He was second in the Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs in 1995 and has numerous other high finishes in NABC events. He is a frequent guest expert lecturer at NABCs. He is the co-inventor of the HELLO convention that is used over the opponents opening 1NT bid.

Jill J. Meyers (born February 13, 1950) is an American bridge player from Santa Monica, California. Sometime prior to the 2014 European and World Meets (summer and October), she ranked 7th among 73 Women World Grand Masters by world masterpoints (MP) and 1st by placing points that do not decay over time.

Meyers was born in New York City and earned a B.A. from Tulane University. She and her sister Nina moved to Los Angeles in 1972 and started to play duplicate bridge there, where Ed Davis was her first teacher (they still have a partnership). From 1979 she studied law at University of West Los Angeles and she passed the California bar in 1983, after which she played bridge more seriously. She is married to Sid Brownstein and is a self-employed "Music Consultant for Motion Picture, TV and Advertising industries". Before 1988 she worked in music departments within the film industry.

Meyers was inducted ito the ACBL Hall of Fame in 2014.






# USBF Supporting Membership



- 1. Enter the fantasy brackets, run on Bridge Winners, for the USBF trials choosing our Open and Senior teams for the World Championships. The highest-ranking Supporting Member in the fantasy brackets for each of these two events will win the prize of your choice either an online match against the USBC winners or dinner with them at the next NABC.
- 2. Receive daily emails during the USBF Championships. These will summarize the previous day's results and provide vugraph information and links to daily bulletins containing pictures and commentary on individual hands.
- 3. Upon advanced request, make arrangements for you to kibitz a USBF member of your choice for a session once each year either at an NABC or the USBF Championships.
- 4. Upon advanced request, we will arrange for you to be one of the vugraph commentators for one session of the team trials.

A Supporting Membership is \$25 for one year (\$75 for 3 years) and the ACBL now offers you the chance to become an USBF Supporting Member when you renew your ACBL membership. If you don't want to wait that long, you can join by choosing the red Donate Now button on the USBF website. Your donation will be used to cover inevitable expenses: attorney fees, accounting fees, website support services, tournament directors, insurance, WBF dues, and vugraph operators. The USBF is an all-volunteer organization. Our meetings are by conference call and at NABCS. Board members and the organization's officers are not compensated for meetings, travel, or hotel expenses.

Rigal opened 1C (which could be a doubleton) rather than opening 1H on his anemic 5-card major. Becker overcalled 1D. Glen Milgrim doubled showing hearts. Rigal's 2H bid showed 4+ hearts. Milgrim's double of 3D was a game try and Barry had a clear acceptance.

Becker cashed the DA and king and shifted to the H9. If hearts are divided 2-2, the hand is over. If hearts are not 2-2, it's reasonable to expect that West might hold the QJx since East was known to hold length in diamonds. If this is true, West will be automatically end-played.

Not so fast! Barry cashed the HA and Kenny Kranyak discarded a diamond from West!!


Rigal led a spade to the queen and cashed the SA. Playing upside down count, Kranyak played the S6 followed by the S3 while Becker played the S5 followed by the ten.

Rigal is a trusting soul. He believed his opponents. He concluded that East held 2-3-6-2 distribution. As such, he cashed the CAK and played a spade, on which Becker discarded a diamond. Rigal exited with a heart and Becker was forced to yield a ruff/sluff. Well played, Barry!

At the other table, the play to the first six tricks was identical, but Rigal's counterpart, Bob Cappelli, relied on the endplay scenario and cashed a third spade. Jeff Aker, sitting East, refused to trump the third spade. Had he ruffed, he could have exited with a club and defeated 4H easily. If Cappelli had drawn the same inference as Rigal, he could cash two clubs and exit with a heart and succeed as Rigal did. Instead, however, Cappelli exited with a heart. Aker won and played a club through to defeat the contract. 12 IMPs to Simson


Board 14 was played in a part-score, usually clubs by N/S, at thirteen of the fourteen tables. There were a few who played it elsewhere. The resulting scores ranged from +130 to -150 depending on the suit and level of play.

Bruce Ferguson and Billy Miller were a little more aggressive than most. Ferguson, despite his lack of high card points, jumped to 3NT based on a diamond fit and a double club stopper.

Jeff Meckstroth led the CK. Rodwell followed with the encouraging C4. Ferguson won and played a diamond to the ace. A second diamond was played and ducked by Meckstroth. Rodwell discarded the CT. On the third diamond, Eric discarded the C5. Jeff won the DA and shifted to the S2. Rodwell created a "wish trick" by winning the SA rather than the SK. Eric cashed the CQ.

Rodwell realized the defense would need two more spade tricks to defeat 3NT. If Meckstroth held the SJ and declarer held the QT of spades, the best hope was to make declarer guess wrong. Rodwell led the S8, Ferguson covered with the ST and Meckstroth won with the tricky SQ. Jeff could not continue spades, since he would be leading into declarer's hypothetical K9 tenace.

He exited with a heart. Ferguson won the HA, cashed two diamonds and the CJ. Meckstroth discarded three hearts and declarer took the last two tricks with the H:KJ, scoring nine tricks for +400. Obviously this hand could have been defeated two tricks with less tricky defense. (The wonder of false cards...)





At the other table, the contract was different, played North/South, defended by Meckwell's teammates.

Jerry Clerkin was declarer in the seemingly normal 3C contract. It's easy to see that declarer has five top losers... when looking at all four hands: two trumps, two hearts and a diamond. But again, this is a case of disappearing losers.

Mike Passell led the DJ, which was ducked to declarer's queen. Clerkin led a club to Passell's ace. Mike didn't have an easy way to diagnose his partner's major suit holdings, so he continued with the DT which was ducked around and ruffed by declarer. Jerry Clerkin cashed the CQ and ran four rounds of spades discarding a heart. The defense scored a club and a heart. Declarer took ten tricks for +130 and 11 IMPs to the Nadel team.

Three other pairs also made ten tricks in clubs. One pair made exactly nine tricks when the opponents started with a heart to the jack, followed by the HA and a low heart. Declarer discarded a diamond on the third heart and East ruffed with a natural trump trick. Several pairs held clubs to eight tricks by winning the DA at trick one.





Helms and Schulte had a good auction to arrive in the diamond slam on Board 29. Of course, their opponents did not make it as hard on them as their teammates did at the other table. At Helms/Schulte's table, South did not open his ten HCP including a singleton ace of diamonds. Schulte was able to open 1D. Helms splintered spades; Shulte cued clubs; Helms cued hearts; Schulte cued spades and Helms placed the contract in slam. The lie of the cards makes it easy to take 12 tricks. You can't misguess the diamonds with the ace singleton in front of the king.

At the other table, Bitterman opened 1C on the South hand. Cohen, short in hearts with good clubs, had no convenient bid. He passed. Capelli responded 1H and after two passes, Cohen reopened with double. Capelli bid 2H; Berkowitz bid 3D; Bitterman bid 3H; and with the deck sounding like it had at least 60 HCP, Cohen signed off in the diamond game. 13 IMPs to Capelli
