Comments to the Editor

In yesterday's Daily Bulletin, Board 47 was written up on page 17.

Ron Gerard emailed to point out that West's spade holding on that board as well as North's heart holding on Board 9 from Session 3 (below) were perfect hands for an infrequently used convention named "Kantar 3NT."

I looked up **Kantar 3NT** and for those who don't know, it is defined as:


An opening 3NT showing a solid 7-card major without any outside aces and with or without a side king.

Response	Meaning
Pass	Best place to play with adequate
4C	Ask opener to identify a possible

Request for opener to signoff in major 4D/H

This convention appeared in the ACBL Bulletin in July of 2011.

Assume a diamond is led against 6H by South. Declarer wins it in hand, cashed two rounds of trump ending in dummy and plays a spade to the king. If the SK wins, declarer cashes a diamond discarding a spade from dummy, draws trumps, and plays a second spade toward hand. If E holds the SA, the hand is over. If W holds the SA, they will exit with a diamond or



a spade. Declarer wins and takes the club finesse.

In essence, declarer gets the opportunity to test all the possibilities. If North plays it, a club lead will force declarer to guess immediately which black suit is working.





Nail biting!

Do you want to be deeply involved? Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into four small screens – two of them showing the two tables of the match you choose, the other two having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can also personalize the content in all your windows. (The 2x2 view is not available on mobiles.)

Think together!

When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do and see whether your chosen player agrees.

More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner the arrow takes you to the scoresheet, DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is also a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

Replay:

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board, the same buttons move you through the list. Push every button and enjoy!

2023 USBCs Hospitality

Although the Covid situation has improved, it is still out there. To keep our players and staff safe, we want to keep the number of people in the suite to a minimum at any one time. Our wonderful hostesses, Maya Alela and Marie-France Benoit will host you in our usual suite (Room 2321). Grab and go breakfast and lunch each day, except that on the first Monday and Tuesday, when lunch will be available in the Copper, Sage, and Maize meeting rooms off the corridor running from the hotel's front door to the back door.

Breakfast: From 8-10 am. There will be individually packaged cereal, fruit, hard boiled eggs, bagels, with some hot options. There will be individual butter, jam, peanut butter, and cream cheese, as well as condiment packages. Maya & Marie-France will be making coffee and will have individual packages of sugar, sweetener, and dairy & non-dairy creamers. For those of you who prefer Keurig coffee, that will also be available. We ask that you come to the suite, pick up a large to go container and put the smaller packages in that container to take with you. Then, as quickly as you can, go someplace else to eat.

Masks that cover your nose & mouth must be worn in the Hospitality Suite at all times. There will be a hand sanitizer station near the door and we encourage you to sanitize your hands before selecting your food.

Lunch will be available in the hospitality suite from 2-4 (the first half of play each day ends at 2:15; we encourage those of you who are sitting out the 2nd quarter to go early.) There will be a main dish (sandwiches, chicken, salads, pizza) as well as tuna salad, green salad, cheese, fruit and berries. Also, all the individual packages of add-ons we have for breakfast. Water and soft drinks will be available in refrigerators

The **Bermuda Bowl**, **Venice Cup**, **d'Orsi Senior Bowl** and the **Wuhan Cup** are **for national teams**, respectively Open, Women, Seniors and Mixed, representing their countries, qualified from the 8 WBF Zonal Conferences.

The **World Transnational Open Teams** is **open**, without any qualification, to all teams, national or transnational, which want to participate, accordingly to the conditions of contest.

The **World Bridge Teams Championships**, the oldest WBF Championship, grew out of private initiatives principally by the late Norman Bach. The first world championship for the Bermuda Bowl was held in 1950, in Bermuda, 8 years before the World Bridge Federation itself was formed. After the first event of the series, the Bermuda Bowl developed into a regular challenge match between the USA and the winners of the European Championship, but in 1957 the contest widened to included teams representing other zones of the WBF.

In 1974, in Venice, Italy, a new event was launched, the Venice Cup. It started as a challenge match between women's teams from the USA and Italy (Europe 's representative) and today it is the equivalent of Bermuda Bowl for women, organized under the same laws and format.

A third series, the Senior Bowl, for senior players was added in 2001. Ernesto d'Orsi, Past President of the WBF and a member of the WBF Committee of Honor and the WBF Executive Council, presented the d'Orsi Seniors Trophy for the winners of this Championship at the World Teams Championships held in Brazil in 2009.

In March 2018 in Philadelphia the Executive Council added a fourth series for Mixed Teams starting from 2019 in Wuhan, China. This new event was named after the City of Wuhan which presented the prestigious trophy and provided, and will provide for the future editions, replicas for the winners.



Meet the Players...

During those years Giorgia made exceptional friendships, visited an incredible number of countries and opened her mind to as many new and different cultures as she could.

All of those experiences, together with the relevant bridge related results, led Giorgia to the decision of leaving Italy and moving to New York with the hope of finding America in the bridge world.

During her "Junior Career" Giorgia has achieved several notable results including a World Junior Women Pairs Championship gold medal in Atlanta 2013, two bronze World Girls Team Championships medals in Taicang — China — 2011 and Istanbul — Turkey — 2014 and a European Girls Team Championship in Wroclaw — Poland — 2013.

Giorgia also participated for many years in Italian Junior Championships winning several Gold, Silver and Bronze medals and, in 2014, won the Italian Mixed Teams Championship playing for the Lavazza team, partnering with Norberto Bocchi.

In February 2015 Giorgia moved to NYC where she has thus far established herself as a regular professional player and teacher and quickly grew great relationships with many players and clubs.

Since moving to the United States, Giorgia has participated in numerous competitions - Nationals and Trials - achieving remarkable results.

Among the most prestigious a 2nd place in the Mitchell Open BAM, a 2nd place in the Freeman Mixed BAM and a 2nd place in the Mixed Team Trials.

Giorgia partners regularly with bridge superstar Zach Grossack in international mixed competitions.

Giorgia was playing in this event as a member of the Parker team.





Bridge, Youth and Schools



Who am I? My name is Samantha Punch, Professor of Sociology at the University of Stirling, UK. I lead the international work of BAMSA.

What is BAMSA? Bridge: A MindSport for All (BAMSA) is a research project working collaboratively with bridge organisations to increase the number of players and transform the image of the mindsport.

BAMSA believes that bridge can be promoted as a potential solution to tackle big societal issues of social isolation, loneliness, mental health problems, inclusivity and healthy ageing.

BAMSA's new study

The new project aims to develop academic evidence that demonstrates the skills and wideranging benefits that bridge, as a mindsport, can offer young people. The study will investigate the benefits and challenges of teaching bridge in schools. The goal is to encourage schools to take bridge as seriously as chess, and mindsport education as seriously as physical education.

How can donating help?

By donating, you enable BAMSA to conduct this work in the USA as well as Europe. The funding pays for the researchers to interview school teachers, bridge teachers, pupils and parents to explore what helps and hinders learning bridge. 

At the other table, Bauer won her DK and played the SJ which held.

She played a club to the king and Willenken's ace!! Willenken tracked the D9 and Lin cashed four rounds of diamonds.

With five tricks in tow and the contract already failing, Lin switched to the S5 to Tracey's ace. Tracey played the CT to the queen and led the HJ to




her ace. She cashed the HK and claimed a total of six tricks! Contract down 3!




In the Closed Room, Dinkin started the bidding with 2C explained in the diagram.




and Bauer ducked again!! Bauer needed to win the SA on the second or third round and shift to the HA to collect one spade and the four hearts for down one.

Board 59 was the first double-digit swing for Dinkin.




Both tables played in a major suit game: the Open Room in 4S and the Closed Room in 4H. Spades can produce 11 tricks while hearts, only a 7-card fit can produce 9. At the actual tables, something similar to the reverse happened.

In the Open Room, Bauer led the HJ against 4S. Rosenthal won and played a low diamond toward the jack. Bauer won the DQ and played a small spade. Declarer won in dummy and cashed the SJ. He was still alive if he led a heart to his hand and took the ruffing finesse in diamonds. Instead, he led a spade to hand and no longer had the communication to score ten tricks. Contract down one.

In the Closed Room, Debbie needed to opening lead a spade to defeat 4H. Partner has a doubleton spade and the spade lead will tangle declarer and result in four tricks for the defense when dummy runs out of entries before trumps are fully drawn. Instead, Debbie led a low diamond to Michael's queen. Michael switched the C7, ducked to Debbie's queen.

After winning the CQ, Debbie played the CK. Declarer won the ace, drew two rounds of trump, crossed back to hand with a spade, and forced out the HQ. Debbie exited with a club, declarer winning the ten. Declarer drew the last trump and ran the spades for 10 tricks.
