In the Closed Room, Freeman passed his ten count and his opponents stopped in a part score. In the Open Room, Welland opened his ten count and his opponents got to game!

In the Closed Room, Garner opened one spade and his partner raised to two spades. Freeman now backed in with three clubs. When Garner passed, his side had very little chance to reach game. Perhaps he should have tried three diamonds over three clubs since he had well-placed club honors and heart shortage. All he really needed was a decent spade fit and a little help in diamonds.

In the Open Room, Welland's opening one club bid actually kept the bidding a level lower by allowing Hamman to make an aggressive cue of two clubs in response to Zia's one spade overcall. Since Welland had already opened the bidding, he did not feel the need to risk competing with a three club bid, and Zia could now show his diamonds a the two level. Hamman jumped to three spades and Zia bid the game.

There was little to the play and both tables made five.

All About Kibitzing

WHEN CAN YOU KIBITZ IN THE PLAYING ROOMS?

You will be able to kibitz at any of the tables during this event. However, except in the Open Room during the Round Robin, you will be subject to the following regulations:

Kibitzers may enter the room ONLY at the start of play for a segment. Once play has started, the room will be closed. A kibitzer who leaves the room may not return until the start of the next session.

Cell phones and other electronic devices are not allowed in the playing rooms, even if they are turned off. Any kibitzer who is found with a cell phone wil be evicted and not allowed to kibitz during the remainder of the tournament.

When a match is being shown on BBO Vugraph, no kibitzer may sit on the same side of the table as the Vugraph operator.

Screens

All of the USWBC is played with screens. If you've never kibitzed at a table with screens before, you need to know that it is quite different from kibitzing at a regular table. You need to be seated at an "open" corner of the table (not next to the screen) in order to see much, and once there are 4 kibitzers at a table it will be very hard for additional kibitzers to see.

USBF KIBITZING RULES

The USBF **General Conditions of Contest** contain specific rules about kibitzers. They are designed to promote security at the tournament and are set forth in the conditions of contest section labeled "Security." They are:

1. General Rules

- a. During any use of duplicated boards across multiple matches, Kibitzers must select one table for kibitzing and may not move to any other table during a session or segment.
- b. Kibitzers may not speak with players, must watch only one hand at a time, may not sit in such a position as to see more than one hand at a time, may not sit in such a position as to see a computer screen in use for Internet broadcast, must check communication devices with the Director, cannot call attention to irregularities other than a board being placed incorrectly on the table (arrow positioning), but may serve as witnesses to a possible irregularity.

2. In the Open Room:

- a. If there is a live, or nearly live Internet broadcast of any match in the Open Room, kibitzers shall abide by the same rules as those applicable to the Closed Room.
- b. If there is no live, or nearly live Internet broadcast of any match in the Open Room then kibitzers, media, and NPC's may enter and return until such time as any table from the closed room has finished the segment. Once any table in the Closed room has finished, no one may return to the Open room after leaving unless escorted while absent.
- c. In either event, Open Room kibitzers are expected to abide by the same rules as the players regarding leaving the room and returning (e.g. be escorted to the restroom).

3. In the Closed Room:

- a. Kibitzers must enter the Closed Room before play commences. Kibitzers in the closed room are required to remain until the segment of play is completed at the table they are watching or to leave the playing area entirely. Closed Room kibitzers are expected to abide by the same rules as the players regarding leaving the room (e.g. be escorted to the restroom).
- b. Except as expressly provided in these conditions and appendices, NPC's shall be subject to the WBF General Conditions. Section 17.
- c. No one other than the Internet broadcast personnel and Tournament Directors may watch any computer screen or any other mechanism for enabling the Internet broadcast at any time in either the Closed or the Open Room.

VuGraph Information

The 2009 USBC will be covered on BBO Vugraph starting with the Round of 32. In the Rounds of 32 and 16 we will be covering 1, 2 or 3 of the matches being played. From the Quarterfinals on, we will cover all of the tables in play.

To watch the Vugraph online, go to the **BBO website** where you can either log on directly from your browser, go to "Vugraph" and choose which table to watch or download the BBO software to run BBO on your computer.

If you choose the latter approach, after downloading, install the software on your computer, log on, follow the directions to become a BBO member and you'll be magically transported to the Lobby of the largest bridge club in the world.

Click on the button labeled EXPLORE BRIDGE and then on the button labeled VUGRAPH THEATRE and you'll be able to choose which of the USBC matches you want to watch.

There will usually be a "yellow" user on BBO called USBF. If you have general questions, please ask USBF, not one of the hard-working Vugraph Operators, some of whom may prefer not to respond to private messages. Thank you.

Each day's schedule is the same (these are New York times; to see the times for your time-zone, go to the BBO Vugraph schedule site)

10:00-12:10 12:25-2:35 3:45-5:55 6:10-8:20

During the Quarterfinals, Semifinals and Finals, all of the teams will play the same boards, unless one or more matches gets sufficiently far behind that they have to start later than the other matches, in which case, for security reasons, they will play different boards.

During the Rounds of 32 & 16, all of the teams shown on Vugraph will play the same boards in the first and third segments each day. In the second and fourth segments, those matches that start on time will play the same boards.

After a session, you can review the Vugraph action on our Web Vugraphs, which show each hand played with a link to bidding and play records. Take a look at the older events currently available (under Archived Results) to see what we'll have for the 2009 USBC.

Web Vugraphs are posted within about half an hour of completion of the Vugraph show.

Garner led the ace of hearts and switched to the aggressive queen of spades. This didn't work out so well since Freeman could now ruff a heart in dummy and claim eleven tricks. Had Garner led a diamond on the go, his partner's two ruffs would have defeated the contract.

All Pass

In the Closed Room, Welland and Willenken had a lengthy auction that seemed to include a couple of fake cues to arrive at six clubs. Since Hamman had been given the opportunity to double the four diamond cue bid (the only real cue of the auction!!), Welland/Willenken were failing in five clubs so bidding six mattered little.

In the end, six clubs failed two tricks for -200 and a 13 IMP loss to Welland.

relatively simple auction that ended in five clubs.

(Editor's note: I was disappointed that Roy didn't pass four diamonds redoubled. The morning hands were very boring till that bid!

Seriously, it appears that four diamonds is actually cold. Assume a heart opening lead and return. Declarer trumps the second heart, crosses to a club and trumps the third heart. He now plays ace/king of spades and ace/king of clubs which West is forced to ruff.


If West returns a heart, declarer will have succeeded in scoring six trumps plus his four black tricks... so West MUST return a trump and declarer will win this and play another black winner putting West back in the same position... however, now, if West returns a trump, declarer simply draws trump and claims... If West returns a heart, declarer will have scored the necessary sixth trump trick to get to ten tricks!

This all would have resulted in +920 as opposed to -200!! ... winning 8 IMPs instead of losing 13)



In the Open Room where Cohen played three clubs, it was not very interesting. Nickell led his singleton diamond to the jack, queen, ace. Cohen played a club to the ace; a heart to the queen; the club king ... noted the four-two split and claimed his nine tricks.

In the Closed Room, things heated up. Once again, we see Welland's team opening the bidding and the opponents getting to game while in the other room, Nickell's team passed and their opponents stopped in a part score (see page 3).

For most declarers, game would be a tad rich on this hand with a bad heart split, however, Rodwell, one more time, played Houdini.

Welland led the deuce of clubs from his Q2 (Roy is the tricky one and it's worked for him in the past) to the seven, six, ace. Rodwell played the deuce of hearts to the ace and a diamond to his king. He cashed the ace of hearts and played the ten of hearts to Willenken's jack, getting the bad news.

Willenken cashed his heart queen and if he played his ace of spades, Eric had no chance... however, everyone had false-carded everyone else so much that Willenken got caught up in the action and underled his AJxx of spades, successfully fooling only himself.

Rodwell could win the king of spades and play a high diamond toward the dummy. If Welland covered, Eric would win the ace in dummy and pitch the spade loser on the club king... if Welland ducked, he could let it ride and play a second diamond to the ace and take his pitch.

Rodwell won the spade, played the jack of diamonds (Welland ducked). Eric ducked and played a second diamond and claimed ten tricks.

Once Willenken cashed the queen of hearts and exited with a low spade, it was all over but the shouting.

Knowing little or nothing about partner's hand, Ekeblad decided to make the aggressive, but thoughtful lead, of the spade ace. Weichsel's ten looked encouraging and he continued with a small spade to Wildavsky's jack. Wildavsky played the ace of clubs and a club toward the jack, claiming ten tricks: two spades, three hearts, four clubs, and a diamond.

East.

Unfortunately for Ekeblad, once he tabled the spade, the hand was cold.

In the other room, knowing his partner held five hearts and four spades, Boyd led the three of hearts. A heart lead is magic. Granovetter does not have the time to set up his tricks without setting up five for the opponents: two spades, two hearts and a club.

Matt won the heart in hand and finessed against the king of clubs, losing to North. North continued the heart attack. Granovetter won, played off his clubs, tried the queen of spades, again losing to North. Robinson cleared the heart suit and sat back to wait for his spade king to cash.

In the Closed Room, Boyd/Robinson bid to five spades from the North and East led the heart ace. North simply guessed spades to take 12 tricks.

In the Open Room, it was much more interesting. Ekeblad/Weichsel bid to six spades from the South on a totally artificial relay auction.

Wildavsky led a club taken by the ace in dummy. Weichsel cashed the king of spades and got the bad news. His only hope was to finish drawing trumps and find 3-3 diamonds so he could discard his clubs and drive out the ace of hearts. When the diamonds didn't split, he conceded down one.

The hand CAN still be made on the club lead, but it requires that declarer take an immediate spade finesse to the ten. He can then drive out the heart ace by playing the king and queen. This permits him to trump the club return and use heart and diamond entries to his hand to pick up the trumps... giving him six spades tricks, two heart tricks, three diamond tricks and a club.

In the Closed Room, Boyd/Robinson bid quickly to four hearts on a totally natural auction. This cannot be defeated as long as declarer guesses the club lie. At the table, the opponents played three rounds of clubs. Robinson discarded the nine of diamonds when East ruffed with his eight. Now the

defenders were helpless. A diamond was returned to dummy's ace. Robinson pulled one round of trump, cashed the other high diamond, ruffed a spade, ruffed a diamond and claimed.

At the other table, science seems to have backfired. Ekeblad's two club response to one spade started an artificial relay sequence. Relay systems are a memory test and work great until someone interferes. At that point, partnerships are required to adjust their methods to compensate. Not infrequently, disasters such as this occur. We do not know what Weichsel thought four hearts was, but he certainly would have passed if he believed it to be natural, long hearts. Four spades could have been beaten three tricks, but the defenders settled for down one ... 10 IMPs to Robinson.
